Letter from the Chair



Dear Members,

The Christmas season is upon us and I do hope we will be seeing many of you at the BC Christmas Ball 'under the stars' unquestionably, the most magical and popular event of the

Extraordinary General Meeting - December 6th - 7:00 pm Suriwongse Room

If you are a voting member, we also hope you are planning to attend the EGM on December 6th. This is being held in order to tidy up some inconsistencies but also to propose policy changes in some areas. By now you should have received the official calling notice, sent to all members on 14th November. While this subject may make many of you yawn, some of these changes could affect the way you use the Club so please make sure you have your say! If you can't make the meeting, then do give your proxy vote to another member. Also, don't forget that you can transfer your voting rights to your spouse if desired, and forms for this purpose were included with the calling notice.

Club Development

We are now at the stage of preparing draft plans and concept boards for presentation to members at the earliest opportunity. Due to the imminent EGM and also the onset of the Christmas season, the meeting to present and discuss these ideas with members has to be deferred until the New Year.

GC Resignation

It is with much regret that I must announce the resignation of Andy Flynn from the General Committee. Andy's work commitments have dramatically changed in the last few months, due to unforeseen and significant changes within his company, and he no longer feels he can give the time required. I'd therefore like to thank Andy for his involvement and efforts on the GC to date, and look forward to seeing him around the Club soon.

Nominations for Honorary Membership

Traditionally, there have been two types of Honorary Membership bestowed on individuals considered worthy by the General Committee. One category is for dignitaries (such as Ambassadors of the core nationalities) who are awarded Honorary Membership for their term of office only. The other category of Honorary Membership is for life, and has in the past been bestowed upon members, often of long standing, who the GC believe have merited this honour. However, currently we have no Life Honorary Members in existence. The last one was Alastair Greenlees (G66) who passed away earlier this year having been a member for over 50 years.

Recently, several members have suggested that the General Committee should now consider granting Honorary Membership to a further number of worthy individuals and we are enthusiastic about the proposition. However, frankly, our combined knowledge of the history and background of some of these prospects is limited. Therefore, if you believe that there is someone who deserves this honour, we would like to hear from you. Please send your nominations to Chairman@britishclubbangkok.org to be received no later than December 23rd, 2005 and include a paragraph (as detailed as possible) of supporting rationale. The criteria are set out in Rule 39 of our Constitution below:

Honorary membership may, at the discretion of the Committee, be granted to persons who, in the opinion of the Committee, have either:

- rendered valuable services to British interests and/or The British Club, or,
- maintained close connections with British interests and/or The British Club, or
- are such other persons who are citizens of the United Kingdom, Australia, New Zealand or Canada as the Committee may deem suitable of the privilege.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity, on behalf of all of us on the General Committee, to wish you all a very happy holiday season and a safe and prosperous New Year.



He also wrote 'The Invasion' which starred the infamous Cybermen walking down the steps of St.Paul's Cathedral in London.



Obituaries



Anthony Charles Bekenn 1947 - 2005

Born in 1947 in Birmingham, England, Anthony Charles Bekenn, the former Lead Audit Partner of PricewaterhouseCoopers and British Club member since 1973, died on October 22 at Samitivej Hospital of heart failure, aged just over 58.

A long-time resident of Bangkok and blessed with a loving family, Anthony Bekenn traced his lineage back through the mid-17th century to the Earl of Annadale, Dumfrieshire. His grandfather was a doctor, but Anthony followed the footsteps of his father, Maxwell George Bekenn, an accountant.

Anthony qualified as a Fellow Chartered Accountant while in the UK in the early 1970s. He began his career practicing with Winnery and Murray (now Ernst and Young) in Birmingham.

Soon after, he came to the Far East and was employed by Coopers & Lybrand in Hong Kong and Singapore and finally with Coopers & Lybrand, Thailand.

In 1974 he took over the joint managing partnership of the local international management consulting and auditing offices.

When Coopers & Lybrand merged worldwide with Pricewaterhouse in July 1998, Anthony Bekenn became the Lead Audit Partner of PricewaterhosueCoopers.

Unfortunately, due to ill health, Anthony had to take early retirement in October 2004.

He was diagnosed with a weak heart muscle in mid-2001 and had a pacemaker implanted. In November 2004 he was admitted to the ICU at Samitivej Hospital where he was treated medically until mid-February 2005.

Anthony had a strong willpower to fight to live on - wanting to be with his family. But, as time went by, his heart condition worsened and he was admitted to the hospital ICU off and on, and again in late July 2005.

A heart transplant was planned but with complications due to a kidney problem and a repeated lung infection, Anthony was unqualified for a heart transplant and had to pass up an opportunity in early September.

With his affection and concern for his family, Anthony tried to fight on, wanting to come home to be with his family.

His faith was powerful, yet his heart was too weak to carry on. And when the time came, the family was there by his side.

Anthony is survived by his wife Kusuma (Tunn), and two children Christopher and Christina.

Many of his colleagues and staff said, "Anthony was a polite and conservative person . . . and a considerate boss". With a 'kind and gentle' nature, he was liked and respected by staff and colleagues.

In his letter of condolence, David Corsan, a retired senior partner of Coopers & Lybrand London office,

wrote: "His dedication, energy and most important, his integrity, were all one could hope for. He made a good contribution to the firm".

Sandy Gordon, a retired senior partner of Coopers & Lybrand London office, wrote:

"Tony was always a wonderful colleague and a good friend and person in a true sense of the word. He will be sadly missed by me and many others. It is still difficult to believe that someone I have known for so long whose life I have so much enjoyed being a part of is no longer with us."

Anthony was a superb and a kind-hearted family man. He was wholly devoted to his family. There was so much love for his family. All his married life, he treasured his wife and his son and his daughter with love, care, warmth, kindness, affection, and tenderness.

I am thankful to God for giving me such a kind and loving husband in this life.

My teardrops keep falling as I find words for my great loss totally inadequate to express. A dedication to my beloved husband . . .

Because of you my world becomes a better place to live Because of you I know the joys you can give Because of you my hopes and plans and dreams come true The things that mean the most to me are all because of you

These words were used on his birthdays and I mean it from the bottom of my heart.

A Church of England Service was performed at Christ Church, Convent Road. Thai religious rites were also held at Wat Tat Thong, Sukhumvit Road, followed by a cremation, presided over by the Royal Privy Councillor, M.R. Thep Devalul.

His ashes were scattered over the serene sea water of the Gulf of Thailand at the Sattahip Royal Thai Navy Base. A portion of his ashes will be taken to the UK to be buried with his father Maxwell Bekenn, at Stratfordupon-Avon Cemetery in April 2006.

On behalf of the family, I would like to express our sincere thanks to those who extended their help and support during our difficult time at the hospital over the past long months.

Thank you all for your condolences, sympathies, and support, following the sad loss of my husband. The children and I are deeply touched.

Stephen Roger Haube 1953 - 2005

Although Stephen was born in Port Sulphur, Louisiana, in reality he was a citizen of the world. Due to his father's employment with an international company, Stephen spent the early years of his childhood in Tierra del Fuego, Argentina. Then a cold and barren land, his favorite pastime was horse riding. Throughout his life, he lived in various countries: Peru, Indonesia, Singapore, Libya, Ecuador, Argentina, Switzerland, Thailand and the USA.



After fleeing from Libya with his family due to political turmoil, he enrolled in Montana International High School in Switzerland, the place where he became an avid skier.

After high school, Stephen continued his studies at Pennsylvania State University at Wilkes Berry, where he graduated in Liberal Arts and Behavioral Psychology. After graduation, at 18 years of age, he followed his father's steps and became engaged in the oil industry as a drilling foreman and mud engineer.

Back in Argentina and working for Occidental Petroleum Corp. in Mendoza, he was married in 1984 to Graciela Ponce, at the time also working for the same company. In the same year, Stephen returned to Pennsylvania State University and graduated with honors with a Petroleum Engineering Degree. After a short stay in Louisiana, he and his family were transferred to Bangkok. In 1993, he joined ETA (Swatch Group) as IT Manager, where he remained under employment until the end.

seem suick to judge, he believed in the goodness of people. He always put aside negative feelings and thoughts, which some sidered damaging to the soul. Stephen was an optimist. He truly believed that the world eventually would change and be a better world.

The latter facility has probably never even been noticed by most players but, although hasn't been used for years, it is still there. Sometime during 1971 it was put to good use when the Club entertained Aftab Jawar, an international squash player. He spent the whole day coaching and then played exhibition matches against the best players in Thailand. Apparently his only complaint about the new court was that the floor was rather hard; but he admitted that most floors feel hard if you run about them, as he had, for 10 hours!

The only other references to squash in the minutes concern details of cleaning and repairs, but it is nostalgic to remember the introduction of green non-marking balls in 1973 at 14 baht a piece!

Bit short this month, but will try to do better next month with a report on the Annual Squash Christmas Mix-in and Party.




