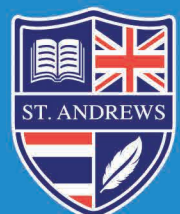

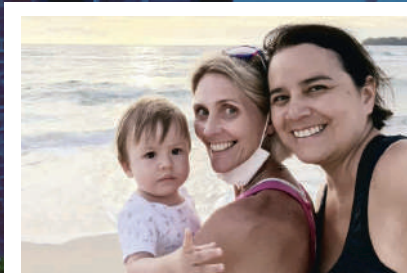

Jubilee Bar

With Phase 2 of the poolside development completed in the same year as the platinum jubilee of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, the General Committee meeting on 24th April decided, in recognition of these two great events, to name the amazing new sports bar, known as Lookout bar during the development, as **the JUBILEE BAR**.

To encourage Members to try this space, there is a special promotion on Wednesday evenings of Buy One Get One on local beers, prosecco, house wine and selected spirits.

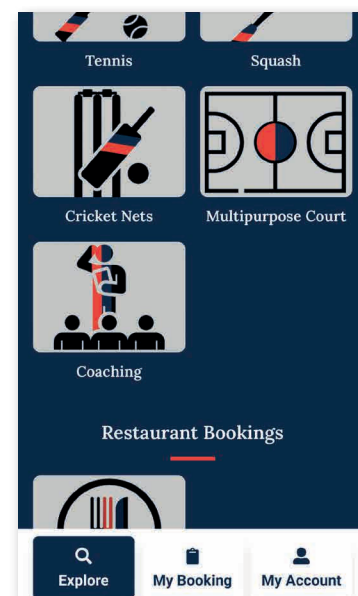
The Jubilee Bar is also the new venue for the monthly Quiz.

Booking App

A booking system has been developed for Members to make bookings for tennis and squash courts, cricket nets, multi-purpose courts, coaching, massage, events, Veranda restaurant, and to pre-register Guests. The booking system can be downloaded from the Club website or by requesting the QR code via the Club's Line Official account.

The first time you are logged on you will be requested to enter your First and Family names and Club No. The system will validate your entry against the Membership database, as the system is for Members only. You will also be asked to enter an email address to receive confirmations. The system will follow booking criteria for each activity, for example for tennis bookings will be open seven days in advance and a maximum per Member.

This system will replace telephone calls, although you may go to the Sports Desk or Reception (for events, Veranda, and guests) in person and ask the staff to enter bookings for you.



Member Survey

The Club is preparing a survey seeking member views on various aspects of the Club. The purpose is to find out what is doing well and what is doing not so well, what Members would like more of and what they would like less of. The intention is to do a further survey in about six months.

As I write, in mid-May, it is expected that the survey will be launched around mid-June. It will be accessed by scanning a QR code, and takes only a few minutes to complete.

Many thanks to GC Member Kathryn Gavin for a lot of work on this.

Covid

In the second week of May, I had close contact (outside the Club) with someone who subsequently tested positive for covid. I stayed away from the Club for five days and took ATK tests every other day, fortunately staying negative. It was like going back to 'lock-down', sitting at home.

Fortunately, a combination of the less harmful variants, protection from the vaccines, and medicines prescribed is making covid more of an inconvenience and less of a serious threat. As concern reduces, Member usage of the Club is slowly increasing, but we are still missing the big events and functions.

Membership

As at the end of April 2022 the Club has a record 1,280 Memberships:

- By category: 9 Honorary, 363 Ordinary, 280 Country, 418 Associate, 120 Annual Ordinary and 90 Annual Associate.
- By type: 322 Single and 958 Family
- There are 933 spouses and 740 children under 21.
- Total Associate membership of 508 is close to the limit of 537 (42% of the total membership),
- The limit for a single nationality within Associate membership is one third of the total number of Associates, which results in membership for Thais currently being full.
- The Club has Members from 53 different nationalities.

The Club's Yearbook 2021, available from Reception if you don't already have a copy, contains an article on Club membership and usage over the last five years.

Did you know? - Service charge

The Club introduced a service charge on all food and beverage sales in 1991, and it has been at a rate of 10% since 2007. The service charge revenue is shared equally amongst all employees except senior management. With the current levels of F&B revenue and with some 80 eligible employees, this works out at about Baht 3,000 / month / employee. Unfortunately, this is lower than is common in the hospitality industry, making it difficult to recruit staff, in particular service staff – an on-going theme this year.

Incidentally, the service charge and VAT are included in the Club's menu prices, whereas many bars and restaurants add service and VAT to the menu price when issuing bills. This can make comparison of Club prices with other institutions confusing.

Investment Holding Methods

In what can be a confusing (sometimes treacherous) landscape, this article outlines some of the options for British expats looking for non-cash investment.

There are several options and the main ones are:

STOCKBROKING ACCOUNT

Stockbroking is typically offered by well-established companies advertising their services in print and online. Most countries have options although there are some major global providers who will allow accounts to be opened without some of the frequent country specific problems.

This option is a cost-efficient approach to investment, usually allowing access to any listed investment instruments on the main exchanges worldwide. The standard service provides accounts on an execution only basis, so no advice is offered, and you can only have access to an account to purchase investments through.

GENERAL INVESTMENT ACCOUNT

A general investment account offers access to investment funds, and some direct securities (this is company specific). Typically, this is a common method of individual investing in the UK.

Some international providers allow accounts to be established by Thailand residents (on a case-by-case basis). A limited number of UK account providers will allow this. It's a competitive marketplace currently so these accounts are generally cost efficient with the standard annual product charge typically less than 0.25% per annum.

As they are mostly used by advisory companies general investment accounts aren't frequently employed for execution only investment.

OFFSHORE LIFE ASSURANCE INVESTMENT BOND

This method is used regularly by "offshore" advisers normally allowing investment in the main currencies and listed investments through most dealing exchanges.

For non-UK residents the more complicated taxation structure isn't applicable. However, for UK residents they are a tax deferral vehicle, but may have a tax liability after a certain period of time of withdrawing value, or at specific events.

Whilst this approach can offer flexibility, the range of charges can be prohibitive, with significant surrender penalties if you choose to close early.

They can be useful for estate planning as a few providers have their own trust companies providing off-the-shelf arrangements with little or no cost. As corporate trustees there's also a higher likelihood they'll remain in place for the life of the arrangement.

DISCRETIONARY PORTFOLIO MANAGEMENT

Historically these options are used by institutional investors, high net worth individuals or charities. Whilst most larger global asset management companies still have high minimum investment levels (\$1 million typically) there are some that offer lower levels, from \$500,000.

Discretionary management means the portfolio is controlled without consulting you on investment decisions, with changes based on factors agreed with you at the outset. They're usually cost efficient and available in most of the main currencies, although some have country specific criteria.

Choosing the right investment approach is important in what can be a confusing landscape. Seeking professional advice is vital to help ensure that you make the right choice for your personal circumstances.

We continue the story of the British Club Bangkok ... 1949

Management

Since 1947, no Club member had agreed to become the Honorary Secretary, so minutes were taken by the Chairman, Charles S.I. Mabbatt, and the Club employed a Paid Secretary, who, in 1949, was Mrs. Sequeria. This left the day to day running of the Club with the Butler, Mr. Cheng Kim Lee (*see Past Participle, March 2022*).

The General Committee had noted the problems with the Butler (*see Past Participle, May 2022*), and encouraged by the growth of activity within the Club, decided to employ a full-time Permanent Assistant Secretary to act as manager and thus reduce the workload of the Honorary Secretary. A Mr. Abdul Majid Yacoob Nana was appointed as the Club's first Permanent Assistant Secretary after an interview on 25th January and started work on 1st February. Subsequently, Mr. A.J. Thorogood was elected to the committee and subsequently elected as Honorary Secretary following the AGM.

Once Mr. Nana's probation period was over, the Paid Secretary, Mrs. Sequeria, was asked to leave on 31st March ... but she did not go! It was not until the General Committee made enquiries of Mr. Nana in June, that it was found that Mrs. Sequeria was still turning up for work, doing the same role, and getting

paid. The General Committee decided finally gave her formal notice.

Sport

In the April, it was agreed that the 'No. 2 Boy' (second barman) would act as marker for Members playing billiards as long as there were not more than ten Members in the Clubhouse, otherwise he must be on bar duty. To encourage more snooker to be played as well as billiards, the Chairman, Charles S.I. Mabbatt, had donated a Cup for the Singles Snooker Championship ... appropriately called the Mabbatt Cup. It was played annually until 1969, revived once in 1978, and again for a run from 1981 to 1988.

Also in April, The Bangkok Bowling Club requested permission to rent Tennis Courts 7 & 8 (where the Silom Wing is now) to erect their own bowling alley and bar. After much General Committee discussion this was not progressed.

In May, the Club received a new Tennis trophy ... 'The Streatfeild Cup' from William & Ursula Streatfeild – William had been Chairman from 1938 to 1941 (*see Past Participle, February 2022*). This was to be an inter-firm men's doubles competition and given prior to his departure for the United Kingdom.

In the same month the Turner Bowl, a competition for married couples, donated in 1915 by Mr. Justice Skinner Turner, and his wife Millicent, was 'returned' to the Club (*see Past Participle, October 2021*).

All eight tennis courts were flooded from October to December. This was because a small Khlong ran from Khlong Silom along, what we now call Soi 16, to the side of the Tennis Courts and was used for drainage and irrigation and the authorities had removed the sluice gate. Repeated requests for its restoration to the Amphur Bangrak office went ignored so the Club thus went out to tender for a local contractor to provide 'Bunding' along the Club's boundaries to prevent such flooding.

Service

As mentioned above, Charles Mabbatt served again as Chairman and Mr. A.J. Thorogood as Honorary Secretary and again no Vice-Chairman was appointed.

The most well-known of those who stood was Peter Kirrage, the local manager for the Bombay Burmah Company. During WWII, he saw service with the 12th Battalion, Frontier Force Regiment, British Indian Army, rising to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, prior to the Japanese Surrender. A member since 1946, at the 1948 Extraordinary General Meeting he was the first member on record to suggest turning some of the Tennis Courts to a swimming pool! Peter served eight terms on the General Committee, being Chairman for six months in 1950 before going on leave, and then replacing Charles Mabbatt as chairman in 1954 when the latter went on leave. His last GC term was 1958-59.

The Honorary Treasurer was Mr. R.E.S Price served for two terms, J. Chambers also served two terms as did W.A. Hamilton. Landry and Orme were mentioned last month, but nothing else is known of Chambers or Hamilton.

This was the second of nine known visits by HMS Alert to the Club but sadly, we lost the ship's plaque, which was a deer on a yellow background!

On 11th May, Siam again changed its name to Thailand (*see Past Participle, February 2022*).

On 3rd December, Bangkok Christian Hospital opened adjacent to one of the footbridges over Khlong Silom, adjacent to a banana plantation owned by a certain Mr. Luang Patpongpanich (*see Past Participle, July 2022*).

The Annual Christmas Dance was held on December 17th but nothing else about it was reported – one assumes it went well.

"During the past month the Club has received its final supply of rehabilitation goods and we are now practically fully equipped; but certainly now in a position to undertake any normal Club function ourselves."

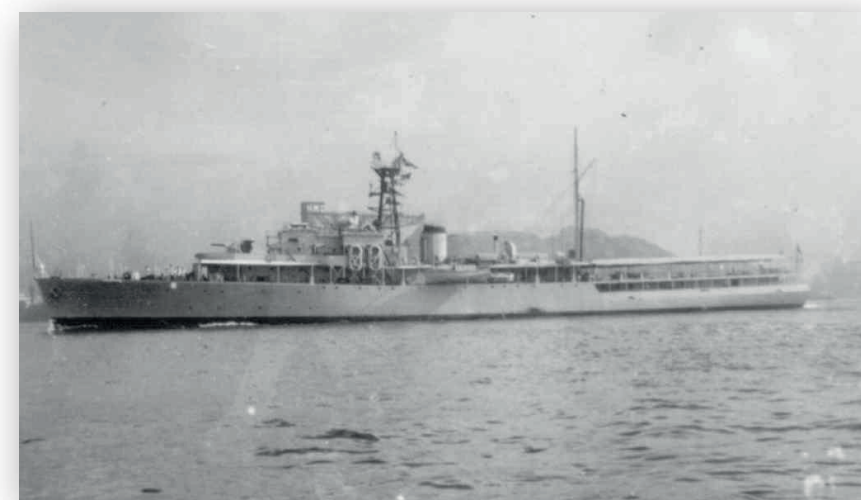

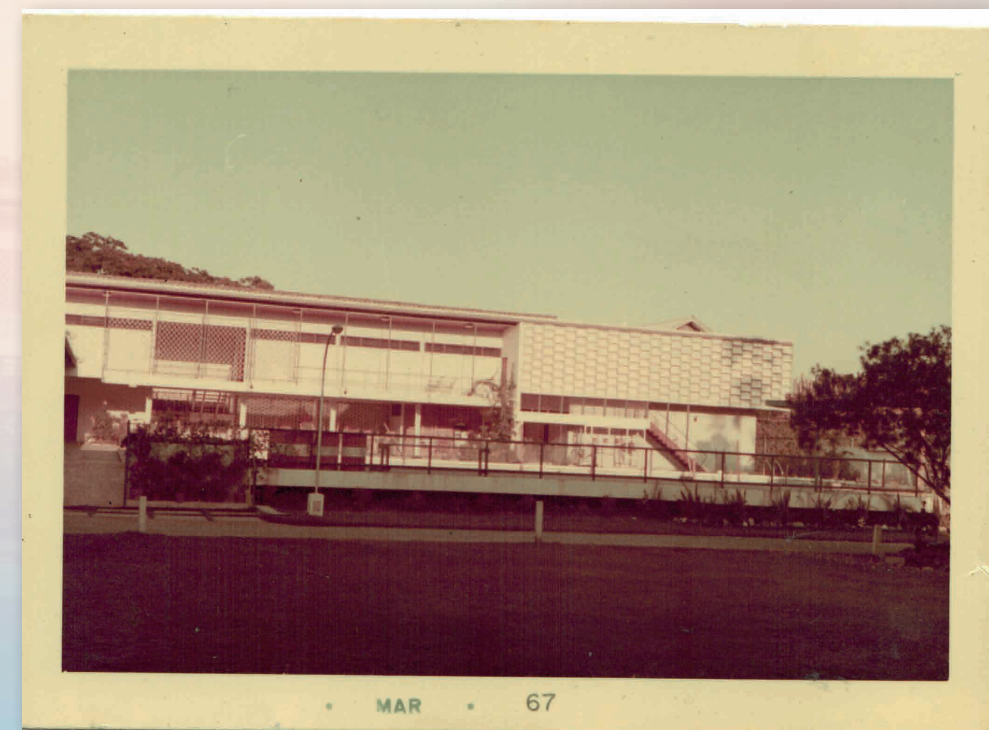

▲ Poolside and Squash Court #1 March 1967

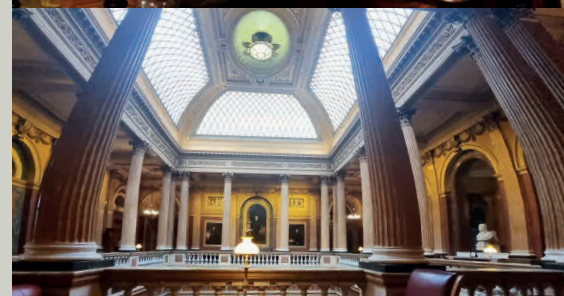


REFORM CLUB, London
 Visited in Spring 2019 and Autumn 2021.

The Reform Club, founded in 1836, is a beautiful private member's club in central London. Originally it was men only, but in line with its liberal-minded character, in 1981 it was the first traditional gentleman's club in London to allow women to become members on equal terms. The club is famous in literature for being the place where Phileas Fogg started and ended his journey around the world in 80 days. The club's main rooms are arranged around a grand internal courtyard, and on the ground floor include a bar and a restaurant. As is common in London's gentleman's clubs, the restaurant is called the Coffee Room, but its wine list is much more extensive and better value than the wine lists in some of the other clubs that I've visited. A curious feature of the restaurant is that when the menus arrive, the guest's menus don't show the prices and the club member is given a pad to take the order of his or her guests. The large leafy garden outside the restaurant is owned by the Crown Estate, but recently the club was given permission to use it so that in good weather members can sit and eat outside, hence reducing the risk of catching Covid from each

other. Apart from a billiards room the club has no sports facilities, but accommodation is available, and meeting rooms are available for hire in the basement too. The dress code is 'smart' which means that men must wear jackets with collared shirts, but these days ties are encouraged but not required.

On the upper floor above the courtyard there's a large library which is often used as a venue for club events. I went to an event there last October, which was a fascinating talk titled "Baghdad 2003 – Snatching Defeat from the Jaws of Victory". The event was well attended, and before the talk I got chatting to a club member who had visited the British Club Bangkok. At the dinner after the talk I got chatting to other club members too. Everyone made me feel welcome. The club member who had been to the British Club knew that we have a lot of reciprocal clubs in London and suggested that the Reform Club is the only club that we really need. If we were only allowed one reciprocal club in London, and if sports facilities were not required, then the Reform Club would be a very good choice.



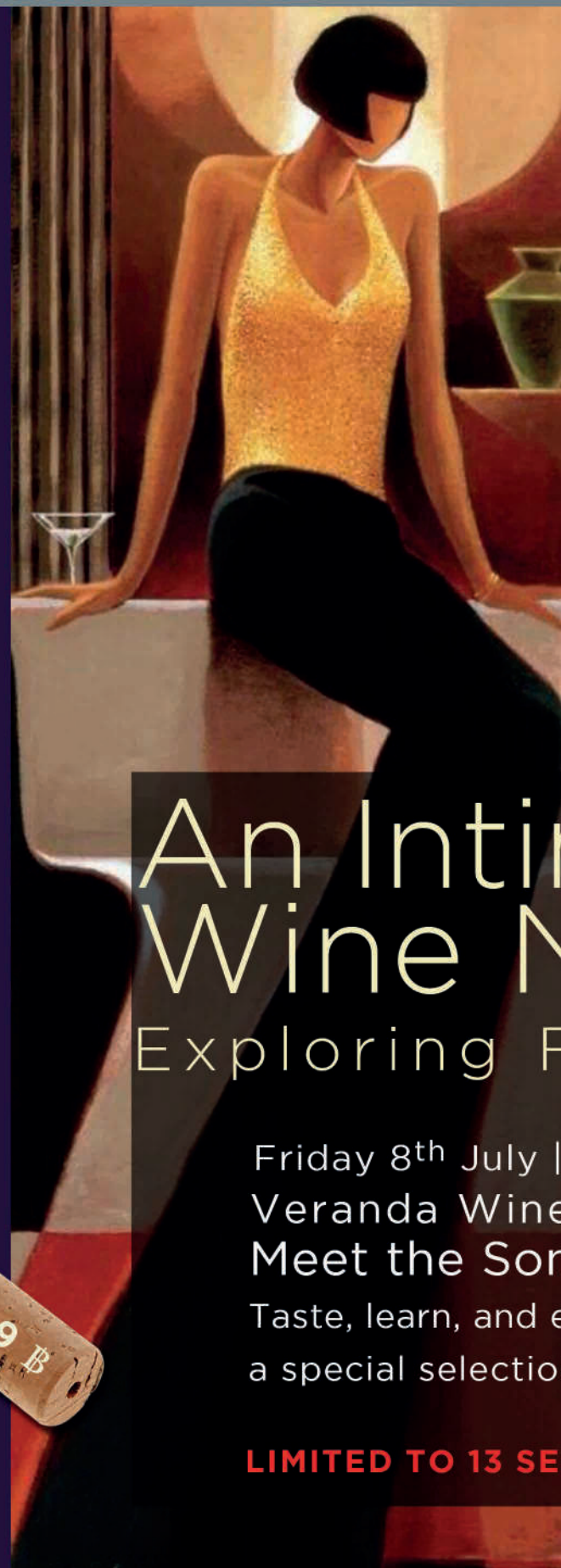

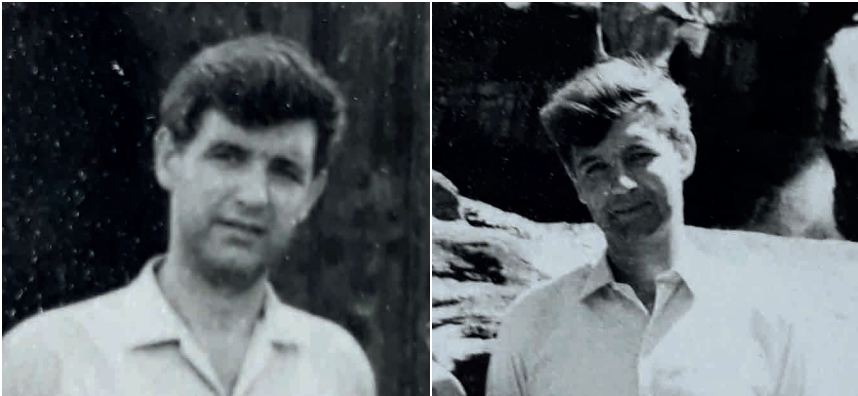
SQUASHY BITS

One of the most prestigious and popular annual squash competitions held at the British Club is the Don Johnston Cup which is also known as the Club Championships. The trophy was generously donated by Donald Sydney Johnston in 1966 and has been played for ever since. Over time, however, the history surrounding the Don Johnston Cup had unfortunately been lost, yet the Squash Section was keen to rediscover the details, and after some investigation we were very fortunate to be put in touch with the family of Mr. Johnston who has kindly added much more clarity.

Sadly, we came to know that Don passed away in 2016 and is survived by his wife Eileen and three daughters. The details of Don's life are based on his wife's memories and notes she made some years ago. Don himself seldom talked about his past, but just before he died one of his daughters happened to ask about a trophy that he had donated to a squash club in Bangkok. According to the Internet it was still being played for and Don was delighted to hear about it; smiling and exhibiting the boyish charm he had even in old age.

Don always had a keen interest in sports. He rowed for his school at the Henley Regatta and played rugby along with the scars to prove it! While in Bangkok from 1961 to 1966 he focused on squash and started to play at the Royal Bangkok Sports Club. As a matter of fact, the first squash court at the British Club had not yet been completed, but in order to encourage squash, Don had taken the opportunity to donate the Cup before leaving Thailand. There is perhaps an amusing tale to tell in that the Club had provided the contractor with the full measurements of the squash court and when it was built it was found to be a little strange. On checking, it was found that the contractor had built the court according to the American dimensions. Eventually this was duly

rectified, however.

After leaving Bangkok to work in London, Don continued to play squash as a member of a small club in Wadhurst, East Sussex, until knee problems in his forties forced him to stop. However, this did not dampen his interest in competitive sports choosing to read the reports and results on the back pages of the newspapers regularly, as he said he liked to learn of other people's successes. He would never have called himself an athlete and was just as enthusiastic about spectating county cricket at the cricket grounds during the summer in Tunbridge Wells.

As a marine cargo surveyor and loss adjuster, Don travelled the world extensively, calculating that

he had in his career visited 126 different countries, and he still kept in touch with the friends he had made in Thailand for a long time after leaving. Two of Don's daughters were born in Bangkok and have Thai Godparents. Thailand continues to hold a special place in the hearts of the family members as it reminds them of happy moments and unique experiences. The family still even keeps his old squash racket from his Bangkok days.

Don was a quiet man; unassuming

and unpretentious. On hearing of his death, one of his associates described him as a "true gentleman". He chose the English countryside for his retirement and died peacefully in 2016 at the age of 84 in one of the Cinque Ports on the East Sussex Coast.

One point of clarity which had been lost in history is the spelling of Don's surname. For some reason, it has often been misspelled Johnson instead of 'JohnsTon'. The BCB Squash Section will certainly get the

'T' back in place. The irony is that while the 'T' is an important aspect in the game of squash, we omitted it this time. We will fondly remember Don for his early ambitions, participation and activeness at the Club.

To gather all of this information (which did in fact take considerable time and investigatory efforts) we would like to thank Jack Dunford, David Fisher and Bart Weaver-Berthet for their invaluable support and input.

Finally, our heartfelt thanks must go out to Don's family who have helped tremendously, even letting us publish some old family photographs. We wish them all health and happiness.

The Club magazine will be duly forwarded to the family with this fully published article and a photo of the squash section members which we hope they will keep for prosperity.

PILATES AND WELL-BEING

Create a strong core with just 5 minutes of 5 exercises!

With the continuing redevelopment of the club it is great that we can now use the upstairs previous gym as a Pilates and Yoga studio, it is a lovely environment. We have some additional classes now to really take advantage of this newly available space, I hope to see you in one of the classes soon.

Pilates All Levels Tuesdays 10:30-11:30am

Pilates Intermediate Level Thursdays 9:30-10:30am

Yoga for beginners Friday 4-5pm

Whilst we are enjoying a regular schedule of classes at the club during this summer term the summer holiday period is rapidly approaching which means our time and schedules may be changing again with travel or kids at home to work around, along with some re-emerging business travel. So, this month I am sharing a quick classic Pilates series of 5 exercises to keep you going if you cannot make a regular class. Something you can easily squeeze into your day when you have 5 mins (try it whilst watching TV during the adverts). Even with just these 5 exercises done regularly you will feel the results of firming and strengthening your core muscles:

1. Single leg stretch

Flex up with head, neck and shoulders pull the left leg into the chest whilst reaching the right leg away from you, look towards the right big toe. Inhale as you start to switch the legs over and exhale as you now reach the left leg long, look towards the left big toe and hug the right knee into the chest.



2. Obliques twists

With your hands supporting your head (they do not pull on your head) and elbows wide, flex up with legs at table top. Inhale prepare, exhale twist up and over with your left shoulder towards the right knee and extend the left leg away from you. Inhale back to start position and exhale right shoulder up and over towards left knee whilst reaching right leg long away from you.



3. Double leg stretch

Flex up, legs table top hands positioned on the side of the knees. Inhale reach your arms overhead and legs long. Exhale, circle your arms down and round, bend knees and come back to start position with hands beside knees.



4. Scissors

Flex up with your upper body and bring both legs up as straight as you can pointing toes towards the ceiling. Inhale prepare, exhale reach your left leg away from you for a count of 2 and pull your right leg towards your chest with your hands. Inhale bring both legs back together, toes pointing to the ceiling, exhale reach right leg away from you for a count of 2 and pull left leg towards your chest.



5. Lower and lift

Bring both legs up, toes pointing towards the ceiling, flex up and hover arms long by the side of the body. Slowly lower your legs down towards the mat, going as low as you can maintain your lower back staying gently pressed

to the floor. Squeezing your legs together helps activate the muscles to move slowly with control. Then lift the legs back up to the start position.



Repeat each exercise 10-12 times, then repeat the whole set again if you have time!

Hints and tips:

- For all the exercises feel your lower back gently pressing into the mat.
- Generally the lower you take your legs as you extend them out the more challenging it is so, if you start to fatigue or feel strain in the lower back reach your legs more towards the ceiling than the floor as you extend them out.
- If you feel your neck straining, keep your head, neck and shoulders on the mat, this works for all exercise except no. 2.
- Follow up with a relaxing child's pose.

Make a habit of taking a few minutes to do these 5 exercises regularly and reap the benefits of strong core muscles this summer!

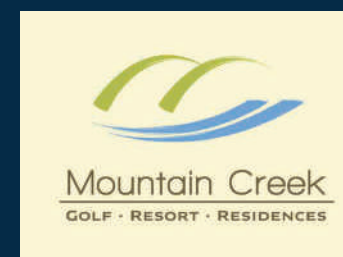

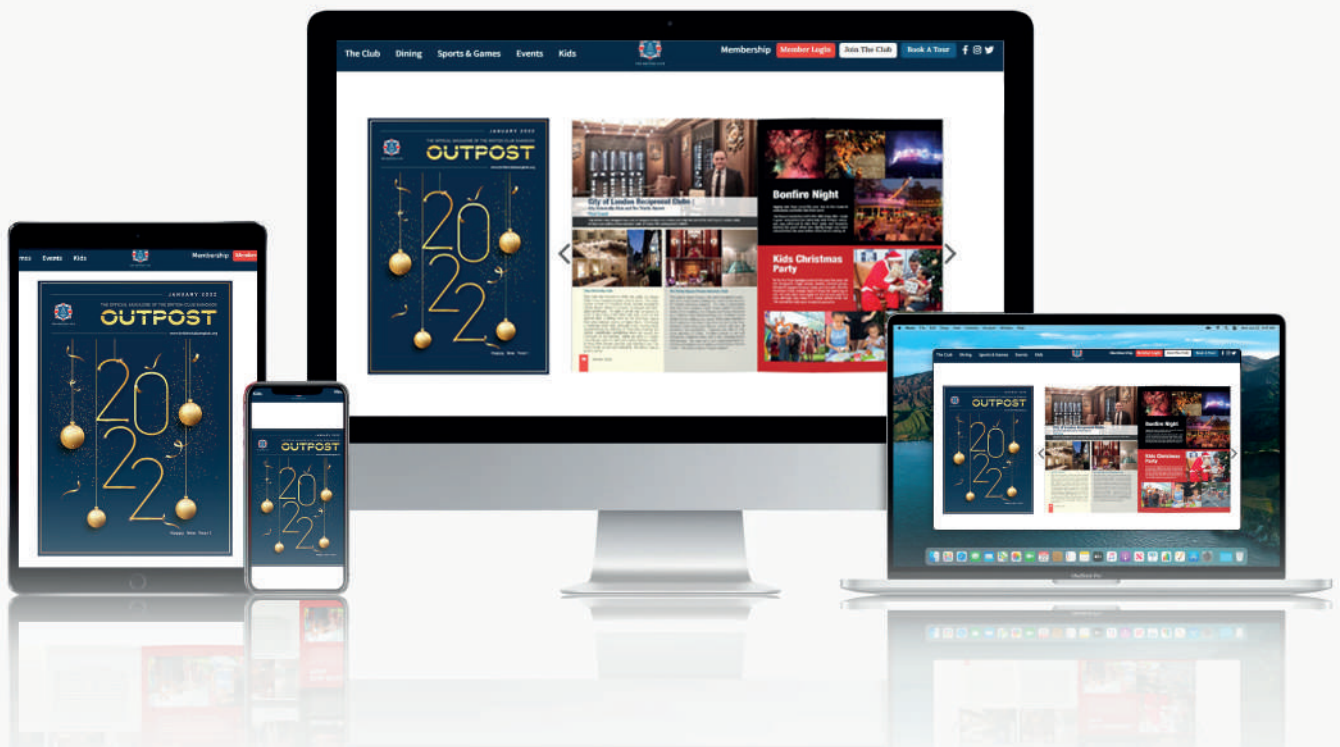
