


Seeking, perhaps, spiritual solace Norman led Arthur to the bar for cocktails and the third sporting event of the day - chess.




On the Saturday evening a ceilidh was held for which the Rose Garden provided a superb barbecue. This was inevitably followed by much dancing and consumption of scotch.






Bob Coombes now claims he can make real rollmops. We await the results with mouth-watering anticipation.



Papaya

(Carica/papaya)


The papaya is plant which, at first glance, looks rather like a palm though it is not one. Like the palms, the papaya normally grows as an erect column, without branches and with all its leaves at the top growing directly out of the trunk in a spiral on strong leaf-stalks which may be as much as 1 m. long. The tree grows rapidly to about 10 m. tall, the wood of the trunk is light and brittle.

Papaya probably originated in Central America but the species is now widespread in the tropics. It can withstand the dry seasons of monsoon areas, but cannot tolerate waterlogging or frost. As it produces a heavy yield of large fruits (up to 9 kg. and 30 cm. long) the tree needs a fertile soil with good drainage. The skin of the fruit is green but turns yellow when the fruit is ripe. Inside the pink-orange flesh is 3-4 cm. thick around a five-angled central cavity encrusted with black seeds; the flesh is rich in vitamin A and calcium and has some vitamin C. Papaya plants can be easily grown as pot plants in Thailand: wash the seeds to remove adhering flesh then allow to dry for about 2 days. After that you will find that the thickly-ridged layer which surrounds the seed can be prised away. Plant the seed 2-3 cm. deep and the plant should emerge within 2 or 3 weeks. The early leaves of papaya trees are roughly triangular or heart-shaped and quite unlike the mature leaves.

Papaya trees start to produce fruit very early in life, at about 1 year old but the trees live for only 25-30 years. Towards the end of its life the number of fruits produced declines, but in its best years a papaya can produce between 30 and 150 fruits each year, so an orchard planted with papayas can yield up to 35 tonnes of fruit each year per hectare as about 1,300 trees are planted per ha. In Thailand papaya orchards are often relatively small areas with 50-100 trees.

Unfortunately, papaya fruits cannot be transported easily: the fruits become bruised or overripe. As they are heavy, containing 88 per cent water, they are expensive to transport. Most papaya fruits are eaten in the countries where they are grown, though some fruits are transported from Hawaii to the U.S. and nowadays more of the fruits are being canned for export. The fruits contain a useful enzyme - called papain - which is used for tenderising meat; the enzyme is obtained by drying the fruit and grinding it to a powder. In 1980, 1.9 million metric tonnes of papaya were produced, one-third of these were grown in Southeast Asian countries, including Indonesia, Malaysia and Thailand. The world's single major producer, however, is Brazil followed by Jamaica. Uganda is another important producer but the main objective of production there is usually papain, the protein-digesting 'tenderizer'.

The conditions of entry were specified by the B.B.C: the story had to be on the theme of "The Old and the New", be of length about 2500 to 2700 words, have a strong local flavour of the country it came from and be suitable for reading to a mixed world-wide audience.

THE SECOND CHANCE

Chan Ah Ling had always considered himself a fortunate man. A goldsmith by trade, he owned a tall shophouse in the heart of Bangkok's Chinatown and the three golden balls that hung over the door indicated that some of the pretty gold trinkets and ornaments, wrought by himself and displayed so temptingly in the window, would find their way back to him when the buyers fell on hard times. So business was good and Ah Ling and his family lived comfortably in the three upper stories of the building. His wife was an excellent housekeeper and a noted cook and had raised five fine children for him... the youngest was still in high school but the two older boys were working and both girls had made suitable marriages which had already given him three grandchildren.

Ah Ling's only grumbles were about his wife's nephew, Damrong. This young man was her sister's son and he worked in the Barber's Salon of one of Bangkok's big luxury hotels. The visiting businessmen and the tourists tipped lavishly and Damrong always had money in his pocket. 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New Records ... by Camus

MAHLER'S WONDERFUL MUSIC

IT is said that the late Otto Klemperer's reading of Mahler's Seventh Symphony, the E Minor, is somewhat controversial. though it is certain that the music's tonal style, polyphonic setting, and its fullness of expression is brought well to the fore in his performance with the New Philharmonia Orchestra, first recorded in 1969, and now re-issued by Conifer - EMI on IC 163 -01 - 931/32 (two records).



The symphony's sub-title could well be 'Romantic' or 'Nocturnes', for it embraces two 'nachtsmusik' movements among its complement of five. If Klemperer's tempo is generally slow, this is advantageous to the dramatic and deliberate introduction to the opening movement where the magnificent first theme is given to the tenor horn -- 'Here Nature roars', said Mahler -- the second subject savouring of the romantic and being juxtaposed with a typical 'marziale' rhythm. Certainly there is romanticism in the first of the 'night music' episodes, echoing horns and woodwind together with pizzicato strings contributing to the moonlit illusion.

Some find the middle section - a scherzo - bitter, even horrific, but here Klemperer succeeds in reminding us of the fact that the composer never really got fully away from his childhood customs -- this is really "a child's fear of the dark", the orchestra depicting flickering firelight, grotesque shadows, with the gentle trio a calming lullaby. Klemperer's account of the second 'nachtsmusik' moment is magically sensitive - swooning harmonies, the sound of the mandoline for wooing, and a lyrical trio melody for sensuous fulfilment.

The work ends with a final rondo, a variation-form illustration of the music of broad daylight, drums and trumpets suggesting a Wagnerian-like pagentry, the open-hearted gaiety affixing a crowning seal to a symphony that has embraced practically everything. Don't neglect to hear this wonderful music -- interpreted with all the sensitivity that was the keynote of everything Klemperer did.

Would make an acceptable Christmas gift.

On Totton-Go Feet (BEAT 5) we bring you our 'Special Beat Service'. This up-to-date service leaves The Beat right on your doorstep, the seven-strong vocal/instrumental group ready and willing to entertain you with 12 songs which they wrote themselves, even supplying the words in full for you on their 'sleeve'.


Feature of this service is the interpolating of instrumental obbligati and subtle interludes to add a spice to the vocalising, piano, saxophone, trumpet, banjo, and the accordion (of virtuoso Jack Emblow). The entertainment is well-varied: fast-moving 'Jeanette', a real 'presto' episode; 'She's Going', quick-fire patter in 'perpetuum mobile' fashion; 'Sole Salvation', nearly 'gets the boot' (get the pun?) for a daft lyric; and the clean-cut, crisp rhythm all through, not least in the opener 'I Confess'.

And I confess that, for many of us, the star of the show is the calypso-influenced 'Spar wid Me', ideal vocal ensemble with banjo, lyricon, and extended saxophone chorus. Note the drums and percussion - always appropriately decisive, though never over-emphatic. Note also that the producer is a Sargeant -a sergeant on the beat?! -- and that The Beat comes to you by 'recorded' delivery.

Also it is obvious that Lion scored for 4 beasts (tiger) at 1 point each.



Yes, your second favourite team has had a long string of home matches.



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



Better get your tickets ASAP.





There are also trophies to be won and Helen Jamieson would appreciate the return of these as soon as possible from last year's winners.




