



LETTER FROM THE ACTING GM



Dear Members.

It has been a difficult and confusing month for most of us as we try to understand the changing nature of the flood threats and deal with the impact to our homes and work places. Some locations are still dry and some a metre or more underwater, but everyone has been affected in some way, through school closures, food shortages, cancellations or business losses, over and above the actual flooding of property and roads.

The GC and I feel strongly that in such times the Club should strive to remain open and continue to provide an oasis in the centre of Bangkok, with a full programme of activities as a relaxation from the strains of dealing with these problems. Our staff have been magnificent. Many of them (including myself) have had to leave flooded homes but have chosen to relocate close to the Club and carry on working as normal. We are doing all we can to take care of them. Staff have been allowed to sleep at the Club where necessary (this is normally not allowed) and we have provided meals for them.

We have launched an appeal for flood relief and Members have responded generously, raising over 50,000 baht so far. Some of this will be paid out in immediate assistance to evacuees, and some retained to pay for damage to flooded houses. Please continue to express your support for our hard working staff by contributing to the fund.

Please also support the Club by joining our events or just coming for a drink in the Beer Garden one evening. We are working hard to keep the Club open on a normal footing, and the staff and I take satisfaction in seeing the Club full and Members enjoying themselves.

I would also like to apologize to Members for any problems you may have experienced with our emails. The Club email system has not worked properly for more than a year, and we have employed an ever more complex series of workarounds to try to get mail to you. With the help of Members who are IT professionals, we are now implementing a completely new system, but the legacy of the workarounds is making this difficult. Please bear with us.

Finally, may I take this opportunity of wishing all Members and their families Season's Greetings, and a very happy and prosperous New Year. I look forward to seeing you around the Club.

Please stay safe and dry.



Finding The Right Financial Adviser

Unfortunately, the time you will find out is at a time like this — when markets are at their most volatile, and it is hard to tell what is going to happen next. The last minute deal between

President Obama and Republicans to prevent the USA defaulting by extending its borrowing limits to eye-watering levels has helped to keep the world economy from falling into an abyss.

But a downgrading in the US credit rating, coupled with fears about the economies of Italy and Spain following a second Greece bail out, and major falls in world stock markets means there is plenty of fear in the financial markets at present. Gold, a traditional safe haven when other investments are troubled, has reached a record high of \$1,900 per troy ounce.

Investors are scared, and it is no wonder given the levels of market falls. The MSCI World Index fell more than 5 per cent in a single day on August 8. People are tempted to make snap decisions, to 'sell everything' before they lose it all.

But that would be the wrong thing to do for most people—if you can afford to hold onto your investments, then you will do better to hold your nerve. Selling now would crystallise your losses, but brave investors could improve their lot when the upturn comes by buying more shares when the markets have fallen. You need to have a strong stomach for this strategy.

So, the person you would need to rely on to give you the right information, to help you make the right decisions — which could be to sit tight and do nothing — is your financial adviser. One thing that is for sure, at times like these, you need to know you can trust their judgement.

Finding a good adviser, particularly offshore, is not as easy as it might seem. Yes, you could trawl the internet and find a company that 'tells' you how good it is. But remember, many of these people are salesmen first, advisers second — and what better product to sell than yourself, right?

Not everyone will be lucky enough to get a recommendation for a good adviser, but ideally you should look to use an adviser that is recommended if you can. Ask around, speak to people you work with, those you socialise with at the golf club, the theatre, the gym, or even at your children's school. If that search is fruitless, do your own research, but always com-

pare one adviser with another.

No matter how you find your adviser, you need to make sure you are comfortable with him or her. That means spending some time getting to know them, and asking the right kind of questions. Let me tell you something, there is no such thing as a stupid question, and if the adviser you are talking to makes you think that is not the case, they are not going to be the one for you.



Remember, you need to interview your adviser, after all you are going to be paying him or her to do a job. You need to make sure they are up to it. Find out what you want to know, how long have they been doing this job, are they regulated, and if so who by? What areas are they specialists in? Are they independent, or can they only tell you about the products from a particular company?

Also, what happens if you decide you are unhappy with the advice you are given? What processes are in place to deal with any problems? How often will you be contacted to review your affairs?

If you do not get the answers you want to these questions - and any-

thing else you want to know – then move on to another candidate. You need to 'get on' with your adviser too, so even if you get all the right answers, if you are still not happy, then don't put up with second best. Sometimes, it is simply a gut feeling that makes you feel uncomfortable. If you have that, I would go with it. If something feels wrong, then it probably is.

I can't tell you who is the right adviser for you, all I know is that if you take a bit of time to do your research properly, you will find the right adviser, and it will be someone you can trust to help you through volatile times like these.

We look back at events of 1970 ...

The saga of the second Squash Court took epic proportions in 1970. The year started with an agreed quotation of 131,000 Baht. By March no work had started and the contractor said he now wanted 200,000 Baht. By May they then decided they did not want the work but would sell us the drawing for 12,000 Baht! This was rejected and the whole process of finding a contractor restarted.

In the mean time, to fund the increased costs it was suggested that Squash players be charged a fee to use the Courts of 10 Baht per half hour. By June a new design was ready — in August a tender of 145,000 Baht was accepted with a completion date in October. October came and went, as did November and by 31st December, we still had only the one Squash Court and thus the Squash Section rejected the fees idea.

The Committee suspected all was not well in the Staff House (by the Neilson Hays library) as guests were staying later than 11pm. Regular patrols were undertaken but it was not always easy to realise who was staff so a system of identity discs was issued for ease of reference. I wonder if they were numbered '1', '2', '3' etc?

1970 was the year of "musical rooms" in that first of all we moved the Billiards tables upstairs from the Billiards Room (now the Churchill Bar) to the Rest Room (Silom Room, before the offices took most of the space). We then moved the 'sleeping chairs' from the Rest Room to the Cinema Room (Suriwongse Room) and finally we turned the old Office

recommendations by next meeting.

(The Verandah's dogleg) into an alcove of the 'Main Bar' and added air-conditioning to this section (the main part being done in late 1969) and sealed off the office's door to the corridor.

In July we bade farewell to our then longestserving member of staff being Gardener No.1 – he had started work just ahead of the Japanese entry into the war in 1940, returned after the war and had served us ever since. Members gave him an ex-gratia payment of 20,000 Baht on top of his statutory payment.

In November an Extraordinary General Meeting was held to push through a mass of constitutional changes — four of the most interesting changes were:

- All Members would now have to provide a 500 Baht deposit as unpaid monthly accounts had hit over 100,000 Baht several times during the year.
- The age of when children must take membership was increased from 18 to 21 providing the said child was still in education.
- Guests, resident in Thailand and of British descent, were only permitted to use the Club a maximum of twice in any year.
- The Absent Fee (first introduced in 1947) was changed from a payment upon return to an advance payment.

The only item not passed was one to introduce an Associate Membership – this was respectfully deferred!

The general accommodation problem was discussed at length. Mr. Traugott was asked to post a notice in Thai stating that all visitors to the servants quarters must leave the club promises by ll p.m. each evening.

Messrs Mauritzen and Brownlow to carry out spot check to see that this instruction is being carried out. Also to give consideration to the suggestion that all club staff wear identification discs and to come forward with

CRICKET:



SPORTS CAMP

My first ever Sports Camp was help during late October and I was very happy with the turnout and the enthusiasm all the children showed.

On Monday, Wednesday and Friday we had Tennis, Football, Squash and Swimming at the British Club. On Tuesday and Thursday we went indoor rock climbing, bouldering, iceskating and bowling at Imperial Mall Ladprao.

Climbing as you can see in the photos was done on a tower approximately 8m high. All climbers wear a climbing harness which is tied to a climbing rope. The rope goes from the climber all the way to a secure anchor at the top of the climb and then all the way back down to the belayer. The belayer is the person who makes sure the climber is safe and the rope is kept tight.

Bouldering is a type of rock climbing which does not require a rope. It is usually climbing sideways or up a short way and is more focused on a climbing problem. That is to say how to get from A to B by only using certain holds for your hands and feet.

I anticipate holding a similar Sports Camp over the Christmas/ New Year period and whilst the first Sports Camp was about the kids having fun and giving rock climbing a go, for the second sports camp I'd like to add some focus on how to climb safely and on climbing technique. I also have plans for a climbing and bouldering competition.

Bidding Convention: XY-NT (by Helmer Nissen) Part 1

This convention has been described by Denmark's national player, Lars Blakset, as one of the best improvements to the basic New Minor Forcing — and in my opinion, an incredible aid to your bidding system.

Though the name of this convention might scare you, we are actually talking about a very common situation:

Opener has shown 12-14 HCP and a quite balanced hand. What should South do with a good 5-card ♠ and at least invitational strength? What should South bid with a strong minor support for North?

The elegant solution is to make the following bids artificial:

- 2 Game invitational (about 12hp) - (or to play 2♦)
- 2 Game forcing (about 13 +)
- 2 is a relay to 2♦, and opener must make the relay bid 2♦.

Note that both bids are artificial bids, and must be alerted. Hereafter unshown majors can be bid or three card supports, etc. You bid as cheap as possible.

Example 1



The opener will now bid: Pass, 2NT, 3NT, $3 \spadesuit$ or $4 \spadesuit$.

With a 5-card ♠ and a 4-card ♥ and invitational strength, the bidding would be the same as above, but of course bidding 2♥, instead of 2♠.

This hand most players would also get to game in, without this convention, but I have on many occasions seen players not sure if a rebid 2♥ would be game-forcing or not, therefore bidding 3♥ to be sure that it is, and partner assuming that it shows a 5-card suit because of the jump.

This convention should only be used upon the rebid 1NT (not 2NT), but can easily be used if opponents should interfere with a bid or a take-out-double.
