

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



Court Cases

DID YOU KNOW ...?

Under Rule 13(a) (vi), a let may be allowed if a player drops his racket, talks, calls out or in any other way distracts the attention of his opponent. It is felt that the game is difficult enough without having a player's concentration upset by his opponent calling out, dropping or banging his racket, making strange noises, pushing off his opponent, etc. All this is quite unnecessary and considered valid grounds for a let initially and the award of a point against the offender if the habit persists.

October Swimming Gala

After the heady excitement of competing for medals and cups in our most successful Family Gala last month, it was a pleasant surprise to find that a good turnout of 24 swimmers managed to produce no less than 16 best performances.

Only one swimmer improved in all three of his strokes - to be Improver of the Month for the second month running - and that was Chris Hambleton. A second and well deserved "Improver" was Kris Erswell who improved on his best performances in two out of three strokes, by a massive 23 seconds.

Special Mentions for:

Under 7 Girls: Andrea Sill who continues to improve and who reduced her best Breast stroke time by 4 seconds to record a time of 28.8 seconds - just 1.6 seconds off the BCB Record.

Under 9 Boys: Simon Timmins, a fantastic 24 seconds improvement in his I.M. and only 1 second behind our under 9 boys' champion, Jack McConnell.

Under 11 Girls: Natasha Lovell still improving with 2 seconds off her best breaststroke time.

Under 11 Boys: The Michael Mayo/David Collins friendly duel continues - in the Family Gala there were two ties and Michael won the cup by just one point. This month David reversed the positions. Both boys are steadily moving towards the BCB records.

Under 13 Girls: Louise Mayo, having just moved up from the under 11 girls' group, did well in her first 100 metre races. Keep it up Louise.

He managed to knock off 3 seconds from his best butterfly performance (a significant margin at this level) to beat the pre-1975 BCB Fly Record for under 15 boys. Well done all of you.

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There were two Thailand Cricket League Committee Meetings in October plus our own Cricket Section AGM on 19th. As a result the 1984/85 Cricket Season is now in an advanced stage of planning. Arrangements so far are as follows:

Grounds: The Polo Club and AIT wickets are ready for use and Thailand Cricket League Fixtures will be held at these venues as well as at RBSC and the Chiang Mai Gymkhana Club.

Competitions: The old 40 over and 25 over Leagues will be replaced by new 50 over and 30 over Leagues. There will be no limit in the number of overs that any bowler can bowl in the 50 over League and each bowler will be restricted to a maximum of 6 overs in the 30 over League. Practice Sessions: One or two players have already had an early work out and official practices will commence on Saturday 3rd November (weather permitting). Practice sessions in November will be:


Saturdays and Sundays : 2.30 p.m. Wednesdays : 4.45 p.m.






These useful tips will help you...



Avoid crowds during packing days by selling unwanted items well in advance. Packing is more secure and faster if only packers are present during packing days.




New furniture should be delivered at least two weeks before packing to ensure dry finishes. Furniture should not be oiled during the last two weeks as the oil might seep during transit: wrapping paper may adhere to and spoil finishes.



If possible, disconnect all electrical appliances, particularly refrigerators, deep freezes, airconditioners and stoves, the day before packing.



Discard all combustible liquids (such as lighter fuel) and aerosol cans from your belongings.



All furniture keys should be taped to respective items, preferably to the insides of drawers, etc., and you should keep a complete set of duplicate keys for yourself



Have all your travel documents - passports, tickets, tax clearances, etc. - assembled prior to packing.
