

A Family Affair

I his month I would like to tell you a tale about one member in particular - and his family in general - which embodies the message of fitness, training and health that I have been attempting to send your way in previous articles.



Student and mentor - Phuket here we come! We're only smiling because we haven't done the race yet.

The member to whom I refer is Peter Bond, together with his wife June and their two daughters, Tabitha and Rebecca. I first met Peter through his daughters when we were doing triathlons together. I gave the girls training programs to improve their performance and to help stay healthy while doing so. Tabitha called me one day and said that her dad was also interested in getting fitter and needed some help. I think Peter caught the Triathlon bug from his girls and he was religious in doing what I told him to do. It was not much to start with but over time the volume of work grew. It should be noted that all the training fitted nicely into Peter's daily schedule of work, play and family commitments.

Training pays off 🔳

I continued to send Peter training programs and to speak to him on the phone, but did not see him for 4-5 months. When I did, I hardly recognized him - he had lost 20 pounds! This is almost too much weight to lose in that short space of time, but he looked great and felt great too. His clothes were all far too baggy and he was in dire need of a trip to the tailor!

Peter began to tell me about all of his new skills and how his golf game had mysteriously improved during this time! I

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was happy to see his progress and to know that he was feeling good about himself. During this time June Bond also caught the exercise bug and decided it would be better to run in the mornings instead of walking every day. We started her off on a program of running every other day. She began with a 5 minute run followed by walking until she was able to run for 30 minutes at one go (she is currently on the rise to almost 60 minutes of continuous running).

Anything's possible

Before I go too far and people start wondering if this is an advert for my training programs, I would like to clarify a few things. I have chosen to write about Peter and June because of the following reasons:

• Neither had done any real serious exercise before this foray into triathlon/ running. Just because you have never done something doesn't mean that you can't start anytime you like.

• My training programs rely on the person doing the work him or herself. I only advise them what to do and the motivation has to come from within to actually do the training.

• Peter and June are not spring chickens any more which only proves that you are

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never too old to start. (Their exact ages are withheld to protect my backside!) There are 75+ year old men and women who complete Ironman distance triathlons every year. Just for your information 'Ironman' comprises a 3.9km swim, 180km bike ride and a 41.2km run - in succession, all in one day *and* it must be completed in under 17 hours. If people over 75 can do this, well you can do just about anything. C.r.

Family bonding!

With all this training, are the Bonds the next great thing in Triathlon? Probably not because they are all very recreational in their thinking. Although Tabitha and Rebecca are young enough to give it a go, they are still very 'social' about sport. People should note that extreme training for any sport is unhealthy while moderation is best. Know how hard and how far you want to go and plan for such. I am still waiting for the call from Tabitha and Rebecca to say that they want to take the next step ... but if it never comes, I will be just as happy. They enjoy what they are doing, and watching the family go off to a triathlon together is good to see. (Yes June is also now doing triathlons with the rest of the family).

The moral of this story is, 'It comes from inside and all the information or quality help you receive will be for nothing unless your heart is in it.'

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


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Two Friendly Defeats

Duang Prateep Foundation

ecognising the value of education as a key to escaping the poverty trap of life in Bangkok's slums, Foundation founder Prateep Ungsongtham Hata established a 'one-baht-a-day' school at her family home in Klong Toey slum. From these humble beginnings she became involved in the broader issues of slum life, including the provision of healthcare, social welfare, legal assistance, emergency aid and human development.

Today the Duang Prateep Foundation is an umbrella organisation for a number of projects covering most of these concerns. There are 11 kindergartens in Klong Toey and other slum communities, which provide parents with a safe place to leave their pre-schoolers while offering a basic education in social and academic skills;



educational sponsorship covering over 3,000 children a year to attend primary school without imposing financial burden on their parents; a school for the hearing impaired offering medical as well as educational assistance to children aged between 3 and 8 years; a comprehensive lunch programme at all Foundation schools and soy bean milk supplements providing nutritious and affordable sustenance; and social workers dealing with a wide range of community issues such as AIDS prevention and homecare, medical and social care for senior citizens, and fire prevention and fire-fighting, among others. There's also a credit union to encourage financial self-sufficiency.

The Children's Art Programme provides a creative outlet for slum children. Seen on this page are two of the cards showing pictures created on this programme, all of which are available from the Foundation for just 5 baht each. There's also a "Bangkok A-Z" poster (or postcard), which shows 26 sites in the capital in alphabetical order and makes a lovely present for children.

Play better Squash

The rules of squash change every 4 years, not by much but changes are introduced and unless you keep in touch with the latest version you can find yourself on the wrong side of an argument (discussion!). Paws for Thought

Neutering - The Pawfect Gift

n Thailand, thousands and thousands of unwanted puppies and kittens are born every year. Most will spend a couple of miserable years on the streets before succumbing to disease, starvation or the wheels of a car.

If every pet owner would assume a responsible attitude and not allow their animal to breed, then the present appalling number of strays would inevitably fall.

Although your family puss or pooch may not actually thank you for it, why not have him or her neutered as the ideal Christmas gift? Not much of a treat you may say, but really it's better for everyone, including your pet!

Before you decide, you may want to know what the Royal Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (RSPCA) in the UK has to say about it. For starters, unless there are very strong reasons for wanting your cat or dog to have a litter, they say the kind and sensible thing to do is to have it neutered. The operation is simple, painless and safe if carried out by a qualified vet, and it will make your own life easier. Amorous cats and dogs can be a real handful and no-one enjoys having to confine their pets. Besides, there are already too many unwanted animals, especially in Thailand, so why add to their number. Neutering is kinder to the animal itself as the necessary frustration of hormone activity in a pet often leads to mental and physical ailments. Neutering removes the source and hence the problem.

What if your male dog is not neutered?

Well, male dogs cannot resist going courting and in the process all sorts of disasters can befall them. They get into fights with other dogs and they wander about in the traffic and either hurt themselves or cause nasty accidents. If you keep a hot-blooded dog indoors, he can turn his amorous attentions to pieces of furniture, or even people. Barking and illtemper are other symptoms of frustration.

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Or your female dog?

A female dog comes on heat twice yearly, each time for a period of 3 weeks. This is likely to continue for as long as she lives. This not only makes her somewhat messy, it also means scores of howling dogs clustering around your door! What's more, she's likely to escape and become pregnant no matter how much care is taken. Finding good homes for a whole litter of cross-bred puppies is almost impossible in Thailand. Left unneutered, a bitch can go through a phantom pregnancy, which can lead to all sorts of odd behaviour and possibly require expensive veterinary attention to correct it.


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Problems with an unneutered tom-cat?

Yes? Not surprising as tom-cats have one of the most unpleasant habits of all - that of 'spraying'. They mark out their territory by urinating upon it, and the unpleasant smell can be extremely difficult to get rid of. Male cats are also some of the greatest wanderers and almost impossible to keep indoors. Their constant escapades nearly always lead to cat fights and these in turn can produce infected wounds, abscesses and serious illness.

And a female cat?

As with a female dog, a female cat in season will attract a continual host of admirers. Romantic cat-calls in the middle of the night, which even the most dedicated



sleeper would be hard pushed to ignore, are a prelude to almost inevitable pregnancy. A cat can have three pregnancies a year and up to 5 or 6 kittens in each litter.

The operation explained

In a female animal, 'spaying' consists of removing the womb and the ovaries. The technical term is ovaro-hysterectomy. For a male, just the testicles are removed, and this is known as 'castration'. The surgery is carried out under general anaesthetic and is therefore completely painless. It's a simple process and your pet will recover quickly, experiencing just some mild discomfort.

When to do it

A pet can be successfully neutered at any time in its life. However, to remove the risk of unwanted pregnancies, it should be done as early as possible. Your vet is best placed to advise on the ideal age in individual circumstances.

Better to have one litter first?

Like many outdated theories, this one is nothing more than an old wives' tale. There is no good reason for letting a female dog or cat produce a litter, and the normal health risks involved in birth and pregnancy means that it can actually be harmful.

Hoping the above information from the RSPCA will convince you about the advantages of neutering. There's certainly nothing cruel about being sensible!

I thought that in the interests of transparency it ought to be published for general interest. Here it is:

Surawongse Sala Project Fact Sheet

There have been a number of enquiries from Club members regarding the costs of the Sala redevelopment. Set out below is a summary of the various costs involved in the project. A fact sheet will be made available for future significant capital expenditures, either through *Outpost* or via the Club noticeboard.

Surawongse Sala redevelopment	Baht '000
Main contract – Ozcon	940 + 2 Club memberships
Teak tables and chairs	374
Ceiling fans and controls	69
Lighting and controls	95
Roof strengthening	81
Other (structural engineer, cake display, sign)	104
Architect - design and project management	10% of project costs

* Roof strengthening: During the course of the work a significant structural weakness in the support beams for the sala roof was discovered. This has now been reinforced by a doubling of the size of the cross beams and the introduction of steel support brackets. This work was also performed by Ozcon.

* Baht of the main contract and the architect's fees have currently been withheld pending a satisfactory solution to the sala floor problems. This is in addition to the normal 10% retention.

Finally a very merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to all members, staff and friends of the British Club. I think we will have to ask Damon to work overtime to help us get rid of the extra kilos after this very special celebration!

Notes:

* Ozcon were awarded the contract in a competitive tender process with 2 other constructors – Living Creations and Hemarrach Development. Ozcon were the lowest bidders and were also willing to accept part payment in the form of 2 Club memberships. * The main contract included demolition and removal of the existing floor and balustrades, extension of the sala floor towards the swimming pool, purchase and laying of the floor stone, erection of teak balustrades at both ends of the sala, erection of roof extension, manufacture and installation of new service bar, replacement of wall tiles and blackboard in service area, infilling of roof lining tiles, electrical wiring for lighting and ceiling fans, painting of roof lining and support beams.

Although I am absolutely in favour of club renovations and try to support as many of the club's events as possible, I would like to make the following observations:

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Suriwongse Sala Floor

London and Rome may well, as you pointed out in last month's *Outpost*, have been built from sandstone, but nobody in their right mind would install a porous sandstone surface in a catering/ recreation area that will be constantly subjected to chemical/ grease/food spillage. The designers and contractors should be required to replace this surface with one that is more suited to this area. From experience I can assure you

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that a "final clean and seal" will look pretty in the short term but will look grubby and be impossible to keep clean in the years to come. **Pool Hygiene**

I think it is a serious error to scrap the dividing wall and footbath/ shower areas between the sala and the swimming pool. If you allow members to walk directly into the pool area wearing shoes, the poolside surrounds and more importantly the pool itself will quickly become dirty and unhygienic causing an even higher incidence of illness and skin disease amongst BC swimmers, especially children, than we have at present.

Guy Fawkes Day

The fireworks display this year was undoubtedly the best and safest I have seen in the last sixteen years. I do believe however that the management and General Committee have completely lost the plot with this event. With regard to the specific points you raise, I have asked the individuals who made these recommendations for their comments on your opinion.

Sala Floor

The architects have advised that it is not the intention to install a sandstone floor which is porous. It is intended to have the floor surface sealed such that it is impervious to spillages of food and drink, etc.

Unfortunately, the original material selected (and tested) was not successful in use and after investigating several alternatives, we are now in the position of finalising selection and procurement of a specialist sealing material which we believe will provide a long term solution. Now the rains seems to have stopped and the floor is having a chance to dry out, we hope that the floor can be cleaned and the surface treated in the near future.

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Royal Barge Procession


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A Unique Experience

n occasion as special as the last Royal Barge Procession of the millennium called for a really special BC event. And so it was that 134 members and friends,



the largest group outing in recent memory (excluding the New Year cruise), made the short hop over Pinklao Bridge to watch the grand spectacle on Thursday 4th November.

Considering the fun of getting 140 people onto - and staying on - the three coaches, it seemed no time at all before we were tucking into the extensive buffet at the Rim Nam restaurant beside Pinklao Bridge on the Thonburi side, and camped out on the terrace in our allotted seats watching the barges leave the boathouse just down-river of the restaurant and be towed up-river to the starting point.

Then the interminable wait for the procession to appear around the river bend,

with people packing in on every square inch of the Thonburi bank, craning necks to ensure a view up-river. Mercifully the weather cheered up a little over the afternoon, from threatening rain to simply overcast.

The tension really started to build when at last Pinklao Bridge was closed to traffic at around 4pm, and within minutes the bows of the leading escort barges surged under the bridge, with the amplified strains of the Kathin verses originating from the *Supannahongse*, the fabulous dragon boat carrying His Majesty the King, echoing loudly from the bows of every craft.

And suddenly the river seemed full of barges of all sizes and degrees of

ornamentation. Escort vessels passing within a few metres of the riverbanks and the mighty gilded royal barges gliding majestically down the centre. Hundreds of oarsmen performing a dance-like rowing motion to a rhythmn drummed out with an ornate pole on each boat. Thousands of people gazing in awe, or clicking away on cameras, or straining their eyes to catch a glimpse of His Majesty or of Their Royal Highnesses the Crown Prince and Princess in one of the following royal barges.


And then they had all passed by, in a matter of minutes, leaving the sight of a riverful of low-profile, slim craft wending their way down-river to Wat Arun, where His Majesty was to present new robes to the temple monks as part of the royal Kathin ceremony marking the end of the 3-month Rains Retreat.





Elephantasia!







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
