

Almost another year gone, but still some great events happening at the Club before the year's end.



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

TENNIS ETIQUETTE

In general, any conversation between partners while the ball is moving toward their opponents' side of the net is taboo; once either you or your partner has hit the ball, don't say anything until an opponent has hit it. Even when a ball is moving toward two partners conversation between them should be minimised, with about the only words permitted being such exhortations as to try hard for a ball ("run!") or to let one pass ("out!"), etc. Incidentally, "out" as advice to a partner to let the ball drop does not suffice for the normal "out" call necessary when a ball has landed outside the court.

Going For Your Shots

'Going for your shots' is a mental attitude. It's the freedom to not worry about failing when you're hitting. In a sense, it is not caring when you are in the process of hitting your shots.

In other words, you're relaxed. A good example of this attitude would be when your opponent's serve is long and you yell "out" as you hit one of the best returns of the match. Since the ball was served long you did not care one whit if you made it or not. As a result, you automatically melted into the ideal mental performance state. You were relaxed and simply went for the shot.

Do not confuse this mental attitude of 'going for your shots' with physically hitting every ball with power. That is not what I mean. It is no more than a relaxed mental attitude that takes confidence and months of practice. Pounding the ball into oblivion is NOT 'going for your shots.' You can be hitting a slow, medium, or hard shot and be 'going for your shots.' It's a MENTAL ATTITUDE not any particular way of hitting.

If you have the ability to hit hard and keep a high percentage of balls in play, by all means go for it. Notice I said HIGH PERCENTAGE. Do NOT 'go for your shots' if you are selecting low percentage shots that you can only make only rarely. To keep trying the same low percentage shot over and over and over again and calling it 'going for your shots' is



incorrect. You must continue to play within the boundaries of the game you possess. 'Going for your shots' does not mean to play with RECKLESS ABANDONMENT. It is playing with CONTROLLED ABANDONMENT.

The CONTROL part is playing within your boundaries and the ABANDONMENT part is adapting a relaxed care free mental attitude when hitting. Sometimes slow, sometimes medium pace, and sometimes hitting hard but always with a relaxed, automatic mental attitude that is the signature of a champion.

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
COMMITTEE CORNER





2002 IN REVIEW





The Silk Threads of Light

he many facets of China with its mysteries and rich cultures have intrigued many over the centuries. Back when Marco Polo travelled the Silk Road of China in conquest for the wonders of the East to our present time, travellers from all over the world continued to find China to be one of the most fascinating countries to explore. I am one of the many curious individuals in search of new avenues to the abundance of China's treasures.

One of my latest discoveries is the well-known embroidery artwork of Suzhou. I have known the existence of this artform for many years. On a recent visit to China, I came across a new concept of Chinese embroidery which evolved from the ancient traditional technique to a new marriage of the East with the West.


Embroidery in old China was once an activity of leisure by maidens in their own chambers. Every great mansion maintained its traditions and techniques which had been taught and passed from mother to daughter, daughter to sister-in-law and so forth. Seldom will any of these techniques be shared with another outside of the four walls of the ladies' chambers. The needles were like hair and just one or two pieces of fine silk embroidery floss could be passed through. The artwork produced was sophisticated giving vibrant and brilliant effects.

Themes chosen for the embroidery work was often related to the nature, landscape and still life in the surroundings. With every needlepoint of silk thread, the embroiderer was able to capture the essence of their culture and inheritance into fabrics. These embroideries became a unique heirloom of much significance in the family's heritage. As time went by, embroidery was used in making fashionable motifs for garments. The stature of the person was reflected from the pattern, colour and symbol chosen for the embroidery on their garments and the material used. The ranking of the officials in the courts were determined by the number and kind of symbols used, for example the symbol for the emperor of China is the dragon and the number nine is lucky.

In the eleventh century (771 B.C.E.) woolen threads were used, in the Han dynasty (206 B.C.E. - 220 C.E.) the development of silk fabrics and silk handicrafts increased the variety and creativity of silk embroideries, and in the Tang dynasty (618 - 907 C.E.), being one of the most prosperous stages of China's history, rapid progress was made in the development of silk embroidery skills. Emperors of the Tang dynasty gave embroidered gifts to their favourite subjects and in diplomatic exchanges. In the Song dynasty (960-1279), literature, art, science, and technology had improved and progressed. During this time, embroiderers began to borrow ideas from works of great artists and a lot of fine embroidery artworks were produced.

Suzhou had a historical reputation of producing fine scholars and artists. Today, Suzhou remains the centre of education for artists near and far. The once secret and unique traditional technique in embroidery that could only be found within the boundaries of a lady's chamber were opened to all to enjoy and learn. The Chinese government realised the importance of preserving the foundation of this culture and therefore founded the Suzhou Embroidery Technical School in 1952. Yang Shouyu was one of the teachers at the time who had dedicated a majority of her time in teaching the different embroidery techniques. Yang Shouyu (1896-1981) graduated from art school, Changzhou Normal University's Painting and Design Department, Being an associate professor at the National Academy of Fine Arts, she believed that embroiderers needed to be trained in painting in order to produce the finest quality embroidery, so she encouraged her embroidery students to learn painting first. This theory was a breakthrough in the development of Chinese traditional embroidery. Yang pioneered the idea of altering traditional Chinese embroidery techniques to blend with the Western concept of brushwork and colouring of oil painting and sketching. She named this technique the 'random stitch embroidery'.

I managed to meet one of the students of Madame Yang who was dedicated to developing the embroidery artwork. Luckily, I managed to convince this artist to let




me have a few of these one-of-a-kind collectibles. With much satisfaction and pride I now have a treasure from China to remind me of this adventure.





Up, up and away

the chargeally is the limit during the air balloon trip over Chiang Mal

t was 5am as we emerged bleary-eyed from our hotel room in Chiang Mai. It was still dark outside, we were entering the world only known to milkmen and dustmen (sorry, milk persons and domestic waste disposal experts). The atmosphere was subdued in the lobby as we waited for the last of the stragglers to appear. One last head count and our adventure commenced, we were taking our first flight in a hot air balloon.

Driving to the 'launch pad' in Floraville Doi Saket the chatter picked up as realisation of our airborne journey sank in and the much needed caffeine fix kicked in. By the time we arrived, the sun was just starting to make a welcome appearance to take the nip out of the air.

The field was empty apart from two over-sized picnic baskets and surprisingly not much else. Then it all kicked off - action stations. The balloon staff went into overdrive as the balloons came to life.

What looked like an over-sized sleeping bag and a large industrial-sized fan were placed by each of the baskets. In the blink of an eye, the balloons started to take shape as the huge fans filled them with hot air.

A large propane gas cylinder was then ignited, shooting a sideways towering inferno into the vast 6,500 cubic metre space. As the air heated up, the balloon started to rise, taking the basket with

it. It wasn't long before both balloons were inflated and ready to go. Our Dutch captain, known only as Eagle, gave the signal for us to board. After an ungraceful leg-up, I was standing in one of the four compartments and raring to go onwards and upwards.

There were nine of us altogether in the larger balloon in five separate compartments and five in the smaller one. Ground crew held the edges of the basket as the balloon tugged us skyward. One last blast and as the crew

let go, slowly but surely our balloon came off the ground. We were finally airborne and heading straight towards sunrise, leaving Doi Saket behind. The rays of sunlight illuminated the hazy morning mist sweeping over the sleepy countryside. It felt like we were actually inside daybreak. The captain controlling the altitude and rate of ascent punctuated the silence by brief blasts on the gas. As we gently drifted at wind speed, the paddy fields and temples came to life before and below our very eyes. The panoramic view was stunning, rendering some passengers speechless.

As the sun continued to rise, the landscape colours changed from fiery orange to lush green. A carpet of vibrant paddy fields stretched out before us, dotted with homes and temples. Buddhist chanting drifted up from the morning worship as we watched life unfold from our privileged viewpoint.

Being suspended seventy metres above the Earth is a truly breath-taking experience. At some points when the wind speed dropped, we hung motionless, suspended in mid air. It really felt like you could reach out and touch the world below. After one peaceful hour our pilot started to look for a suitable place to land. Surrounded by wet paddy fields, it was no easy task. Finally, we spotted a small dirt track by a house. From where we were it didn't look big enough to land a mouse let alone a 33-metre hot air balloon. Thankfully,

our pilot inspired confidence, we were in safe hands. Pulling strings to open vents to turn the balloon, we prayed that the wind would cooperate and take us in the right direction.

Some unsuspecting villagers had gathered below to watch and they were enlisted to help with our landing. A 50-metre rope was hurled over the side of the handmade rattan basket. A local woman raced through the paddy field to come to our rescue and made a grab for the line. Her whole family (and dog) proceeded to pull

us down. With our knees bent we braced ourselves for a bumpy landing which never came. Gracefully, we touched down right next to a lime orchard with perfect precision. By this time everyone had come to watch and we felt like minor celebrities.

The retrieve team who had been following us on the ground throughout the journey sprang into action. The balloon deflated and came floating softly back to Earth as us weary travellers sipped and nibbled our champagne breakfast. The balloon was flattened on the ground and rolled up into a ball. The retrieval staff had the fun job of squeezing the material back into its bag. Their technique was to sit on it and bounce, just like packing a suitcase.

We would highly recommend this trip to anyone of any age or persuasion. It would make a great anniversary or birthday present. You could even pop the big question up there if you so wish. Visiting relatives would certainly go home with some great stories to tell after a hot air balloon trip in Chiang Mai. The whole trip takes about four hours leaving the rest of the day to sightsee around Chiang Mai. The staff are professional, really passionate about what they do and are happy to answer any questions you may have. George and I would be happy to chat to anyone thinking about such a trip; we'll spare you the 150 photos we took!






participant in amateur dramatics. Both John, being a good Scotsman, and Pippa enjoy socialising and imbibing, and joined the Club for the sake of the kids.
