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

As many of you will know, Lisa Fitzpatrick will be leaving the BC in mid December to pursue career opportunities in the UK. Lisa has been the inaugural Sports and Recreation Co-ordinator at the British Club. When she was appointed in February 1997 the General Committee had a view on the skills required of the individual and the anticipated benefits to the Club. As is nearly always the case on these occasions, the reality of the situation transpired to be somewhat different. It is to Lisa's great credit that she persevered with the task and adapted to the role as it evolved. Lisa brought many new skills to the BC and her enthusiastic and caring nature resulted in the very successful and varied programme of events the Club provides these days. I'm sure I speak for all the Membership in thanking Lisa for her hard work and wishing her the very best of good fortune for the future.

Looking to the future, the General Committee has reviewed the role of the SRC to ensure that Lisa's initiatives are maintained and, where appropriate, expanded. We are currently actively seeking a replacement in order to ensure that any disruption is minimised.

## Extra-ordinary General Meeting

On November 6th, an EGM was held in the Surawongse room at the BC. There were 37 members present with another 23 indicating their view via proxy votes. Fortunately the meeting was quorate and I will provide here a précis of my opening remarks, the rules as accepted by the meeting and the implications of the adopted changes.

## Opening remarks

"The General Committee decided earlier this year that there was a need to review the Rules of the Club, to see that they are appropriate for today's environment. We are happy to say that generally they are. One area we decided to look at in more depth was Membership. We felt there were some anomalies and we also wanted to examine the possibility of new categories of membership, a complete thorough review. Ultimately, new categories were not felt to be appropriate at this time and thus we arrived at the agenda you have before you, which we, your General Committee, commend to you in order to provide a more consistent approach to Membership.

It is worth stating at this point that within this review, the need to maintain the traditions and ambience of the British Club have been paramount in our thinking. Also, there are almost certainly issues or areas of concern to many members. It is important that these areas are debated in full and any changes adopted, obviously, should reflect the wishes of the majority of members. We sincerely hope that our proposals both meet with your approval and at the same time bring the Rules up to date in order to provide greater consistency. As we all know, the British Club is in effect a non-profit making organization that exists for the benefit of the Members. As such, our financial position is usually finely balanced. For several years now we have been unable to do more than maintain the existing Club facilities because of a revenue shortfall, which has been exacerbated by the loss of Members during the current economic problems in the region. Successive General Committees have strived to minimise the impact through prudent management. It is for this reason a Membership Marketing campaign was introduced. This has been successful in that since its inception in February we have achieved a net gain of 77 members, which, with the increase in subscriptions to be introduced at the end of this year, should enable us to meet our monthly operating costs. We are presently evaluating the medium to long term financial requirements of the British Club,

a 3-5 year view. Clearly, we need to accrue a fund to meet the costs of basic maintenance and refurbishment as a minimum, and we will be bringing this matter to the next AGM for discussion."

## Rule changes

## **Rule 30:**

'Each candidate for election must be nominated by two Ordinary or Country Members who have been members for a period of at least 6 months. Applicants shall be furnished with a copy of the Rules and required to complete an application form, which must be signed by their Proposer and Seconder.'

In practice Applications for Membership will be collated and presented to the next meeting of the General Committee. Once accepted by the GC, the usual summary of every application will be posted on the Noticeboard. The GC will vote on the acceptance of these applications at their subsequent meeting, taking account of any objections received.

## **Rule 31:**

'At the time of submitting the application form candidates for Ordinary, Country or Non-Voting Membership will be required to pay the entrance fee, and deposit one months subscription. The candidate will also be required to complete a Bankers Order covering monthly subscriptions. On receipt of these a Club Number will be allocated' which must be used when signing Club bills.' The change was required for clarity. Now all Associate Membership payment requirements will be covered under Rule 46.

## **Rule 37:**

'A Country Member shall automatically become an Ordinary Member on transfer to a residence within a radius of eighty kilometres from the Club, unless the Club is notified in writing within one month of transfer that the Member resigns.'

Upon transfer the member shall be liable to pay the appropriate monthly subscriptions

for an Ordinary Member from the first day of the month following the transfer.

Should a transferring member have joined the Club as a Country Member then, upon first transfer, he/she shall be liable for payment of the balance between a Country Member's entrance fee and an Ordinary Member's entrance fee based upon rates prevailing at the time of transfer.

Under the old wording it could be construed that a Member going Up-Country might be required to pay the difference in entry fees on return to a residence in Bangkok. Clarification was therefore required.

## **Rule 44:**

'Associate Membership will be limited to one third of the total Membership of the Club (excluding Absent Members). No more than one third of Associate Members may be of any one nationality.

Temporary exceptions to these provisions are permitted under rules 55bii and 59bii.' I think this one is self-explanatory but was the subject of much debate. It was clarified to the meeting on several occasions, from both the Chair and the Floor, that the intent of the change was that a maximum of one third of active members should be Associate Members and a maximum of one third of that third, one ninth of the total, could be of a single nationality. In the event of total Membership Numbers falling, individual categories would be deemed full and no further recruitment permitted until such time that the required overall number once again permitted new members. This might be through a reversal of the recruitment trend or natural attrition.

## Rule 46:

'Associate members will be eligible for the equivalent categories of membership as Ordinary Members. At the time of submitting an application form, Associate Members will pay the same entrance fee, monthly subscription and deposit as persons eligible for equivalent membership categories and will be required to complete a Bankers Order

covering monthly subscriptions. On receipt of these a Club number will be allocated which must be used when signing Club bills. However, applicants joining a waiting list will not be required to make any payments and will not be allocated a Club number until there is a vacancy in the category for which they have applied.'

Simply, Associate Members are now able to take advantage of similar payment concessions that are available to Ordinary Members.

### **Rule 55:**

'a) An Ordinary or Country Member may transfer his/her membership to his/her spouse on application to and approval by the General Committee and the payment of the fee laid down in the scale of fees. The Ordinary or Country Member must be paying subscriptions at the rate applicable to married members, and the spouse must be eligible for Ordinary or Country Membership in his/her own right.

bi) In the event of the death of the principal card holder, the bereaved spouse may apply for the membership to be transferred to his/her own name as an individual, provided it is requested within a period of 12 months. The applicant can only apply to transfer the membership to that which he/she is eligible for in his/her own right. bii) In the event there is a waiting list for the particular category for which membership transfer is applied, the bereaved spouse may transfer membership immediately, creating an exception to rule 44 which shall be redressed with the next resignation in that category or by an appropriate increase in total membership numbers.'

We felt that it is necessary to ensure that a bereaved spouse should sensitively and swiftly be permitted to continue to use the Club.

## **Rule 59:**

'a) The children of all Ordinary, Country, Honorary and Associate Members wishing to use the Club facilities shall, upon reaching the age of 21 years, apply for membership in their own right.

- b) If this application is made within 12 months of the applicant's 21st birthday and the member has paid subscriptions at the rate applicable to a married member for a minimum of 5 years, then:
- i) The applicant shall, if elected, pay an entrance fee at a rate equivalent to 25% of the applicable full rate.
- ii) In the event there is a waiting list for the particular category for which this membership is applied, applicants may join the Club immediately subject to rules 29, 30 and 31 creating an exception to rule 44 which shall be redressed with the next resignation in that category or by an appropriate increase in total membership numbers.'

In practice, the Club General Manager will inform both Members and their sons/daughters who reach 21 that they can if desired apply for Membership under this concession. The application should be made to the General Committee within 12 months of the 21st birthday. If the son or daughter is perhaps residing overseas, the actual processing of the membership (and payment) may be delayed and established on their return to Thailand provided their application was lodged in accordance with this rule.

The absolute interpretation of the changes, and particularly the proposal amended at the EGM itself will be subject to discussion at forthcoming meetings of the General Committee. The outcome of these deliberations will be laid out in the form of a series of 'Policies and Procedures', which serve as an ongoing reference for both the Management and General Committee.

Next month, David Turner, who holds the portfolio for Policies and Procedures on the General Committee, will explain these responsibilities more fully.





## **Running for More Good Cholesterol**

(Source: CVR&R, August 1995)

Regular exercise is an effective way to increase your good HDL-cholesterol by a modest amount, which lowers your risk of heart disease. It doesn't take much exercise to begin to make a difference. Just seven to 14 miles of jogging a week at 10 to 15 minutes a mile causes an increase of 7-11% in HDL-cholesterol, compared to inactive controls, according to a study from the Veterans Affairs Medical Center in Washington, D.C.

As weekly mileage increased to just over 30 miles a week, HDL-cholesterol increased by 19% and showed no signs of levelling off. You really don't have to work out hard in order to reduce your risk of heart disease.


## Sunday 1st November

## 'Ere We Go Again with the New Season





## Looking to Go One Better in 1998/99

ith an injection of new players in 1998/99, the BC Cricket Section, winners of the inaugural Hua Hin Triangular Series and runners-up in the Thailand Cricket League 40-overs competition in 1997/98, are looking to go one better in the new season, which begins in late November.

Having gone through the previous season undefeated, only to see the Club's premiership aspirations destroyed by early rain, the BC recovered from a devastating early loss to YTSA to win all remaining round-robin matches last year.

The 211-run win against Southerners was a highlight of the preliminary games. The match featured outstanding performances with the bat by Nick White (95 runs), Marc Innes-Brown (84 n.o.) and Andre Tissera (43), and by John Williams (3-20), Derek Clark (2-10) and David Nockels (3-1) with the ball. A both satisfying and conclusive 108-run

victory over YTSA in the semi final (Trent Ley 96, Andre T. 34 and 2-2, Derek C. 3-27) set up a challenging final in April against title favourites, the Royal Bangkok Sports Club. However, despite amassing 273 runs in 40 overs in the final (Andre T. 114 n.o., Marc I-B. 47, Michael Dukker 33), poor fielding and a mixed bowling performance saw the BC lose the match narrowly by 4 wickets, marking a disappointing end to an otherwise successful season.

A highlight of 1997/98 was the Club's comprehensive win in the inaugural Hua Hin 25-over Triangular Tournament in

February. A conclusive victory over the local side in the first round was followed by an even more comprehensive win over Southerners in the final. The tournament provided the impetus for the BC's successful run into the TCL finals series, before the disappointment of the final against RBSC. Captain Andy Wright, who has since returned to the UK, was named Player of the Tournament at Hua Hin for his success with both bat and ball.

The 1997/98 season featured a number of outstanding individual performances. Andre Tissera was named TCL's Batsman of the Year for the 40-over League, and would have also qualified as best all-rounder had the TCL not introduced a rule forbidding players to win more than one individual award. John Williams won the best bowler award, while Derek Clark, Nick White and Bharat Jogi also had successful seasons with the ball. Other outstanding batsmen for 1997/98 included Marc Innes-Brown, Nick White, Trent Ley and Phil McCommish. The BC Cricket Section welcomes all new players for the 1998/99 season, in which the Club will field a side in the revamped TCL 50-overs league. Net practices are held weekly at the British Club from 7.30pm. 
"Heck, they're going to boil him," whispered Lucy to Star. "We've got to do something quick." She turned to Star who


The Loy Krathong festival is supposed to celebrate the end of the wet season, and this year the date was set at Tuesday 3rd November.


A total of 135 members signed up for the
