



New tax rules for couples who divorce

On 6 April 2023 significant changes were made to Capital Gains Tax rules for divorcing couples. If you are in, or are facing, this situation it's important to understand what impact these updates could have.

Capital Gains Tax (CGT) is the bill you pay when selling or disposing of certain assets and is generally charged on the increase in value since you acquired those assets. The rates are different from Income Tax, and link to the amount of taxable income you receive during the tax year. For residential property the rates currently stand at 18% and 28%, and for other assets the rates are 10% and 20%.

WHAT WERE THE RULES BEFORE 6 APRIL 2023?

Before 6 April any assets transferred between spouses during the tax year when separation took place (the year you stopped living together as a couple) didn't attract CGT. The spouse who received the asset also inherited its original cost, with the full CGT charge deferred until it was later sold or disposed of. This system – known as the “no gain/no loss” transfer – was well understood. However, any transfers between spouses taking place after the tax year of separation immediately fell into the CGT net.

DID THIS APPLY TO PROPERTY?

When a married couple or civil partners separated the family home then ceased to be the main residence of the spouse who stopped living there. If the home was then sold in the future this individual would have a period of ownership that would not be exempt from CGT, even if they'd transferred ownership of their share and Main Residence Relief wouldn't apply given they didn't live in the property. This left the departing spouse in a rather unfair position. Only one caveat was of use in this situation – CGT didn't apply to the last nine months of ownership, so it was only if the family home was sold or transferred in this timeframe that CGT wouldn't apply.

WHAT ARE THE NEW RULES?

The period during which separating couples can transfer assets between themselves without a CGT bill has now been extended for up to three years following the tax year of separation. The rules apply to all assets including properties and investments. As before, any CGT charge is deferred until the receiving spouse later disposes of the asset.

Main Residence Relief is also extended. So if a couple who are separating sell their former family home, the spouse who is leaving may still be able to benefit from this relief, but only if the remaining spouse continues living in the home. The departing spouse must choose for the home to be treated as their main or only residence, and no other property can benefit.

These changes are a welcome reform of complex, and rather unfair, CGT rules that apply at an already difficult family time. There's now more time to share assets following a separation without incurring CGT. In addition, it may be possible for a future sale of the family home to benefit from Main Residence Relief, for both the spouse who continues to live in the property and the one who has left.

As with most UK tax matters the rules can be complicated and you should seek expert advice to make sure you have understood the regulations. If you are facing a divorce under UK laws and need to consider how to split your assets tax advantageously, please contact us.

Seeking income

On top of guaranteed income (pensions), or semi-guaranteed income (property rental) many retirees need to generate income from their cash and investments. Here we look at some of the available options.

CASH DEPOSITS

UK interest rates over the last decade have declined, until recently when rates are starting to creep forward mostly related to global COVID-related government stimulus packages and support towards the impact of the Russia/Ukraine conflict. By example, and at the time of writing, Santander International offer 3.5% for a 12-month fixed deposit on balances from £25,000 upwards with no current tiering (Source: Santander International).

Currently, Costas Milas from the London Stock exchange indicates that UK interest rates could potentially rise up to 4.75% by the end of 2023. This is because high public expectations of inflation have the potential of putting additional pressure on current inflation through demand for higher wages. If, instead, financial stress worries take over, UK interest rates might end up below 4% by the end of 2023. The Bank of England's (BoE) policy rate currently stands at 4.25%. (Source: London School of Economics)

FIXED INCOME SECURITIES (BONDS)

The capital value of bonds will fluctuate more than cash deposits. Bonds are issued by companies, and governments to raise investment, they are a loan between the issuer and the individual. Using a double AA rated US corporate bond index as an example, the current variable annual income yield would be 4.410%. Higher risk global bonds may produce a higher level of interest income, and by example the High Yield 100 index would currently provide an 8.0752% variable annual income (Source: WSJ Markets).

EQUITY (STOCKS AND SHARES) DIVIDENDS


The capital value of stocks and shares will normally fluctuate more than bonds, but in return for greater potential rewards over the medium term. Dividends from stocks and shares are the

regular payments which are part of the investor's reward for holding the stock. Historically dividends in European and UK companies have been higher than those in the US, although total growth in the US has far exceeded that in Europe and the UK (over the medium to long term). The average of UK and US dividends to the end of 2022 was 3.65% versus 1.77% (Source: Sibilis Research).

The difference in actual growth of the US and UK stock markets can be seen in the five-year chart below:

DRAWDOWN

Those seeking income can also take value from a portfolio of assets, either on a regular or ad hoc basis. It may be surprising to learn that despite the volatility in 2018, 2020, and 2022/2023, a balanced portfolio could have provided returns of 7% per annum over three years, and 5.4% per annum over five years (Source FTSE UK Private Investor Balanced Index Series).

Card Tapping System

The club operates with a policy of no cash for payments for its members and instead uses a post-paid system charged to members accounts. This was previously done by members showing their membership cards to the service staff to open a bill, now we have updated the POS system to only allow a bill to be opened by tapping the physical card on a card tapper at each outlet or point of sale (POS) area. This is designed to prevent guest/non-members from ordering on members bills without their knowledge and more importantly to stop bills going to other members accounts by accidentally entering the wrong number of the membership. The system is locked, and no staff member can open a bill without having a membership card, if no card is available they will have to call a manager. We ask for your cooperation and thank you in advance.

What a Pantomime!

The first ever Pantomime to held at the Club was produced by Mrs. Dorothy Mattacks. Sadly, there is no record of what it was!!!

The Chairman said that the Pantomine was, as far as he knew, the first ever to be held in the British Club and that it was an undoubted success. The idea was first conceived by Mrs. Dorothy Mattacks who was the producer, and the Chairman warmly thanked both her and all those who took part in the Show.

Our Naval Year

In January, the Club extended to the crew of HMAS Voyager (D04), a Daring-class destroyer and HMAS Quickmatch (F04), an anti-submarine frigate, use of the Club facilities during their visit. Sadly, HMAS Voyager was lost in 1964 with heavy loss of life when it was stuck amidships by HMAS Melbourne, broke in half, and sank.

In April, the Club extended to the crew of HMS Carysfort (D25), a Daring-class destroyer, use of the Club facilities during their visit. In October, the Club extended to the crew of HMAS Quiberon (F03), a Q-class frigate, and HMS Cassandra (D10), a C-class destroyer, use of the Club facilities during their visit. The plaques of HMS Carysfort and HMAS Quiberon remain displayed in the Churchill Bar.

Development

In the January, the Committee called an informal meeting of members to discuss the development of the Club. Unfortunately, only 20 members plus six GC members, out of 225 total membership, attended.

The Annual General Meeting, in February, debated a scheme to empower the General Committee to spend up to 450,000 Ticals, of which 250,000 Ticals would be borrowed:

- To provide a restaurant and a suitable kitchen by moving the Billiards upstairs and using that room [2023: The Churchill Bar]
- To air-condition The Rotunda Lounge as a Bar for Men Only [2023: the Wordsworth Lounge]
- To extend the Bowling Alley facilities

The proposal was rejected overwhelmingly.

In July, after decades of use, the Staff Quarters, adjacent to the Neilson Hays Library (2023: the rear car park) had been deemed "a deplorable state of affairs" thus 26,400 Ticals was spent to refurbish, extend, and add new toilets facilities to the Quarters. An additional 87,600 Ticals was spent on rewiring and repainting the Clubhouse and the Club still reported an annual surplus of 42,000 Ticals. Sadly, it was later found to be in error as 12,000 Ticals of coupons had 'gone astray' and this had to be charged as a Club loss!

The matter was discussed in a general and lively fashion and many Members voiced their opinions in one way or another. The final result of the discussion was that most Members wished to reject the proposal at the present time as they felt that much more research should be carried out before the Club's money was spent on development, as far reaching as those envisaged by the outgoing Committee.

Approved Meetings

St. George's Day saw the Band of the East Anglian Regiment in attendance at lunchtime playing for over an hour and late April saw the first official function, at the Club, of the Bangkok Society of St. George under their chairman Mr Jack Delacour.

The Club was also used by the Bangkok Naval Association, The Oxford & Cambridge Society, the St. Andrew's Reel Club, and the St. John's Lodge. This led to the General Committee creating a list of 'approved meetings' to save the various groups repeatedly having to request of the GC permission to use the Club on each occasion. In 2005, this list was legalised as 'Associated Groups' in the Club's constitution.

The Honorary Secretary was asked to compile a list of approved meetings held in the Club by various outside societies etc. The list will be compiled only of such societies etc., who have regularly over the years held their meetings in the Club. Any society not listed must apply to the Honorary Secretary for permission to use the Club for Meetings. The Honorary Secretary will place such applications before the Committee for consideration.

Service

John H. W. Marshall, of the Hong Kong & Shanghai Banking Corporation, became chairman in 1961 following the epic spell by Charles Mabbatt (see *Past Participle, April 2022*). John Donofield became Vice-Chairman (see *Past Participle, January 2023*). Anthony Forrester, of United Artists of Thailand, became Honorary Secretary, serving same for the next two terms of his further three years' of service. James P. Malone became Honorary Treasurer (see *Past Participle, January 2023*).

Jack Delacour, of Chartered Bank, served this and six more times, two as Chairman. John K. Simpson, of pre-WWII fame, served again (see *Past Participle, January 2022*), whilst R.V. Murden, of the Hong Kong & Shanghai Banking Corporation, Mr. A.H.J O'Connell of Ben-Line Steamers and Lt. Col. Dick Warren of SEATO served only this term.

1961 was, also, the start of service of Dacre Francis Alexander Raikes, of the Borneo Company, who would serve five terms, two as Vice-Chairman and be the GC member responsible for the Club's first Squash Court in 1966 (see *Past Participle, November 2023*). Dacre had a long and distinguished career in Thailand - receiving the Most Noble Order of the Crown of Thailand in 1968, became an Officer of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire in 1983, and an Honorary Member of the Club in 2006. After his passing in 2013, a 223-page dual Language book of his life was published by Santisiri Printing, a copy is held at the Siam Society where he had been President.



Club News

The inaugural tournament for the Davidson & Elliot Cup for snooker against the Shell Sports Club was held in the March. The Cup was donated by Messrs A.M. Davidson & F.B. Elliott. In May, Mr. Frank Young donated the Youngs Bowling Trophy. Sadly, both cups have been lost, it ran from.

Membership for the year rose dramatically after years of some decline with 1961 ending at 262 members as opposed to 225 in 1960.

This increase in membership led to a significant rise in subscription income and Bar profit which helped defray the declining state of Club finances. In the five-year period to the 1962 AGM our income had only gone up by 35% from for 310,000 Ticals to 418,000 Ticals whilst our expenses had doubled from 167,000 Ticals to 335,000 Ticals.

In Other News

On 12th April, Pilot-Cosmonaut Major Yuri Alekseyevich Gagarin became the first man in space aboard Vostok-1.

On 27th June H.E. Dermot Francis MacDermot CMG CBE became the British Ambassador. His peerage entry refers to him as styled Prince of Coolavin, Chief of the Name, head of the MacDermot clan, and a descendant of the Kings of Moylurg. He became an Honorary Member on 12th July. He was made Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael & St. George (KCMG) in the 1962 New Year Honours List.

On 1st July, Khlong San station, on the MaeKlong Railway line closed. Opened in two parts in 1904 and 1905, the MaeKlong Railway ran from Pak Khlong San via Wong Wien Yai to Mahachai, then on the other side of the river from Ban Laem to Talat Rom Hup in MaeKlong. The line is still open in 2023, but the connecting bridge from Mahachai to Ban Laem was never built, and the railway is famous for literally running through the Rom Hup market, at its MaeKlong terminus, whilst the market is open and trading!

On 12th December, the Council of Ministers of the Royal Thai Government passed a resolution to close down all tramways in Bangkok.

The Hong Kong Football Club, Hong Kong

Visited in March 2023


The Hong Kong Football Club, founded in 1886, has a slightly misleading name because it's much more than just a football club. It does have football teams, including its first team which plays in the top tiers of Hong Kong football, but it's also a private members club with a club house that has a huge number of facilities. Until recently the club's first football team was amateur, with a squad mostly consisting of expats, but in 2021 a decision was taken to professionalize and increase the number of local players.

The club's football/rugby and hockey pitches are situated inside the Happy Valley racecourse which runs round the outside. Next to the football/rugby pitch is the sportsman's bar, and there's also an outdoor bowling green next to the sportsman's bar. These facilities

are reached via a tunnel which runs from the clubhouse under the racecourse. The clubhouse itself also has sports facilities, including 6 tennis courts on the roof, a 25 metre outdoor swimming pool, golf simulators, a large gym, squash courts, a large indoor bowling green, a ten pin bowling alley, a snooker room, and a large multi-use sports hall for games like badminton or netball. All these facilities are free to members and reciprocal members, although reciprocal members can't introduce guests to accompany them.

Other facilities include the Chairman's Bar and the Captain's Bar, a large casual dining café called the Coffee Shop which has an outside area next to the swimming pool, a more formal restaurant, a family lounge bar, a children's play area, and a movie+book library. The






sports hall can also be transformed into a large-scale banqueting and events space. However, the club has no accommodation. When not playing sport, the dress code is smart casual throughout the club.

Every year Hong Kong hosts an international Rugby Sevens event, with seven-a-side men's and women's teams competing, playing matches which consist of seven minute halves with just a two minute break between halves. For the two days prior to Rugby Sevens, the Hong Kong Football Club traditionally hosts a Rugby Tens event, which began in 1986 to commemorate the centenary of the Hong Kong Football Club.

We only found out about the club's Rugby Tens event when a friend, who lives in Hong Kong and is a member of the Hong Kong Football Club, took us for drinks and dinner in the club. We had a nice meal in the Chairman's Bar, accompanied by some good claret from the club's reasonably priced wine list. It was halfway through the Rugby Tens event, so before we went to bed we sent an email to the British Club Bangkok to

request a letter of introduction so that we could attend the event the following day.

When the letter of introduction arrived first thing the following morning, the Hong Kong Football Club replied to say that apart from the letter of introduction, they also required several documents to be submitted by email in advance: (1) photo ID such as a passport or club membership card, (2) a 2-way flight itinerary which should show that the stay in Hong Kong is for less than 2 months, and (3) credit card details. The reply also specified that all this should be submitted at least 48 hours in advance of any intended visit. Nonetheless, I immediately sent them the required documents by email, and on arrival at the club a couple of hours later we were allowed into the club. We had a good time watching the rugby. In spite of the slightly onerous entry procedure, with its extensive facilities this club is thoroughly recommended for any British Club Bangkok members who visit Hong Kong.

EVENT REPORT:

“How to prioritise your health and wellbeing” held on Wednesday, 19th April 2023:

Long-term Club Member Chee Hong Teo (‘Chad’) who has been at the forefront of anti-aging and wellness developments and activities in Thailand for many years, was introduced by Section Committee Member Barbara Meynert in front of a small, but very interested and later vociferous group of section and club members.

Chad’s 12 Top Tips for Seniors Healthy Living, which Barbara and Noah had turned into a well-received infographic gift from the Section to the event’s participants, Chad set out his comments on: healthy eating, regular exercise, staying hydrated, getting enough sleep, stress management, staying socially engaged, staying mentally active, getting regular health check-ups, avoiding harmful substances, practicing good hygiene, preventing falls, and lastly staying informed on seniors health developments. A number of helpful tips emerged; courtesy of some lively experiences as set out by some of the attendees!





Focussing next on new anti-aging developments, including on-going work here in Thailand, Chad introduced his colleague, John Wood, who continues to be heavily involved in the use of stem-cell technology in Bangkok. John highlighted a number of areas where the technology has been able to provide real benefits to some very poorly patients, setting out steps taken from first contact with the patient through to successful end results. This generated considerable interest from attendees which ranged from the incredulous to the 'I want it now'.

The discussion broadened to include side effects, timelines for treatments, estimates of costs involved, and moved on to the current hot topic of 'ethics', particularly relating to the harvesting of embryonic stem cells. John clarified

that stem cells are now harvested from the placenta (which would normally be discarded) and from the patient's own cells. John also mentioned NAD+, an "anti-ageing" coenzyme that is critical in energy metabolism and regulating cellular processes and functions, now seen as "the fountain of youth".

John's knowledge and understanding stood out, and as the discussion finalised, he tempered his comments in that stem cell technology really does hold promise as a potential treatment for certain age-related diseases, but it is not a guaranteed solution for reversing the aging process altogether. But it is important to continue researching and developing safe and effective ways to use stem cells for medical purposes while considering ethical implications.

This was a thoroughly engaging and interesting presentation by both Chad and John, who were thanked in the usual manner.

What a great day for Tennis.






This year's Gross Eclectic Champion was Bryan Dodd with a fine 73 over the 2 rounds.






