



HOW DO WE GET OUR DOMICILE?

A domicile of origin is acquired at birth and is generally that of the child's father (where the parents were married), and of the child's mother (where the parents were not). Then at the age of 16 in England and Wales, a child can choose another domicile if they wish.

For non-British nationals, it was not always that simple, for women born before 1 January 1974, they took their husband's domicile, after that date they kept their own domicile.

DOMICILE

When it comes to working with British expatriates, a major consideration is their domicile status, since it drives the extent of their UK Inheritance Tax (IHT) liabilities. Determining this and developing advice around this is hugely important. Many people aunsure if UK IHT rules apply to them. The key to understanding whether you are liable to IHT is the concept of domicile. If you are domiciled in England, Wales, Scotland or Northern Ireland, UK IHT applies to your global assets. If you are domiciled elsewhere, UK IHT is only charged on assets held in the UK.

It is important to note that long-term UK absence does not mean a domicile of choice has been acquired somewhere else, ie other than the UK. This is a common misconception, as severing connections with the UK and making it clear you plan to not live in the UK again is what HMRC are looking to see.

By example, we often meet individuals who have lived and worked in numerous locations around the world, perhaps being outside of the UK for over 25 years, and who have now settled in Thailand. The previous periods of non-UK residency may be broadly irrelevant, it is the "life" in the current location which is all important.

There is no distinct timeline of how long one must be in a location where they wish to remain permanently to determine whether a domicile of choice has possibly been acquired or not. It is more how serious the intent is and what steps have been taken to show it. This may, with the right steps, be a relatively short period of time, if all the significant logical and viable steps have been taken.

In the past it was possible to make an application to HMRC to change one's domicile, but this is no longer the case. The main way to understand one's domicile position now is to have a professional review carried out by a sufficiently experienced and authorized individual. This will only provide an opinion and while it is not to be relied upon it may strengthen the case of an individual's position.

UK IHT

Introduced in 1986 and is based on the transfer of value from your Estate, when the legal and beneficial ownership passes to another.

With IHT on death charged at 40% over the current Nil Rate Band (£325,000) it is important to understand the position for the next generation as there could be an unpleasant tax bill on the Estate of the individual who passes away.

The Main Residence Allowance per person remains at £175,000 for April 2023/2024 UK tax year and is currently planned to have Consumer Prices Index increases applied thereafter.

The unused allowance is transferable to a surviving spouse for total allowances of £1 million and is tapered for Estates above £2 million. There are certain conditions for the Main Residence Nil Rate Band such as the Estate must contain current/former main home or be the proceeds of downsizing. And the current/former main home must pass to children.

For IHT purposes and in relation to a British couple transferring assets between them on death, there is no UK IHT. For a married couple with different domiciles (UK to a non-UK domiciled spouse) the amount is restricted to the normal £325,000 Nil Rate Band, plus a further £325,000 (a maximum of £650,000) that can currently be passed UK IHT free.

It can be possible to overcome this with an election in lifetime or on the death of the UK domiciled spouse for the non-UK spouse to adopt a UK domicile. However, care is needed to understand if this will be most effective in overall UK IHT planning as it does bring the non-British spouse into the UK IHT regime with the Estate value for a minimum period.

To achieve this for a split domicile marriage, the election must be made within two years of the death of the deceased, or for a longer period if an officer of HMRC allows it. If the spouse then returns to the overseas home country, the UK domicile election will lapse after four further tax years. Overall, this would mean a UK IHT-free transfer of assets after completion of the election.

There are a number of UK IHT planning methods such as:

- Planning for a domicile of choice overseas
- Electing for a domicile of choice in the UK (non-Brit spouses)
- Gifting to individuals

- Gifting capital to certain Trusts
- Gift and Loan Trust (IHT-free future investment growth)
- Discounted Gift Trust (an immediate partial IHT liability reduction)
- Excluded Property Trust (for non-domiciled individuals going to live in the UK)
- Short-term (two year) IHT planning method examples:
- Furnished holiday lettings (strict criteria to qualify for Business Property Relief BPR)
- Woodlands/farmland investments (Agricultural Property Relief – APR)
- AIM structured portfolios (Business Property Relief – BPR)
- Alternative investments which also achieve BPR/ APR
- Life assurance policies written in Trust.

With careful planning, serious tax savings can result. Every situation is different and a blend of solutions at the right time is usually most sensible (although domicile planning is normally the first step).

There have been government-driven reviews of UK IHT in November 2018 and July 2019 by the now disbanded Office for Tax Simplification (OTS). There were recommendations but none were implemented. The next UK general election is scheduled to be held no later than 28 January 2025 and a major change to the ruling party could mean changes to the UK IHT system.

We will have to wait and see what happens and in the meantime it remains sensible to seek professional advice, review your circumstances and plan ahead as best you can as tax legislation, rates and allowances can change swiftly and sometimes retrospectively.

We continue the story of the British Club Bangkok ... **1960**

The Thepanom

The most significant event of 1960 was the adoption of a Club logo. This was meant primarily for our Club ties and was requested at the previous year's AGM. Sadly original plans to use the Edward Crown had been scuppered (see Past Participle, April 2023).

The Club researched thus for a Thai logo that we could adopt and were advised we could adopt any logo other than Royal emblems. In February we settled on the 'Thepanom' a Buddhist heavenly being and this has remained central to our various logos since. The ties, made by Thomas Mayes Lewin of Jermyn Street, London, were available for sale at the Annual General Meeting.

The tie had a gold Thepanom in a diamond pattern and underneath was alternately B.C.B. (British Club Bangkok) and ส.อ.ก. (สโมสร อังกฤษ กรุงเทพมหานคร [Samosorn Angkrit Krungthep]) in red. Sadly, when contacted in 2010, T.M. Lewin had reported that it no longer had any records of this design and then, on 30th June 2020, T.M. Lewin went into administration and now exists only as an on-line marketing brand of Torque Brands. Fortunately in March 2023, a child of a past member donated a picture of the tie.

Our Naval Year

Our naval heritage continued in 1960 when we hosted both the outgoing and incoming Commanders-in-chief, Far East Fleet. In April we hosted Vice-Admiral Sir Gerald Gladstone CBE, KCB., and in October Vice-Admiral Sir John Luce GCB, DSO & Bar, OBE, both aboard our most frequent Royal Navy visitor HMS Alert.

In May, in a policy change, the General Committee decided that the Sailors Entertainment Fund, founded in 1947 (see Past Participle, April 2022), was no longer gaining any support from the British community so, instead of funding a luncheon for officers and ratings, the Club would extend use of our facilities to members of visiting naval forces. Thus in September, at the request of the new Naval Attaché, Commander J.J. Phillips RN (see later), the Club extended the use of the Club to the crew of HMCyS Mahasena, a River class frigate, previously HMCS Orkney, and HM-CyS Parakrama, an Algerine-class minesweeper, originally HMS Pickle. both from the Royal Ceylon Navy.

In October, on the 21st of course, the Bangkok Naval Association held its first Trafalgar Dinner at the Club in order to commemorate the 155th Anniversary of the Battle of Trafalgar.

Finally, in the November, the Club extended to the crew of HMNZS Rotoiti (F625), a Loch-class frigate, use of the Club facilities during their visit.

The Butler

The second most significant event of 1960 was the retirement on 31st July of the Club's Butler, Mr Cheng Kim Lee, after 41 years' service. The General Committee awarded him an immediate 30,000 Ticals payment and six months later paid him a further 30,000 Ticals from a Subscription Fund which was set up for him. Advertisements for this fund had been placed in The London Times, The Daily Telegraph, and the (Bangkok) Weekly Times to seek support of past members.

One member noted at the time "The butler was a favourite among Tical-short bachelors for he could be relied on for a temporary loan".

As a result of his retirement the No. 1 Boy ("head barman"), Yee Daeng, was promoted to Butler.

BUTLER'S RETIREMENT

This was discussed at length and it was agreed to retire the Butler as from 31st July 1550, after 41 years service to the Club. It was agreed to present the butler with a gift of Tos.30,000.00 from Club funds as a lump sum and then to open subscription list, with a further guarantee of Tos.30,000.00 any deficiency on this second figure to be made up from Club funds.

To reciprocate or not to reciprocate!

The AGM of 1960 tasked the newly elected General Committee to get some reciprocal Clubs in Asia. Although the General Committee did contact the Tanglin Club in Singapore and the Lake Club in Kuala Lumpur they decided not to pursue either due to "conflicting constitutions and rules" (although both became reciprocal clubs in later years). It was not until 1967 that the Club obtained its first Reciprocal Club.

RECIPROCAL ARRANGIMENTS.

Ar. Mackie read personal letters that he bad received from the Tanglin Club, Singapore, the Penang Club, Fenang and the Lake Club, Fuala Lampur. It was decided that we could not enter into arrangements with the Tanglin Club be the Lake Club because of their Constitutions but the Penang Club seemed possible and it was agreed to exchange copies of Rules and Regulations. Mr. Mackie had not heard from Hongkong at that time.

Reciprocation

Service

1960 saw Charles Mabbatt elected for the last time as Chairman, and William Brownsey serve his last term as Honorary Secretary, (he went Absent mid-way through the year, but would serve two future terms on the Committee) (see Past Participle, April 2022, and August 2022 respectively). Mr. Brownsey was replaced by the co-option of M.P. Langley of the Mercantile Bank recording his only service.

F.R. Haynes went Absent from the post of Vice-Chairman in the May and was replaced by Mowbray Mackie of the Mercantile Bank. Mr. Mackie would go on to serve four more terms, three as Vice-Chairman and one as Chairman ... a year which nearly saw the Club sold off! (see Past Participle, September 2023).

The Honorary Treasurer, James Malone, went Absent for four months and was temporarily replaced by Godfrey A. Sommerfield (see Past Participle, February 2023). Mr. A.D.G. Shaw of the British Overseas Airways Corporation (BOAC) served this term only, and two others co-opted, and serving their only time on the committee were Commander J. Ferguson of SEATO (Southeast Asia Treaty Organization), and D.A. Sakey of the Shell Company,

Club News

The Annual General Meeting instructed the committee to sell off the front two Tennis Courts (along the Suriwongse Road) or even swap them for the house and land behind the Club (where the Panyarat High School now stands) to raise funds for development. The General Committee considered these "not in the interest of the Club". (see Past Participle, September 2023).

The Bangkok Municipality decided to fill in Khlong Silom and replace its 'water control' properties by a Typhoon drain. This Khlong had long been the Club's main source of drainage and a small khlong ran along Soi 16 (hidden now in the Narai works) from the Club's premises to it to serve our smaller drainage khlongs. A temporary measure enacted was to pump our excess waters into the Suriwongse drain whilst we tried to get a pipe installed to the new Silom drain.

CHINA

The question of the possible sale of the 2 front tennis courts was discussed and the possibility of purchasing land behind the Club now used as a private dwelling was also discussed and this matter was left to the attention of the incoming Committee.

On 1st January the Paknam Railway closed: opened in 1893, the railway ran from a location near, what is now Hua Lamphong station, along Thanon Thong {Straight Road} (what is now Rama IV Road) all the way down to Paknam, now called Samut Prakarn. Interesting the 'station' at the top of Silom was little more than a gazebo style supported roof surfaced with red tiles ... hence the area is known as "Sala Daeng"!





County Club, Guildford, Surrey, England

Visited in December 2022

The County Club, founded in 1882, is a comfortable well-appointed private member's club in the heart of Guildford. The site where the club now stands used to be an inn which was a staging post between London and Portsmouth, with the current building consisting of three old timber-framed cottages which have been joined together. The ground floor of the middle building is the club's entrance, with shops on the ground floor of the two outer buildings, and with the club occupying the upper two floors across all three buildings. Originally it was a provincial gentleman's club, but these days women can join too. When I visited the club, the club had around 430 members, and for the first time the club's chairman was a woman.

One quirk of this club is that it doesn't have a reception desk at the entrance. Instead there's a cloakroom, with stairs leading up to the first floor which is where the club's main facilities are. At the front of the building on the first floor is a lounge, incorporating a bar in the middle, and on one side of the building at the rear is the club's dining room. The club's offices are at the rear on the other side of the building. The second floor has meeting and function rooms. However, the club has no accommodation or sports facilities.











I have an old school friend who lives in Guildford, so during my visit to the UK for Christmas 2022, I arranged to meet him for lunch at this club. I arrived first and given that there's no reception desk at the entrance, I went to find the club's offices to introduce myself. The lounge was quiet, with just a couple of women sitting by the window drinking coffee. But there was also one club member sitting on his own, so I got chatting to him. He was a retired employee of Shell, who had worked as an expat in several countries all over the world. When his wife arrived, she told me that it was the club's female chairman who was responsible for the club's comfortable décor and furnishings, and that previously it had looked like an old gentleman's club and it hadn't been renovated for a long time. I also spoke briefly to this member's two guests, who were impressed by how cheap the club's lunch menu was compared to local restaurants in Guildford.

There were only a handful of tables occupied for lunch on the Thursday that I visited, but I had a nice lunch with my old school friend. The club had a simple wine list which didn't specify the vintages, but the staff were more than happy to check for me before I made a decision. During the meal, both the club's manager and the female chairman came to introduce themselves to me. The chairman told me that the County Club only had 11 reciprocal clubs, and that as far as she knew, I was the first person to visit from British Club Bangkok. In any case, everyone who I spoke to made me feel welcome, so this club is thoroughly recommended for members of British Club Bangkok who find themselves in or near Guildford.

TRIP REPORT:

"Explore Chachoengsao" trip undertaken on Friday, 31st March 2023

Having enjoyed leisurely BC breakfasts in the Sala, the trip participants boarded our minibus and commenced the first part of our journey. Seniors Section Committee Member and Trip Organiser Noah Shepherd handed out the Trip Itinerary and Information Guide that he had prepared, which, in addition to the enlightening details provided, included QR codes so that using the bus's on-board WIFI, we could read even more about the three stops that we would be making during the course of the trip.

The first stop was at Wat Hong Thong also known as the appropriately named Wat Klang Nam (Middle of the Sea), a temple complex in the Gulf of Thailand along Chachoengsao province's 10km coast-line in a somewhat denuded but rapidly being replanted mangrove forest, where much of the area around the temple is used to farm salt.

Using the under-cover walkway over the shoreline (the tide was in) we first visited the three-level pagoda. The first level contains statues of the Lord Buddha, the second has some interesting wax statues of the Lord Buddha, and paintings of the current and past Kings of Thailand, and the top floor has a terrace with excellent sea and coastal views. The adjacent smaller ordination hall, is beautifully decorated both inside and out. The interior features wall and ceiling paintings depicting scenes from the life of the Lord Buddha. The main Buddha image is a scaled down copy of another famous statue of the Lord Buddha, the Phra Phuttha Chinnarat, the original of which is enshrined at Wat Phra Si Rattana Mahathat in Phitsanulok.













Nearby there is also a quite new pier holding a gold-coloured Buddha image, reached using a 'sea walk' with a glass floor (at a cost of Baht 30 each, which in the opinion of this writer, smacked of money raising rather than of piety and merit-making). Finally, we accessed the large observation tower where from the 11th and top floor we enjoyed magnificent views of the coastline and the totally flat but still interesting and very scenic inland.

Then back on the bus for lunch at The River Restaurant located on the Bang Prakong River a few Km south of Chachoengsao City, where we enjoyed a Thai style set menu in lovely surroundings complete with very friendly and efficient service. Noticeable was that, in contrast to the Chaophraya River anywhere north of Bangkok, the Bang Prakong River had zero traffic during our time there.

The bus then drove us north-eastwards to Wat Saman Rattanaram. which is in complete contrast to the serenity of Wat Hong Thong. The temple is located on a landlocked island on the banks of the Bang Prakong River. We parked in the main car park, and walked to the main temple area through the huge market with stalls selling every variety of vegetables, river fish, meats, on-site cooked foods, handicrafts, clothing, and even toys and ornaments. Interspersed were various convenience stores and coffee shops of various local and international franchises. The huge site was quite crowded on this last Friday of the month!

The main temple area houses a number of religious features for merit-making: the biggest Ganesh statue in Thailand, an ornate Chinese temple and the Goddess of Mercy, the Hindu deity Indra riding the three headed elephant Erawan, overlooking the river is a large statue of the Hindu God Brahma seated on a pedestal, several large brightly colored statues of Nagas serpent deity, in a corner of the parking lot is a replica of the Golden Rock in Burma with the Kyaikhtiyo pagoda, one of Burma's most sacred sites. A whole lot to take in on a blisteringly hot day in company with quite a lot of visitors to this very popular temple.

Whilst the drive back to the British Club was slow and long, nevertheless it was an enjoyable day out in good company, excellently and professionally organized by Noah!
