



#### The Amazing Mrs Beeton

In this White Christmas issue of Outpost you will find, on page 26, an original recipe for Christmas Plum Pudding taken from Mrs Beeton's famous Book of Household Management, 1923 edition. To most people who have read anything from her books, Mrs Beeton comes across as a bustling middleaged matron, rather like Mrs Bridges from the 1970s TV series Upstairs, Downstairs. But the real Isabella Beeton never made it to middle age. Her somewhat frenetic life was short and tragic - ruined by diseases that are today cleared up with a simple course of antibiotics. She compiled her big book between the ages of 21 and 25 and was dead by 28.

The daughter of an upwardly mobile printer and the eldest of 21 children, Isabella had married - against her parents' wishes - the dashing and feckless Sam Beeton, a struggling publisher. Sam saw a market niche in the swelling ranks of the lower middle classes, for which he created inexpensive periodicals like The Englishwoman's Domestic Magazine. After their first child died he suggested that his young wife became the cookery writer. Mrs. Beeton took over the Cooking, Pickling and Preserving column and started a new column, The Nursery. These evolved into a series of pamphlets and finally a fully-fledged reference work, The Book of Household Management, which was published in 1861.

But how did she come to write the seminal book? She knew next to nothing about cooking or running a household. She lived not in a grand townhouse or country manor, but in a semi on a new estate in Pinner (near Harrow). The answer is she copied everything! She plagiarized a wide range of works going back to the Restoration, but her skill was in finding, organizing and re-presenting the material. What made the whole greater than the sum of its mostly stolen parts was the tone and the point of view. Isabella Beeton was born to organize. She visualized the well-run household as a whirring machine, and in crisp, unadorned English she presented the task of running it as something akin to a profession.

Isabella was never to know the magnitude of her success and iconic status as the world's first domestic goddess. After a series of miscarriages and child deaths she herself died of childbed fever shortly after giving birth to the second of her surviving children. In her biography The Short Life and Long Times of Mrs. Beeton, Kathryn Hughes argues that Mrs Beeton was "almost certainly" one of the thousands of young middle-class Victorian women who was infected on her honeymoon with syphilis. Apart from killing all her children but two, it eventually killed her husband at the age of 47.

The fact of her death was kept quiet - it would be foolish to let readers know that the woman they turned to for advice on everything from a chesty cough to a light sponge cake had failed to create a nurturing domestic environment for herself. As more and more spin-offs from the big book appeared on the market, of course it made complete commercial sense to let readers think that she was alive, well, and busy cooking up a storm in her increasingly iconic kitchen.

## CHRISTMAS CRAFTS

## Reindeer Treat Pots

#### You'll need:

- Scissors
- Craft glue, glue stick or glue dots
- Terracotta clay pots; 5-12cm
- Plastic eyes
- Red pom-poms (glitter pom-poms are a fun addition!)
- Three shades of brown craft foam, cardstock paper or construction paper; we combined all three to make our reindeer family.



2 antlers 2 large ears 2 small ears 2 eyes one red nose



#### How to Make It:

First, with one shade of brown, cut the antlers to match the size of your pot. If you are making the larger reindeer, use a child's handprint as a pattern. Then, cut the ears with the other brown. We used a lighter shade of brown to add yet another layer to the ears but that's not necessary. Attach they ears to the back of the pot. Then add the antlers. Glue the eyes and nose to the front. Fill the pot with candy, nuts or other goodies. It's that simple!

Made of pasta, these holiday candles will cast a warm glow that won't blow out.

#### Craft materials:

- Manicotti shells
- Jumbo pasta shells
- Lasagne noodle
- Acrylic paints and brushes
- Green glitter glue
- Cardboard egg carton
- Craft knife
- Hot glue

#### Time needed: Under 1 Hour

- 1. To create the candlesticks and flames, use acrylic paints to colour three manicotti pastas red and three jumbo pasta shells yellow. Next, make holly leaves by gently breaking a curly lasagne noodle into small pieces and then coating them with green glitter glue.
- 2. While the paint and glue dry, fashion a holder for the candles from a cardboard egg carton by cutting off three of the cups that make up one of the corners (leave the cups attached to one another).
- 3. Turn the trio upside down and use a craft knife (adults only) to cut off the bottoms of the cups. Paint the holder white. Now fit the ends of the candlesticks into the cups and apply hot glue (again, adults only) to secure them. Then, glue the flames onto the tops of the candlesticks.
- 4. For each candle, glue together three holly leaves and a couple of red bead berries. Then glue the clusters to the holder at the bases of the candles.

## **Fin Can** Santa

#### What you'll need:

- 1 empty, clean metal can
- white, peach and pink acrylic paint
- medium pink pom-pom
- 2 small wiggle eyes
- cotton balls
- 6-8 medium white or silver sparkle pom-poms
- 1 sheet of red glitter felt
- 5cm wide x 20cm long strip of white glitter felt
- white craft glue
- hot glue gun

#### How to make it:

- 1. Paint entire aluminium can with white paint.
- 2. Paint a section in the front of the can peach (or whatever skin tone colour you like) for the face.
- 3. Take one cotton ball and stretch it out so that fits all the way around the rim of the can. Glue in place about 1cm below the rim. This is Santa's hair.
- 4. Lay the strip of white glitter felt on the table. With hot glue gun, fold over edges and tack in place on both sides. This will create a thick and smooth brim for Santa's hat that will not show any uneven cutting lines. Set aside.
- 5. Position the red glitter felt around the top of the can, above the hair (stretched cotton ball). Glue in place and let dry. You will finish Santa's red hat in a later step.
- 6. Meanwhile, glue the white felt in place over the top of the red felt and the cotton to form the brim of Santa's hat.
- 7. Using white craft glue, add Santa's beard by gluing cotton balls all around the can, leaving enough room open for his face.
- 8. To complete Santa's red hat, tuck the red felt into a cone shape, using hot glue to tack in place if you like. Fold felt over the side of the can and hot glue to the side.
- 9. Hot glue the silver or white glitter pom-poms to the end of the red felt.
- 10. Use an extra cotton ball to dab on the cheeks, using a small amount of pink paint.
- 11. Glue the pink pom-pom on for the nose.
- 12. Glue wiggle eyes in place.



## Guy Fawkes goes off with a BANG!





## Haunted Halloween Party


Halloween took place three days early this year down at the Club, on Sunday October  $28^{\rm th}$ , and over 100 children and parents attended this spooky affair.


At 1pm we closed for an hour to clean up the room and then re-opened to show a family movie, along with free casper cake, more ice cream and yet more Fanta.

the grated rind of a 1 lemon




#### **Basic Method:**



France and South Africa, among which was an interesting wine called Rhino Park where money raised from the wine sales goes to help fund rhino



ON FOOT FAULTS: In response to a complaint from a disgruntled, longtime BC member, here's some basic info on foot faulting for the average player. Unless you are willing to run the risk of spoiling what is supposed to be a pleasant game of social tennis with friends and/or long-time opponents and partners, DO NOT call foot faults. This advice comes to you after some "serious" online investigation and with input from club players around the world. However, tournaments that involve rankings, money, etc, are a different matter, and it's usually up to the referee or umpire, if there is one, to make the call. A warning is always given in advance. But basically, our advice is to relax, have fun and remember that if your opponent is foot faulting, he or she probably isn't benefiting from it anyway so you're better off leaving well enough alone....

#### Here are the rules concerning foot faults:

The server must stand behind the baseline, between the centre mark and the sideline.

A 'foot fault' is called if any of the following happens before the ball is struck:

- The feet touch the ground inside the baseline,
- The feet touch the wrong side of the centre mark OR
- The feet touch the wrong side of the imaginary extension of the sideline.

A foot fault is the same as a fault on a serve so the player is given the chance of a second serve.





## **Bangkok Mixed Doubles Invitational Tennis Tournament**

#### TOURNAMENT REPORT

The 8th Annual Invitational Mixed Doubles Tournament was held at the Asia Tennis Academy at Mung Thon Thani. The entire event was organized, sponsored and hosted by long time tennis fanatics, BC Club members and many times BC tennis champions, Khun Surin and Chalathip Dunnvatanachit.

As in previous years, the event proved to be outstanding in every respect, from choice of venue, quality of tennis played and the continuing generosity of our hosts in providing prodigious amounts of food and drink throughout the day for all players and their supporters. # H'S CORNER By Marcel Petit

Different Strokes (I mean, Balls) For Different Folks" could almost be the title of this column which is all about emoying the game of tennis from the moment you pick up a racket. Remember when you were a beginner and ball seemed to come at you too fast, or bounce too high, or seem too heavy to hit back?

These are some of the issues we can no longer ignore and which we should think about. In order to thrive on be court, we have to take differences between players and levels into account. We all have different potential, afferent desires. To each his tennis, and TO EACH, HIS OWN BALL!

Did you start skiing on an expert slope? Did you learn to swim in deep water? No, I don't think so, and in any asse, I hope not, for your sake...

And yet in tennis, situations such as these are often the norm. I am a beginner and I start off with a standard s ball; it's heavy and there's quite an unpleasant feeling when I hit it. The ball bounces quite high and I can't swing properly ...and I have the feeling I'm always late.

There exist, however, different types of tennis balls, that allow both young and old - and in accordance with so her physical and visual abilities, to begin to hit the ball right off the bat, in other words, to start rallying and taking fun with a partner.

In my opinion, the notion of "evolution" is of the utmost importance. I learn to ski on beginners' slopes, and moressively, I make my way towards steeper ones, ones with moguls, etc.

#### WE SHOULD APPLY THE SAME PRINCIPLE IN TENNIS USING DIFFERENT KINDS OF TENNIS BALLS.

We have balls for beginners, intermediates and expert players: let's use them!

Looking left to right: the straw ball, the foam ball, the "mini tennis" ball, the "intermediate" ball and the last one, on the right, which you all will recognize: the classic yellow ball.



Each of these balls differs in pressure, diameter and weight; each is a teaching tool that allows players to rally right from the start and to hit the ball getting a pleasant sensation; each one allows players to work on mastering the basics.

In 1998, as Athletic Director of a tennis academy that had more than 500 children and 300 adults, I used these different balls and was able to note that on every level – from beginner to advanced player – everybody had more fun and made more substantial progress than had they played with the classic yellow ball. We saw tennis "differently."





We also tested the mini tennis ball and the intermediate ball with ATP players ranked in the top 300, as well as with young French hopefuls ETA and ITF, and we noted important results in games played in the service box, and with regard to stroke adjustments that we had trouble teaching using regular balls.

In France, tournaments for the 7-8 age group are played with mini balls, and for the 9-year-olds, with intermediate balls. This allows our young players to learn through rallying and to better master their strokes – which of course, is the key to longevity in tennis (injury prevention).






The Club has a dress code applicable at all times for members and guests. The minimum standard of dress in the clubhouse is informal business attire - strictly no denim or t-shirts.

## **Behavioral Training**

"Behavioral Training" is a hot topic in the Organizational Development world right now. With the shortage of people with management skills and leadership talents, organizations are finding that they must develop their own talents internally. Of course, as pointed out in the October 1, 2007 issue of Fortune Magazine, this is not a new trend in many leading companies in the world.

Behavioral training is based on the principles found by behavioral psychologists in studying behaviors and how they affect people. Behavioral training is intended to help people modify their behaviors. Just as skills are knowledge based, behaviors are typically experience based. People act in a certain way because of their previous experience, as well as antecedents (what leads to the behavior) and consequences (what occurs because of the behavior).

So, how do we train behaviors?

Well, the first step is to identify what behaviors you want to train. In very observable, measurable terms. For example, let's say you want to increase teamwork within your sales team. What observable, measurable things would show that? How about an increase in sales filed for split or team commission?

Next, we have to make sure that antecedents and consequences in the business place support the behaviors we want. If our sales commission system encourages single sales and creates a competitive atmosphere between sales people, then it will be very difficult for any training to have an effect on increasing teamwork.

OK, we've got a targeted behavior. We've got antecedents and consequences that support that behavior. We have a group of willing participants who are open to modifying their behavior and who recognize what is in it for them. Now, we're ready to deliver training that provides them with an experience that shows them the value of the new behavior. Active training that allows them to experience what is in for them and let's them internalize the lessons.

Are we done? Not at all. Behavior modification requires follow-up, reinforcement and positive consequences. To successfully have behavioral training "take", we need to follow-up with those participants, help them through rough spots, encourage them, coach them, give them positive reinforcement and most importantly, they must experience positive consequences to their new behavior in the workplace.
