



#### Good News for Mae in November




#### Fine Dining




Shaping to play the shot is an important term for you budding referees out there. Once a player has shaped for the shot, i.e. bought the racket back into the top of the




Our own M 'n' M (Martin and Marvyn) hamming it up for the camera





# Is a Dog the Right Pet for You?

f you can't honestly say "yes" to the following questions but still want a dog, then think about this: there are around 500,000 stray dogs on the streets of Bangkok alone,

some of which have been abandoned by owners who didn't think carefully enough before taking a dog on.

- When your contract in Thailand ends, are you prepared to ship your dog to your new home and pay the high quarantine charges if necessary?
- If you don't have a live-in maid, are you prepared to board your dog if you can't take it on holiday with you (anything from Bt 150 a day)?
- Are you willing to get your pet neutered? For a bitch the cost is about Bt 1,800 and for a male dog about Bt 1,000.
- Will you get your dog vaccinated yearly and provide proper medical attention whenever necessary?

  Annual vaccinations will cost about Bt 400 a year, but other veterinary bills could be substantially more.
- Are you willing to provide and pay for nutritious food for your dog? A daily serving of rice just isn't adequate.
- Will your dog have human company for most of the time every day?
- Can you give your dog daily exercise?

  If your answer to ALL of the above is yes, then a dog could be the right pet for you. Read on....

#### The right choice

Puppies look cute and cuddly but they may not be the best choice for all dog owners-to-be. They need house training, can be very, very destructive and are really not ideal for families with elderly people or very young children. Puppies may make an elderly person trip or fall, or could be handled roughly or trodden on by a young child. An adult dog is probably the best choice for people in these situations.

The sex of your new dog is up to you but always keep the cost of neutering in mind when choosing.

Consult a vet for a list of reputable breeders

if you want a pedigree puppy (not necessarily the wisest choice in Thailand, and certainly not my choice). When choosing a pedigree pup, there's plenty of things to look out for. To get a good idea of its health and temperament, it is essential that you see it with its mother and the rest of the litter. Look for a nicely rounded puppy, with bright clear eyes, a dry, clean rear end, a healthy coat, strong teeth and clean ears. Never be tempted to take a pedigree puppy with runny eyes, runny nose or a cough. A pot-bellied puppy probably has intestinal worms. Remember: puppies should be about 8 weeks old before they leave their mother. If buying an expensive pedigree is not your priority, then there are some good alternatives.

#### Adopt One

Keep an eye on the British Club noticeboard as members often advertise pets there. Better still, put a notice on the board yourself stating your preferences and I guarantee you will get a reply!

Any member who read my article in the September issue will also realise that with help from my friend Pym, I can usually lay my hands on an unwanted street dog or puppy. These animals often make superb pets and are usually loyal and friendly (or should I say grateful?), especially the older ones.

Another alternative, not always problemfree, is to attend one of the "Adopt a Puppy" days held by the Bangkok Metropolitan Administration (BMA). Before offering the puppies to the public,

> all are neutered and vaccinated, and there is no charge for adopting one. Sadly, however, some of those on offer are already sick with diseases such as parvo-virus,

distemper and pneumonia. The BMA vets are usually on hand during these adoptions so check carefully with



them first before choosing one. It is extremely hard not to fall in love with these adorable puppies, and wanting to cuddle them is hard to resist. However, for the puppies' sake, resist if you can to avoid spreading disease. It can be a risky business, but I think it's worth consideration.

Caution: It is generally felt in Bangkok animal circuits that buying a pet from Chatuchak Market is ill-advised. They are often sickly specimens and some of the cute critters on sale there have been captured in the wild using disgraceful means. Don't support this practice by paying for any animal at Chatuchak Market.

So now you have chosen your new family member, here's what you do:

#### Find a Vet

Ask around and it's easy to get recommendations. I take my dogs and cats to either Dr. Sumalee at Sukhumvit Veterinarians (tel: 391 9117) or Dr. Chisanu at Animal Clinic (tel: 258 6751), both in the Sukhumvit area.

When you first get your puppy or dog, take it to the vet for a check-up, ensure it is vaccinated and ask when it should be neutered.

#### Stamp out parasites

Fleas: They cause a lot of irritation and can be a host for tapeworms. It's also unpleasant for your house-guests to see them jumping about! Treatments can be bought from your vet. You must also make sure that any flea eggs have been destroyed. Do this by washing your dog's bedding and

treating other likely breeding areas with specialised flea treatments. I use FRONTLINE spray every month without fail or FRONTLINE Spot-On which eradicates both fleas and ticks in my 2 dogs and 2 cats. I have not found the cheaper flea powders to be effective at all.

Ticks: These are blood suckers which feed off your dog for several days before dropping off. If you see a tick on your dog, only pull it off after cutting its air supply for 30 minutes with a dab of grease, otherwise the head may remain embedded in the skin and cause an abscess. One of the vets from "Animal Hospital" (that great TV programme featuring Rolf Harris) suggested that Vaseline is perfect for rubbing on ticks. From personal experience I can warn you that ticks are prolific little suckers and lay babies at an alarming rate. It doesn't take long before they're crawling everywhere and I had a right palaver getting rid of them. At first sight of one, consult your vet and/or use FRONTLINE.

Lice: These cause severe irritation and

even anaemia. Check for tell-tale signs of white eggs in your dog's fur and consult your vet for treatment.

Mange: No-one living in Bangkok can be unaware of this problem as it is commonly seen in street dogs - inflamed skin and

bald patches. More about mange in a future article but if your dog shows signs of this consult your vet quickly.

#### Feed well

A balanced diet and regular feeding are vital ingredients for a healthy dog. Lots of high quality protein, fat and carbohydrates are needed. Any meat or fish which is fit for human consumption can be fed raw. Supplement this with dry dog biscuits which have added vitamins and minerals. You can feed your dog on dry food only but it makes them very thirsty, so leave them lots of water to drink. For variety, you can also use some of the better-known canned dog foods which are freely available here.

Feed your dog about the same time everyday. Most adult dogs are happy with one main meal a day (with perhaps a few dog biscuits for treats in between), but small dogs, extra-large dogs and elderly dogs may prefer two meals a day.

Young puppies between 2 and 4 months need their own special feeding regime. Small amounts of

easy to digest food, such as minced meat, flaked fish, rice, porridge, and milk is best. At this age they need 4 meals a day. After 4 months of age, the number of meals can be gradually reduced and the amount of food given increased.

Give a dog a bone - but avoid cooked bones and small bones (like chicken bones) which may splinter.

Dogs and puppies need to have a bowl of fresh water available at all times.

#### Go walkies!

Not so easy here in Bangkok but nevertheless it's essential that your dog gets regular daily exercise. If walking the polluted streets of Bangkok with a pack of

mangy strays sniffing at Rover's botty is not your idea of fun, then you'll have to find an alternative. Until I moved to a house with a garden big enough to exercise my dogs, I used to take them at weekends to the lake at Queen Sirikit National

Convention Centre, on the unmanicured area of grass. There's not too many stray dogs there, plenty of grass and trees, and a lake to swim in if you're not too worried about Rover drinking the waste from the Tobacco Monopoly! After dark, I'd then take the dogs for a walk on the lead in the quieter sois near my house. Now I throw a ball in the garden, with a Saturday visit to a grassed area near my husband's office and an occasional trip to the seaside.

Finding a place to exercise your dog is crucial to his health and happiness as lack of exercise can end up in a dog becoming fat, bored and destructive.

#### Get grooming

All dogs benefit from a daily groom, and it's a chance for you to check for lumps, bumps, parasites or skin problems. If your dog is long-haired, then it must be combed



daily otherwise in this climate it will land up with matted hair and skin irritations. Start brushing your dog when it is young to get it used to grooming. I didn't pay enough attention to this and have landed up with a scruffy-

looking, long-haired variety who absolutely refuses to be touched by a brush or comb. If necessary, get your dog's coat clipped regularly at a professional dog groomer. I now take mine to "Dog Gone It" at 70 Sukhumvit 31, or "Sukhumvit Veterinarians" at 995 Sukhumvit Road (between sois 53 & 55) who seem unperturbed at the possibility of having their fingers bitten, but there's plenty of

other good ones around. It's fine to bath a dirty or smelly dog, but avoid doing this too often as it makes the coat rather dry.



#### A happy tail to end

Last May I went to an "Adopt a Puppy" day, not to adopt but just for interest. There were hardly any customers that day and, as the BMA staff started packing up with many puppies still not taken, I picked up the skinniest, saddest-looking mongrel with breathing problems and took him home. He had suspected distemper so had to be quarantined from my other dogs. I named him 'Pepper', and am delighted to report that 'distemper' turned out to be pneumonia and today he's a healthy, glossy-coated bundle of fun, with an enormous appetite, a penchant for cats and the curliest tail you've ever seen. He now lives with another British Club member who kindly answered my advertisement for a good home. My sincere thanks to him.


Here are some of the issues raised:

For those without email, the very recently-established Club news postcard is supposed to fill this gap, and for those who have their post sent to a more appropriate address. I have had little feedback on this new initiative - any thoughts on it out there?



Our next promotion will feature food from India so keep an eye out for the dates. I hope to see you all there.



and have the satisfaction of knowing your enjoyment is helping those less fortunate in Thailand.







was something that fastened a collar on a shirt and 'going all the way' meant staying on a double decker bus until it reached the depot. Pizza, McDonalds and




instant coffee were unheard of. In our day cigarette smoking was fashionable, grass was mown, coke was kept in a coal

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
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## Tee To Tea In Sri Lanka

The schedule looked punishing but a feast of golf and sightseeing was promised. It was thus that 20 members of the golf section assembled at Don Muang airport on Thursday, 28th September for the 3 day golf tour of Sri Lanka. So popular is Sri Lankan Airways that the laggard Carter/Taylor party found themselves bumped off and on another airplane. That was how we lost the spare pilot. Nevertheless everyone reached Columbo in good time to be greeted with a garland of orchids.

We proceeded to the Royal Oceanic Hotel in Negombo. Half the party retired to bed and the other half led by Tissera and Young repaired to the bar.

We all woke up in the morning to be greeted by a palm fronged beach and a flotilla of fishing vessels. Breakfast was a delicious fish curry and at that point I knew that I wanted to eat Sri Lankan food forever. 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
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
