AYUDHYA TOUR

September 21st was a beautiful day for our outing + everyone gathered at the Club for eight o'clock and the bus left promptly with our guide Leonie Vejjajiva sitting at the front beside her friend Khun Yupin, an historian who had offered to come and answer our questions.

Our first stop in Ayudhya was to be the Japanese settlement. However, we found, unfortunately, when the bus turned on to the track leading there, the recent rains had damaged the surface and the road was impassable. When the bus stopped, clusters of motor-cyclists and pedlars of tourist paraphernalia were already outside ready to buzz us with their wares. We climbed down from the bus and, despite the heat, walked to the settlement where the same vendors were awaiting us—this time with iced drinks.

The Japanese Settlement itself was rather bare with only a stone monument explaining the origin of the community in Thailand. But the shady trees provided a welcome resting point and we had time to look at the display of pottery dishes dredged up from the river.

From there we took a long-tail boat across the river to the Portuguese Settlement. This was an interesting place to visit as the Portuguese Government has funded excavations there and a small sala has been constructed where one can read about and view pictures of the small community of the sixteenth century. Most fascinating, especially for the children, was the excavation of the graveyard in which about sixty victims were buried at the time of a smallpox epidemic in the mid-sixteenth century. Their bones are on view under the shade of a sala from which hangs a hammock—where the watchman spends his nights sleeping over the skeletal remains!

We sailed back across the river and walked along the road to the bus where we all had a welcome cool drink and enjoyed the air-conditioning. A slight drizzle had begun to fall so, when the bus stopped at the ruins of the Royal Palace I did not dismount. However, most people gallantly went off led by Leonie and Khun Yupin.

Next was lunch in the park - the mayor of Ayudhya had arranged that we could eat in a terrazzo summer-house next to a small lake. A packed lunch was provided by the British Club, whose staff helped serve and pour drinks. It was good to have them along.

After lunch, the bus took us to the main temple Wat Raj Borpit where there is also a market. The front stalls sell many types of dry foods, small knick-knacks, face masks, musical instruments and knives (local speciality), while behind there are several antique shops. Leonie was inside and able to offer helpful advice about dates and prices.

We then went to the old fort at Pompet - this is rather overgrown, so a snake warning was given. There were heaps of dishes and bottles that the divers had brought up from the river bed and were selling cheaply.

By this time the weather had become dull and wet so we decided to return to Bangkok.

This outing was a first for the British Club and was the idea of Harold Mercer - the trip was oversubscribed so another one will probably be arranged in the new year. Many thanks to Leonie for organising the trip and Khun Yupin for her help. Hopefully other tours Leonie has suggested will also take place in 1986 - it would be good to know that Harold's idea of Club outings was a winner.

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AN EVENING TO REMEMBER

Some enthusiastic members of the Bangkok St. George's Society, recalling many enjoyable celebrations in Hong Kong of the anniversary of the Battle of Trafalgar, have successfully introduced the event into Bangkok's Social Calendar.

The black-tie affair at the Hilton Hotel on October 22 saw more than 90 British expatriate patriots and their guests gather for 'An Evening to Remember'. Everyone was piped on board with a tot or two of a rum which was much too smooth to have been the real Navy rum (unless of course it explains the British Naval Association's desire to keep the celebration of this historic British Victory within a much tighter circle!) and I'm sure it contributed in no small measure to the singing and story-telling later in the evening. However, President of the St. George's Society Arthur Phillips remained sober enough to thank the chief organisers Eric Turner, Clive Brook-Fox and Philip Mermod, and to introduce the band and leaders of the entertainment Richard Hopkins, Richard Wells and the irrepressible David Frost.

What we will remember about this celebration of the 180th Anniversary of the Battle of Trafalgar were the superb nautical setting created by Philip Mermod's carpenters and painters in the Ballroom, and Frank Rowland's really exceptional speech and toast to "the immortal memory" of Lord Nelson.

The Ballroom was decorated with huge murals of 'men o'war' in action settings and, as a backdrop, the construction of a fighting ship across the breadth of the ballroom was too spectacular to be wasted on a solely stag affair. So, next year, the unanimous verdict is that we want the ladies to join us too! (What the Naval Association will say about that I really don't know!)

Many people said to me that Frank Rowland's was one of the best after dinner speeches they had ever heard, and I quite agree. In fact if space permits it is worthy of inclusion in full in the Outpost. Frank works with Smith and Nephew Ltd. in Bangkok. Born in Hartlepool, he is now an Australian citizen and is a keen member of the St. Patrick's Society. He served with the British Army, but his family has been connected with the Royal Navy and the Merchant Service for many years. His brother is still a serving officer in the South African Naval Forces. His father

served in the Royal Navy during the First World War and he lost twin uncles in that war who were also in the Royal Navy. Not surprisingly one of his pet subjects is military history, and his research on Lord Nelson and the Battle of Trafalgar has been exhaustive.

His speech was informative, and witty, and for some of us under-educated chaps he made this great Commander-in-Chief of the British Navy come alive. His toast was 'The Immortal Memory" and he gave us an evening to remember. I hope that he and I and all of you can be there next year.



We wish to express our genuine thanks to you and your staff for your assistance during our filming there last Saturday.



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LUNCH IN THE COUNTRY

For a nice family lunch on a weekend, why don't you try the pier at Bang-Poo? This pier is owned and operated by the Royal Thai Army and is, I believe, the nearest seaside place to Bangkok. The pier was built more than 35 years ago and the area intended as a seaside resort. Due to the muddy sand, however, the resort angle was not successful but the pier has always been a favourite eating place for local people. It is built out into the sea and there is a place for walking, taking photographs and feeding the birds. You can buy bird food at Baht 3 per packet to give to the flocks of seagulls which come here. Some of them are so tame that they will almost take food from your hand. The view is lovely and you can usually see fishing boats and other vessels in the distance.

To reach Bang-Poo, go out of Bangkok on Sukhumvit Road. Keep straight on for about 20 kilometres (i.e., do not turn left on to the Bangna-Pattaya highway) and you will come to the town of Paknam. Here, bear to the left and continue for a little over 12 kilometres until, on your right, you see a large blue gate and a sign in English saying "Sea Food Everyday". Drive through the gate and on to Bang-Poo Pier where a soldier will assist you in parking your car.


The restaurant at Bang-Poo Pier is simple, with ordinary tables and chairs, but the ambience and food are excellent. It is open every day and is especially crowded for lunch on weekends and holidays. To ensure a seat at the edge of the pier with an uninterrupted view of the sea, you should get there early (about 11.30 a.m.). On Sunday, there is sometimes a band playing old-fashioned songs to which you can dance.

The menu is large but the specialities of the house are all kinds of sea food at most reasonable prices. The service is good and quick and the food fresh. On our last visit, our party of five had steamed mussels, crispy fried Pla Kapong, steamed crab claws, fried whole crab, and giant prawns. The bill, including bottled water and ice, came to Baht 413.

Why you are near Bang-Poo, you may also like to visit the Ancient City (Muang Boran) or walk along the esplanade at the mouth of the river at Paknam and watch the cargo ships sailing past.

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WELL WATCHING

More gleanings from the depths of the Video Shop drawers with two recommendations this month. The first gem is "Separate Tables". Based on a Terence Rattigan play, this TV adaptation manages to retain much of the original stage feeling. Two separate plays are presented in the shared setting of a very "genteel" hotel whose clientele vary little from year to year. The action centres on the dining room where strict table order is enforced by the rigid custom of the permanent guests. Alan Bates and Julie Christie shine in their portrayals of a dried-up journalist confronted by his fashion model ex-wife in the first play, and of a boring old major befriending a timid, mother-dominated spinster in the second play. Entrancing viewing and such a change from constant blockbusters.

The second gem is pure entertainment from start to finish. "The Cheyenne Social Club" starring James Stewart and Henry Fonda, (how could it fail with those two!) casts James Stewart as the blushing innocent who comes to collect his inheritance only to find that it's a bordello. His slightly more worldly-wise sidekick (Henry Fonda) takes to the idea quite rapidly but our hero has a terrible moral dilemma to sort out. Classic James Stewart and very good viewing.







The past month has seen the completion of both the Rod Carter and Harold Mercer competitions.



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

The Repechage tournament requires a much longer period of play than the Single Elimination. Each player must be defeated twice before being eliminated from further competition. As shown above, the championship bracket is carried on in the usual manner, with the defeated players dropping into the losers' bracket. The players that win out in both brackets are matched for the championship.

Entry forms for the January league will soon be circulated and details of the coaching sessions being organised will be put on the squash noticeboard as soon as the dates can be finalised.


