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

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

The origins of Christmas Day

Christmas day takes its name from "Christ's Mass" and is supposed to mark the birth of Jesus Christ. How the 25th of December was chosen is an interesting story, because apparently those involved in actually setting that date hadn't a clue when Christ was born.

In pre-Christian times late December had long been a popular pagan festive season, centered around the winter solstice - the shortest day of the year when the sum begins to regain its strength. Yule festivities included the slaughtering of pigs and the burning of giant yule logs. The Celtic culture of the British Isles revered all evergreen plants, but particularly mistletoe and holly. Because they could flourish in harsh winter these plants became important symbols of fertility and healing, and were used for decorating homes and altars.

The Roman festival of Saturnalia, in honour of Saturn, their god of agriculture, lasted for seven days and also included the winter solstice, which usually occurred around December 25 on the ancient Julian calendar. During Saturnalia the Romans feasted lavishly, postponed all business and warfare, exchanged gifts, and temporarily freed their slaves. "The Birth of the Unconquerable Sun" was celebrated, as the days gradually lengthened and the sum began to regain its

Saturnalia was considered a fun and festive time for the Romans, but Christians believed it an abomination to honour such a pagam god. The early converts wanted to maintain the birthday of their Christ Child as a solemn and religious holiday....not one of merriment and Saturnelian debauchery

So it seems that the first recorded observance of the 25th December as the birth of Christ, proclaimed by Pope Julius I in about 350AD, was primarily a political decision and an astute one at that. The 25th seems to have been chosen by the Church hierarchy to compete against the pagan festivals held in December. The 25th was an important date not only to the Romans, but also to the Persians whose religion of Mithraism was one of Christianity's contemporary rivals.

In time, the Christian Church would be successful in removing the merriment, lights and gifts from the pagan festivals and transferring them to the celebration of a Christian Christmas - but not without a few setbacks: along the way. Cromwell banned Christmas, the puritans hated it, and the celebration as we know it never really took off in England until the mid-19th century,, thanks in no small part to Dicken's "A Christmas Carol(" (1843)).

Congratulations to Kit Zellerbach, the winner of our Outpost Christmas Art competition, and thanks to all the artists who submitted work. We'll try to feature as many as possible in forthcoming issues. There's one work in particular that may have to wait until next October before it sees the light of day again . . . bruahahhaa!



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Letter from the Chair



Dear Members,

It was a busy time 'behind the scenes' at the Club last month, with the awarding of the Project Management and Design and Construction tenders for the new Clubhouse facilities; the commencement of interior designs for the new facilities; and also a tender for some new Club branding and communication tools.

Club Image, Branding & Communication Materials

Over the past 60 years or so, the Club has developed, independently of each other, a variety of logos, club colours, typefaces and promotional materials with no consistency in the approach. As examples, sometimes our logo appears with the name curved and sometimes straight; sometimes the name is given as 'British Club' sometimes 'The British Club', and often 'The British Club Bangkok'. Sometimes the logo appears with the 'shield' and sometimes without. As members are no doubt aware, there are also a variety of different typefaces being used for materials varying from brochures, application forms, menus, letterheads, business cards, advertisements etc; and often in a range of different colours and styles.

In short, there is no clear brand positioning for the Club (in fact it is inconsistent and confusing) or any design strategy or style guide and so the GC felt it was time to rectify this. We felt that our branding and communication tools do not help to sell the Club either to existing or prospective members. Last month therefore, having reviewed the Club's existing collateral, logo designs, ads, website, and emails etc, we put the 'communications' brief out to tender. The scope of work includes the establishment of a clear image and brand positioning for the Club, a harmonised design strategy and style guide (common branding for logo, colours, typeface etc) and designs and artwork for a wide range of literature and communication tools, including

electronic media.

The tender was awarded last month to Liquid Branding and requires all design work to be copyrighted to the club in a format that management can easily turn into promotional material, signage, etc. The new branding and communications tools will be launched to coincide with our new look Clubhouse facilities.

Club Development Phase 1

Having awarded the interior design tender for our new Clubhouse facilities to Profile Interiors Co Ltd, members of the DRSC met with them last month along with our Project Manager, Tim Newth, from Thomson Brandtman, to agree on our working methodology; to review the design brief; and to discuss draft concepts for the new facilities. At the time of writing, the team from Profile were preparing concept & mood boards for each of the facilities for members to review. These should be on display in the Snooker Room by early December. Please take some time to look at the boards and communicate any views you may have directly to Simon Roberts at CEO@britishclubbangkok.org For ongoing information regarding the progress of the project please be sure to check the Development Notice board in the Clubhouse.

Membership Software programme

The upgraded Club Membership programme is now up and running and has taken a large amount of time and effort by our supplier NSA, as well as Club Management and staff, in placing new data into the database and constantly testing and fine-tuning the upgraded programme. As a result, there is now a great deal of data available, which is already providing management with valuable information. The next step is the implementation of a Point of Sale system, which we hope will be in place early next year.

Finally, it seems impossible that we are now at the end of the year and already preparing for the festive season. I do hope you and your family will join in the many events organised by the Club this month and I wish you all a safe and very happy holiday.

Another month has flown by and we are hurtling towards the busy festive season. I hope you have booked your Christmas parties and your Christmas orders with us at the BC.



'Pirates' a Rollicking Success





I don't know whether it was the 19th century setting, the cosy century-old venue, or one too many glasses of red wine, but this really did have the feel of a British Outpost in a far off land, where the locals can still put on a jolly good show!

A pity, yes, that more people couldn't have seen it. but the 'intimate' environment of the Suriwonsge Room really did transform this from just another stage production with distant players, to a wonderfully atmospheric and intense experience you could see the spots on the giggling spotty-faced ladies, you could hear the muttering of the plotting pirates as they sneaked through the audience, you could see the beads of sweat on the face of the Major-General as he wormed his way out of a tight situation and you could hear the marvellous voices and harmonies without artificial sound amplification . . . Although the band seemed to be more out of the room than in, the drummer's position in the

corridor definitely gave more punch to the bass drum!

Whether you're a frequent show-goer or a firsttimer, the funnier and lighter 'Joseph Papp' version of 'Pirates' is appealing for its easy flow and comedic impetus. Sure, there'll always be a few purist opera buffs who will turn up their toffy noses at what they disparagingly term 'light opera', but there's no doubt about the wide ranging appeal not only of the Gilbert & Sullivan favourites, but also the intelligent 'modern' treatments they are receiving. The original G&S is enhanced - the clever lyrics are still clever, the catchy tunes (keep humming them interminably) and glorious silliness remain. Where can I go to get this silly smile removed - it's still there from the last performance!

There were many British Club members involved in the show, some recognisable, others not; but in addition to various members of the cast and crew, the Director, the Producer and the Musical Director are all British Club members. Well done to all those who worked so hard on making this production such a success.

It was the same when we first talked about last year's Bed Push carnival parade ending at the British Club – he agreed without hesitation little realising that around 1,000 people and 45 decorated beds would descend upon the Club for the "Party of all Parties" ... and, of course, it was a brilliant night!

tam, sticky rice and Thai noodle soup ... in addition to three types of Phad Thai, and sticky rice and a selection of Thai deserts for a very reasonable price.

The British Club were not alone in their generous support – the BNH Hospital who I work for agreed to be a cash sponsor and to reserve 10 tickets and the Siam Society agreed to give a discount on their hire charge.

The event took place on Wednesday, 25th October and was a great success. As well as being a fund raising event it was a chance for PECF to thank an American ophthalmologist, Dr John Haines, and a group of his colleagues and friends who had travelled to Thailand to help the PECF with cataract surgeries on two of their eye clinic missions to Chiang Rai province and Samui earlier in the month.

134 people and 5 children came along to enjoy the special atmosphere that Barry and his team created. In the flyer the venue for the event was described as the 'enchanting gardens of the Siam Society' and these words came true thanks to the creative skills of the British Club – there were twinkley lights in abundance!

Entertainment throughout the evening was provided by musicians and signers from the School for the Blind and pretty girls put on a display of Thai classical and folk dancing. Two of the blind girls had beautiful solo voices and the band who played later





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in the evening could turn out a good version of a range of latest pop songs and a few oldies specially requested by John Miller and his wife Ghazalah who had flown in from England earlier in the day. Khun Ting who organises the talented School for the Blind youngsters also brought 5 blind masseurs who were guided around by their helpers to give neck and shoulder massages to anyone who was sitting down. Looking around I could see their strong thumbs were greatly appreciated.

After the American team arrived Dr Somsran Watanachote, one of the founder members of the PECF and still a driving force behind the work the foundation does, stood up to introduce the team and then guest-of-honour, H.E. Mr Ralph Boyce, Ambassador for the United States of America, presented each volunteer with a thank-you certificate and small gift from the PECF.

Later in the evening Dr Somsran showed a short movie of two eye mission trips that Dr Haines and his team had joined. It was interesting to see the work these people do and moving to see the smiles of gratitude on the faces of the people they had helped to see again.

The evening had a very informal feeling to it with people sitting around chatting inside and outside the weather was perfect - no rain and a slight breeze - it was a lovely balmy tropical evening. The food was delicious and plentiful, all the better for the good beer and wine that accompanied it.

The Phad Thai "Pad-a-Thai-Eye-Party" was a lovely occasion for many of the Thai doctors, nurses and other volunteers of the PECF to get together and relax in a non-work situation and a chance for them to meet with members of the Thai and international communities who were interested in supporting their cause.

Thanks to the generosity of the British Club, the BNH Hospital and the Siam Society the event raised 130,000 baht, which has been donated to the PECF to help provide cataract operations in the future. Barry has agreed to join me on a trip in the New Year when the donation is formally handed over. I am sure he will have an exciting story to tell on his return!



Irish Coffee



1 oz Jameson Irish Whiskey 1/2 oz Kahlua 2 bar spoons brown sugar 1 cup black hot coffee whipped cream

Pour in Jameson Irish Whiskey, burn with brown sugar around rim of glass until sugar becomes caramel then pour in black coffee, top up with whipped cream and kahlua.

Irish Coffee has its origins in 1942, when the chef of the restaurant at Foynes Airport in the South West of Ireland, Joe Sheridan, served the first Irish Coffee to some passengers. Sheridan noticed that passengers would often come in cold and miserable after a grueling 18-hour trip across the Atlantic by flying boat. Sheridan's efforts to 'warm them up' led to the creation of the first Irish Coffee, the recipe for which is described by the inventor:

"Cream as rich as an Irish brogue; coffee as strong as a friendly hand; sugar sweet as the tongue of a rogue; and whiskey smooth as the wit of the land."

Gaeng Kiew Wan Gai (Thai Green Chicken Curry)

Ingredients:



		THE RESIDENCE OF THE
Chicken meat or bone in, cut up	150	grms
Coconut milk (or Coconut Cream)	2	cup
Kiew Wan Curry Paste	1	Tbsp.
Palm Sugar	2	Tsp.
Fish sauce	1-3	Tsp.
Kaffir Lime Leaves, torn	3-4	leaves
Red chili peppers, sliced on a bias	3-4	each
Solanum torvum (Makua Pung),		
Crisp egg plant (Makua Proh), quatered	5	each

Directions:

- Place a pot on the stove and bring coconut milk to a boil and reduce heat.
- 2. The coconut milk will start having sheen on the surface, which means that the coconut fat is beginning to separate from the coconut milk. At this time add the curry paste and spread and stir to cook over medium heat until the curry paste is cooked and fragrant. Do not use too high a heat.
- Add the chicken pieces into the paste and stir to cook.
- 4. Bring the liquid to boil and boil until the chicken is cooked. Adjust seasoning of the cooked curry with fish sauce and palm sugar. Then add the eggplant, cook one more minute and add the sliced chili peppers and basil leaves. Stir and take the curry off heat. Serve with steamed rice.

Tips:

Thai basil leaves, picked

Chicken stock, optional

A. The difference between coconut milk and coconut cream is that coconut cream has more fat than coconut milk. Visually the cream will be thicker than the milk. If you bought coconut milk in a can or UHT carton, the coconut cream floats on top of the container and the milk is on the bottom of the container.

1/2 cup as needed

- **B.** If you use chicken with bones in, the curry will taste better and naturally sweeter from the blood in the bones.
- **C.** Chicken stock can be added if the curry is too rich but remember to adjust the seasonings accordingly.



Cocktail of the Month - December

Bloody Cranberry

1 oz Vodka

Peach liqueur 1/2 OZ 1 1/2 OZ Lime juice Cranberry Juice

Shake all ingredients, pour into fancy glass

Cooking your **Christmas turkey** to perfection . . .


There's a lot of tears on Christmas Day because, quite frankly, turkey is the hardest meat to cook to perfection. All I can suggest is to do as much as possible the day before and try to get your timings right. It's worth taking 5 minutes to write a plan, working back from sitting down to the perfect Christmas meal, to what you can get done the day before.

Let's start with the stuffing. Fry the onions and bacon gently in the olive oil and butter for 4 minutes. Now add the fennel seeds, which I bash first in a tea towel with a rolling pin to crack them. Add the sage, crumble in the chestnuts, add a little seasoning and cook for a further 3 minutes, on a medium heat, until the ingredients have all flavoured each other. Season to taste. Pour it out onto a tray to cool quickly. Once it's at room temperature, pop it into the fridge until chilled. Put the stuffing mixture back in a bowl, add the sausage meat and egg and mix together. Add the bread crumbs to lighten and bind. The mixture should hold together but not be sloppy. Place the stuffing in an ovenproof dish and cook for about 45 minutes or until cooked thoroughly.

Preheat your oven to 190°C/375°F/gas 5. Now remove any giblets from the turkey. Rub the inside and outside of the turkey with salt, tucking the skin under to make it look nice.

Cover the turkey loosely in aluminium foil and place in the oven for 3 hours. Feel free to baste whenever you like after the first 30 minutes. For the final 50 minutes of cooking, remove the foil so the skin can crisp up nicely. At the same time, scatter your chipolatas, parboiled potatoes and bacon into another roasting tray and use some of the turkey fat to coat well. Once the turkey's done, take it out of the oven, put it onto a plate and, most importantly, let it rest for at least 30 minutes before carving. During resting, you have time to do your vegetables and make the gravy.

To make the gravy, skim off most of the fat, put the roasting tray onto the bob at a low heat to simmer, and stir in a good tablespoon of flour.



Keep stirring until thickened. After about a minute, add a pint of chicken or turkey stock, a little to start with, until it's all mixed together. Bring to the boil and simmer until it coats the back of a spoon.

Serve the turkey with the stuffing and the gravy, along with your choice of vegetables.

for the stuffing . . .

- 2 red onions, peeled and finely chopped
- 2 rashers streaky bacon, chopped
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 25g butter
- 1 tablespoon fennel seeds
- a small bunch of fresh sage, leaves picked and chopped
- 150g tin chestnuts, drained, or even better, 1 pack vacuum packed chestnuts
- 500g sausage meat
- 1 large free-range or organic egg, beaten
- around 200g fresh breadcrumbs
- sea salt and freshly ground black pepper for seasoning

for the turkey

- 4.5kg fresh turkey
- 8 chipolata sausages
- parboiled potatoes, for roasting
- 8 rashers of streaky, smoked bacon



A Fiery Night (and no rain)





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




he good news . . .it didn't rain. In fact the weather was perfect. Was it really a year ago that we were swimming in mud on the back lawn?!!







Wine Tasting



A SLIGHT REVISION TO BYLAWS!

Preamble

Following on from the General Committee meeting held on $1^{\rm st}$ November, the General Committee give notice of the following by-law changes.

BYLAWS

1, 6, 8, 10, 12, 13, 18, 21, 22, 23, 25, 26, 30 and 31.

CHANGE

That in all cases when a bylaw refers to 'the General Manager' or 'the General Manager of the Club', the bylaw is amended to read 'the Club Management'.

RATIONALE

When the current Bylaw review was undertaken in April/May of this year it was envisaged that the three tiers of Club Management would be Executive General Manager, General Manager Operations and Deputy General Manager - thus there was no need to update any bylaw reference to 'General Manager'. In fact we recruited a Chief Executive Officer thus warranting a change to the above bylaws.

If you wish to discuss the new Bylaws please feel free to use the BCB Forum or contact any member of the General Committee.

These changes to the Bylaws will be in full effect from mid-December 2006.

Recent amendments to

he Immigration Bureau has introduced a number of changes to the visa regulations with effect from 1 October 2006 which may potentially affect members of the British Club. Some of these amendments include: -

1. Tourist Visa Exemption.

Passport holders from 39 exempted countries, including Australia, Canada, New Zealand and the United Kingdom, are permitted to enter Thailand without a visa and to remain in the Kingdom for up to 30 days per visit. A number of visitors from these countries have lived in Thailand for several years by making a "visa run" to a border checkpoint at the end of each 30 day period, where they have crossed the border and re-entered Thailand for a further 30 days.

In accordance with the new regulations, passport holders from these 39 countries are now permitted to enter Thailand for no more than three visits or a total of 90 days within a six month period, calculated from the date of first entry, after which they will not be permitted to re-enter the Kingdom for a period of 90 days.

At this stage it is not clear as to how this regulation will be applied to foreigners from these 39 countries who visit Thailand for regular short visits i.e. as to whether these individuals will only be allowed to enter Thailand three times and then be unable to return for a further 90 days even if they have only remained in Thailand for one or two days per visit.

The Tourist Visa Exemption should not be confused with the 'Visa on Arrival' or 'Transit Visa', the rules for which have remained unchanged so far. Visa on Arrival applies to 20 countries (including China, India and Taiwan) whose nationals may be granted 15-day visas upon arrival in Thailand, on payment of a Visa fee. Transit Visas exist for on-bound travellers, sportsmen and those in charge of air/ship crews and are of 3, 15 or 30 days duration depending on the type of application.

2. Applications for Category B non-immigrant visas.

Applicants for Non-Immigrant Category B visas at Royal Thai Embassies and Consulates overseas are now required to provide considerably more documentation to support their application. This includes all of the corporate documents of the corporate sponsor in Thailand (including business registration, affidavit, list of shareholders, audited financial statements, corporate income tax returns, list of foreigners employed by the company, company profile and map).

In addition, the applicant must provide a "Letter of Acceptance" from the Ministry of Labour and Social Welfare, Alien Occupational Control

Division, Department of Employment, a new document which was not previously required. This should be obtained by the employing company located in Thailand prior to the proposed employee submitting his/her application for a Non-Immigrant Category B visa.

In order to encourage holders of Non-Immigrant Category B visas to apply for a Thai work permit within 90 days of entering Thailand, Royal Thai embassies and consulates abroad have been instructed not to issue more than one single-entry visa of this category.

Since the requirements of specific embassies/ consulates may vary and change at relatively short notice, applicants should check the detailed requirements of the embassy/consulate at which they intend to submit their visa application prior to travelling.

3. Extension of Non-Immigrant Category B visas.

The Immigration Bureau has introduced new requirements for foreigners applying for an extension of their Non-Immigrant Category B visa, including: -

- The employing company must submit its most recent annual audited financial statements plus the annual corporate income tax return and the related Revenue Department receipt.
- The understanding is that this includes applicants who are employed by a newly established company, although this may currently be under review.
- The audited financial statements should indicate that the Company's revenues during the year were sufficient to pay the salaries and allowances of all its employees, including foreigners.
- The shareholder's equity in the balance sheet of the Company must not be less than THB 1 million.

4. Investment visas.

The THB 3 million investment visa has been withdrawn for new applicants with effect from 1 October, 2006 onwards.

Existing extensions and those applications which are already "under consideration" will continue to be renewed.

5. Retirement visas.

Applicants wishing to extend their retirement visas are now required to provide evidence of having at least THB 800,000 in their bank

account for the previous ninety days prior to lodging their application. Prior to 1 October, 2006, applicants were only required to provide evidence of having at least THB 800,000 in their account as at the date of applying for the extension of their visa.

Applicants for a retirement visa who have a Thai spouse are required to provide evidence of having THB 400,000 in their account.

6. Visa extensions for foreigners working for Charities and Foundations.

For foreigners wishing to apply for an extension of visa to work for a public charity, private foreign organization, foundation, association, Foreign Chamber of Commerce, Thailand Board of Trade or Thailand Federation of Industries, a confirmation letter is required from the chief government officer (Grade 10 or equivalent and higher) who deals with that organisation. In the absence of this confirmation letter, the visa may only be approved for a period of not more than 90 days at a time.

7. Three Year Non-Immigrant "B" Visa.

Ministerial Regulation No. 28 (B.E. 2549) issued by the Ministry of Interior on 22 March, 2006, which has been implemented by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs from September 2006 has introduced a new three year Non-Immigrant B visa, which may be granted to foreigners who wish to conduct business (not to work) in Thailand. The applicants for this type of visa must be a businessman who runs a business in the country where the application is submitted and documents to verify the applicant's status are required.

The visa is valid for multiple entries during the three year period and the holder may therefore visit Thailand as often as required during the three year validity period so long as they do not stay for more than 90 days during each visit. It is not possible to extend this visa at the Immigration Bureau and the holder is not permitted to obtain a work permit in Thailand. In the event that a work permit is issued by the Department of Employment, the Immigration Bureau may cancel the Three Year Non-Immigrant "B" Visa.

A fee of approximately THB 10,000 is payable (depending on exchange rates applied to local currency) and in addition to the evidence of the status of the applicant, the Royal Thai Embassy/ Consulate will require a full set of the corporate documents of the associated partners/ companies in Thailand and copies of correspondence with business partners in Thailand.

This type of visa is particularly relevant to nonresident directors who are required to visit their Thai subsidiaries/partners on a regular basis and full details are available on the websites of the Royal Thai Embassies in London and Vancouver.

The above represents an outline of the new regulations for guidance only and it is noted that the impact of the new regulations may be reviewed and revised on an ongoing basis. Members are advised to consult with their professional advisors or with Immigration prior to lodging their applications.





Have you ever seen those old tennis matches they show on ESPN? You should, if possible, find a copy of the 1975 Wimbledon Tournament, Ashe's finest year in the game. Watch the flawless movement of his serve. One element of a great serve is the continuous and uninterrupted flow of your body filled with energy to strike the ball. Practice your serve to be a single mechanical movement aiming to strike the ball at the zenith of the toss; fluidity of movement is what gives you consistency on the serve.


Oh, back to Arthur Ashe, what a guy! He believed in what he preached. I know that for a fact. I was lucky enough to meet him on November 1, 1984 when he came to Mexico

to watch a juniors' tennis tournament. He looked at the bunch of us and said "never underestimate your opponent, always respect the game, and always play as if it was the last point"; I have never forgotten those words and his presence on the court that day.

He stood for more than just flawless tennis and a fluid serve; he really did go for more than winning or losing, and in case you don't know some of his accomplishments I found this in his Official Website:

- Arthur graduated 1st in his class in high school
- Arthur is the only black male tennis player to win Wimbledon (1975) and the U.S. Open (1968).
- Ashe had over 800 wins in his amazing career on the tennis courts.
- Received honorary doctorates from numerous higher institutions during his lifetime - from Dartmouth College, LeMoyne-Owen College, Princeton University, Saint John's University, Trinity University, Hartford College, and Virginia Union University.
- A total of 11,000 people attended his funeral in Richmond and his memorial service in New York City.

- Spotted the talents of Yannick Noah while on a three-week, goodwill tour of Africa in 1971, and arranged for Noah to be sent to France to further develop his game. Yannick Noah went on to win the French Open, a Grand Slam event.
- Served in the US Army from 1966-1968, during which time he became First Lieutenant.
- The centerpiece of a \$254 million expansion of the National Tennis Center in Flushing, N.Y., Arthur Ashe Stadium hosted its first U.S. Open in 1997. The U.S. Tennis Association announced the stadium's name at a February 1997 press conference. With 23,000 seats, the stadium towers over neighboring Louis Armstrong Stadium, the setting for the finals from 1978-96. Previously, the Open was played at the West Side Tennis Club in nearby Forest Hills, N.Y.
- First African-American ever picked for US Davis Cup team (1963)
- Received the 1964 Johnston Award, a prestigious honor awarded annually to the American tennis player who contributes the most to the growth of the sport while exhibiting good sportsmanship and character.
- Won NCAA individual and team (UCLA) championships (1965)
- Won three Grand Slam singles titles: 1968 US Open, 1970 Australian Open, and 1975 Wimbledon, during a 10-year playing career (1969 - 1979)
- Elected as President of ATP (Association of Tennis Professionals) in 1974.
- First (and only) African-American to be ranked #1 tennis player in the world.
- Selected as captain of Davis Cup team in 1981.
- Inducted into the Tennis Hall of Fame in 1985.
- Named Sport Illustrated 1992 Sportsman of the
- Presidential Medal of Freedom Recipient.

The Casino de Madrid

he Casino de Madrid occupies a magnificent fivestorey building in the city centre, very close to Madrid's best shops and theatres. At the Club's formation in 1837 the founding members chose the name 'Casino', used for the first time in Spain, 'to distance the group from any political connotation'.

The Club's purpose-built and architecturally distinguished building was completed in 1910 (the same year as the BC

Clubhouse) and retains much of its early 20th century opulence.

In addition to its urban setting, the Casino de Madrid now includes a country club, just outside Madrid, which offers an 18-hole golf course and extensive sporting facilities.

Club amenities include: Two restaurants, 2 bars, conference hall, 3 events halls (seat 150-500 people), 3 function rooms, 4 small private rooms, large 'neo-gothic' library, reading room, meeting room, games room, billiards room,


