CRICKET REPORT

The 1973-74 season has proved a highly successful one for the British Club in the Thailand Cricket League.

The under 35 team, led by Neville Atherton, after having overwhelmed John Prices depleted over 35 team in the semi final, went on to defeat Allied Newspapers, in a tense final, by 48 runs.

The initial match saw the younger team rout Nakhon Sawan, thanks to a fine 81 by John Shaw, and then suffer defeat at the hands of the RBSC Cricket Section due mainly to some atrocious fielding and weak bowling.

A good victory over the RBSC Ruggerites saw the team on the way to the trophy.

The senior team deserve a mention also in that they had not suffered a loss until the Semi-final. This match was particularly unfortunate for John in that no less than four of his star players were missing whereas Neville was able to call upon the same players for each match of the series.

In the representative games also British Club players have excelled themselves. The Marshall Trophy was returned to Suriwongse Road after an absence of three years and H.E. British Ambassadors XI, all B.C. players bar two, defeated the Australians by 18 runs.

The annual P.J. Sharma trophy match between H.E. Indian Ambassadors XI and the Rest, again consisting mainly of B.C. players, was a personal triumph for John Dickerson who won the man-of-thematch award. In this two-innings, two day match, the Rest took the honours by 181 runs.

For the under 35's, John Dickerson has had a magnificant season with the bat, culminating in his scintillating knock of 69 in the Hawker Trophy final. Bowling honours go undoubtedly to Ron Newson and Roland Stevens, and to the team in general for a season of exceptionally fine fielding. In short, a very good team, from which no captain could have asked for more.

Next season, it is hoped that the same enthusiasm and keen competition can be maintained, with similar successes.

SWIMMING REPORT

The three British Club swimmers who competed as part of the Thai national team at an international meet in Taiwan on 7 May made an outstanding contribution to the Thai team, winning four firsts, ten seconds and three thirds between them.

Karen Davidson won first places in the 100 metres (m) back, 200 m back and 400 m IM, second in the 200 m butterfly and 100 m free, third in the 200 m free and 100 m fly.

<u>Julia Yetsenga</u> was first in the 200 m breast; second in the 100 m butterfly and 100 m breast; and third in 100 m free.

Haina Taylor was second in the 200 m back, 100 m free, 400 m free, 100 m back, 200 m free and 400 m IM.

Vientiane Meeting

The British Club Swimming Group team came third in an invitational meet among six clubs at Vientiane 18/19 May.

The twenty six strong British Club Team scored a total of 431 points, 120 points behind the host team, the Vientiane American School (45 swimmers) and 84 points ahead of Royal Bangkok Sports Club who fielded thirteen swimmers. Bangkok Aquatic Club (75 swimmers) were first with 999 points.

The British Club excelled in the relays winning seven of the eighteen they contested and gaining three seconds and five thirds.

Karen Davidson was top performer with five firsts. Julia Yetsenga and Peter Haworth each won three races and Alan Riddell won one race. Many places went to other swimmers and in all 116 events swum 70 improved times were recorded.

Swimming Gala. The next swimming gala will be on Sunday 2 June. Events will be freestyle, backstroke and diving.
