





Chairman's Message

As global Covid-19 cases reach new records, Thailand continues to be almost virus free, thanks to its own self-made bubble. This was an excellent month for the Club again with another very healthy operating surplus.

Membership: Driving our good fortune is the on-going strong influx of new Members, about 60 since we reopened in May, taking the total to 1,240 Members (3,188 individuals including partners and children), 67 higher than this time last year. 27 new Members met with the General Committee at the New Members night on 10th September several indeed bringing along their partners and children, making it a very friendly and relaxed occasion. There were a remarkable number of Bangkok long stayers in attendance, several over 10 years, 20 years, even 30 years. Clearly the Club now has something even more special to offer in an uncertain world and more and more people are discovering it.

New Membership Cards:

Finally the stars aligned and the New Membership Cards were launched on 1st September. Hopefully everyone is now happily waving or tapping their way into the Club. Over 600 Members have already picked up their cards . It is necessary to update Member Profiles on the website before being issued a new card and everyone who had not already done this has been helped through the process by our ever-willing staff

When the operation is complete the Club will have an accurate record for every Member which can easily be updated, providing all the necessary information to efficiently communicate and administer the Club. It will deliver live data on demographic and usage trends enabling services to be better tailored to Member requirements.

If you do not yet have your new card, do not worry; it will be available whenever you next visit the Club.

Busy Club: After all the hard work done by many over the last few years to improve the Club facilities and services nothing gives me more pleasure than seeing the Club buzzing with activity. This weekend was exceptional but no longer unusual.

All of the sports sections were active with a good number of cricketers and hockey players enjoying workouts on the Back Lawn, the tennis courts were busy as usual and the squash section, enjoying a resurgence after years of decline, played a match to a packed house with our old friends

Even the turtles seem to be rejoicing with lots of amorous activity in their luxury new surroundings. At least one egg has been laid and hopefully we might get our first turtlet before long. Splendid! Staff: None of this would of course be possible without our hard working staff. It has been a major challenge to come out of lockdown when staff levels had been deliberately kept to a minimum, to implement new Covid protoclos as well as the new card operating system, maintain all the new facilities and outlets, and serve more and more users every day. Outside of guaranteed income (pensions) or semi-guaranteed income (by example property rental income) most individuals, particularly those who have retired, may need to generate income from their personal cash and investments.

Here we look at some of the available options for individuals.

Cash Deposits

5 to 10 years ago offshore deposit accounts were providing annual interest in the region of 3%-5%. Which meant that it was possible to receive a reasonable income stream with little or no risk (other than deposit taker insolvency risk, which could be mitigated by holding several accounts with different banks/building societies).

However, political turmoil (such as UK Brexit) and the many global government stimulus packages in place for a variety of reasons have meant that interest rates have generally reduced to date. So much so that some of the current highest interest rates (using £250,000 1 year fixed rate deposit as an example) are between 0.95% - 1.15%, these rates quoted by Skipton International and HSBC IOMr.

Fixed Income Securities (Bonds)

The capital value of Bonds will fluctuate more than cash deposits. Bonds are issued by companies, and governments, and are a method utilised to raise investment, they are a loan between the issuer and the individual.

Using a long term corporate Bond index as an example, the current variable annual income yield would be 2.88% (investor.vanguard.com/mutual-funds/profile/VLTCX).

Higher risk global bonds may produce higher income, by example a global high yield index would currently produce 5.438% variable annual income.

Equity (Stocks & Shares) Dividends

The capital value of stocks and shares will typically fluctuate more than bonds. They are the regular payments which are basically part of the investor's reward for holding the company stocks.

Typically, dividends have been reducing, mainly as a result of the Covid-19 outbreak this year and its effect on businesses. And dividend payments are not guaranteed, this has been seen recently where many companies have suspended dividends for a period. However, a number of UK companies are now restoring these dividends.

Historically dividends in European and UK companies have been higher than those in the US, although total growth in the US has far exceeded that in Europe and the UK, both in the short term and medium term.

You will see from the following link that overall dividends in the UK have far exceeded those in the US (1.91% versus 4.81% as at the end of June 2020).

Drawdown

Those seeking income also have other options including taking value from a diversified portfolio of assets, either on a regular basis or ad hoc.

It may be surprising to learn that despite the volatility in 2018, and year to date, a balanced portfolio including most asset classes could have provided returns of 4.7% per annum over 3 years, and 8% per annum over 5 years.

This information is taken from the FTSE UK Private Investor Balanced Index Series, which was previously known as the Association of Private client investment managers and stockbrokers – APCIMS.

Although this "drawdown" strategy provides flexibility, and can be rewarding, one of the main risks is maintaining high levels of withdrawal in times of prolonged investment market volatility. This can lead to a depletion of the invested value more quickly than other income generating methods.

Historia est vitae magistra

Club Historian ... why do we need one of those?

The British Club was started by a few senior members of the United Club, following a certain dispute.

Excerpt from the Straits Times 17.10.1931

Well, most Members know that our Club was founded in 1903 ... and that the Clubhouse was built in 1910 ... and well ... and Thailand was called Siam in those days and ... and ... well ... and ... not a lot else! This is because the Club knows very little else from this period either!

It is unfortunate that in or around December 1941, according to three varying sources, our 1903-1941 records were destroyed, hidden or perhaps left the country. It was, of course, the start the Asian theatre of World War II. In fact, twenty years ago, when I first became Honorary Secretary, the only records for the pre-war period were copies of the Club's two Land deeds, a Chairman's board with some names, a 1936 Constitution (which was subsequently mislaid) and a postcard picture of the first clubhouse! Thankfully though, most, but not all, our post-WWII records are intact.

Since then a substantial amount of information has been tracked down on the web, though Universities, Libraries and some personal stuff from older members and relatives of past members: research has found committee names, and some biographies, for 23 years out of 39 missing years, four Chairmen missing from the board and the names of 28 Honorary Secretaries. It has been agreed that now is the time to start to catalogue this

information and ensure the Club has both hard and soft copies of the research. The aim is to provide a listing of all Committee members from 1901 to 1941, and a timeline of the Club from 1903 as well. We can then start cataloguing trophies, pictures, plaques, and other memorabilia ... all of which tell a tale or two.

For those with a more than a slight interest in our Club's history, in Outpost each month from August 2009 to September 2015, there was a short historical article entitled Past Participle – these can be found in Outpost on the Club website under 'About Us'. A few snippets of research new since then ...

- Our Club was founded only after mass walkout from another Club!
- The first Clubhouse was at the other end of Suriwongse Road not where we are now.
- The first Honorary Secretary was killed in WWI and his name is inscribed on the War Memorial.
- One of the first committee members was Australian.
- · We were a Debenture Club
- Original committees only had nine members not ten.
- · It cost only 100 Baht to join in 1903!

HOWEVER. THE RESEARCH IS NOWHERE NEAR COMPLETE - It takes a long time to track down iust reference in one century old book or newspaper as these are not actually on-line, only the fact that one university or library has a copy. Sadly, we have no plans for the original clubhouse nor can the land records be accessed. We do not even know why "senior British members" auit the United Club en mass! And it is a thankless task as well: You spent months tracking down a source of a directory, only to find the Library concerned has lost it, or that another book you finally found after contacting a dozen sources did not actually contain the information other sources promised ... but the research continues. Hopefully, we will be in a position soon to update Past Participle (the original series) for the next generation of readers.





Candida and its relationship to Addictions

There are nearly 80 different toxins released into your body by Candida, but the two we are going to focus on in this article are the two considered to have the greatest impact on addictive state formation and alcoholism. These toxins are Acetaldehyde and Ethanol.

Acetaldehyde is a neurotoxin very closely related to the odorous and highly toxic substance found in laboratories and funeral homes, Formaldehyde. An organic compound, Acetaldehyde can pass through gut and other tissues, and access the vascular system, leaving it free to travel around the body with ease.

Its' presence destroys enzymes and creates deficiencies in nutrients such as Thiamine (Vit B1), Niacin (Vit B3), Pyridoxal-5-Phosphate (Vit B6), Ascorbic Acid (Vit C), Alpha-Tocopherol (Vit D) and Acetyl Coenzyme A. It also triggers a surge in free radical generation and lowers the liver's antioxidant defence system. Disrupting thyroid function, creating hormonal imbalance, reducing oxygen utilisation by the mitochondria, accelerating lipid peroxidation, and preventing the repair of various nucleoproteins, are just some of the other negative effects of this toxin. One of the areas this potent substance tends to collect the most is the brain, where it has been

shown to cause damage both structurally and functionally.

However, it is Acetaldehyde's unusual ability to combine with two primary neurotransmitters in the brain, Serotonin and Dopamine, and form tetrahydro-isoquinolines, that is most significant in terms of addiction formation. These substances are very similar to opiates and elicit the same kind of 'high' as those derived from opiates.



Recognising this impact on these neurotransmitters is hugely important in terms of addiction management or treatment because imbalanced neurotransmitters are the primary cause of addiction.

Therefore, whilst the removal of the primary manifestation of an addiction (i.e. drugs, alcohol, cigarettes, or another substance) is definitely a step forward in managing the problem, achieving craving subsidence and a state of sobriety in presence of a Candida overgrowth is practically impossible. Even small amounts will create enough of an internal 'high' to ensure that the nervous system keeps the neurological embedded message that 'Alcohol = Sugar...and Sugar = Happy Candida' alive and transmitting.

This is often one of the main reasons why nearly all alcoholics crave sugar in the absence of alcohol whilst going through recovery. It is this sugar craving driven by Candida that can seriously undermine any alcohol addiction treatment.







Wine Tasting



however winning the match and the cup 3-1.



The awards were followed by some raucous banter and beer drinking as we relived the highs and lows of the finals.



THE RULES OF GOLF

For the benefit of our members the Captain thought that some occasional articles on the new rules of golf might be of interest. This is one that might be of use to him personally having seen his efforts in the bunkers.

RELIEF OPTIONS FOR BALL UNPLAYABLE IN BUNKER



When a player decides that his or her ball in a bunker is unplayable, the player has four options:

- (1) For one penalty stroke, the player may take stroke-and-distance relief.
- (2) For one penalty stroke, the player may take back-on-the-line relief in the bunker.
- (3) For one penalty stroke, the player may take lateral relief in the bunker.
- (4) For a total of two penalty strokes, the player may take back-on-the-line relief outside the bunker based on a reference line going straight back from the hole through the spot of the original ball.




The World According to Humphrey by Betty G. Birney




