



## Joanne

Hi I am Joanne Lynn Finnamore-Crorkin and I am HM Consul at the British Embassy. I have held the position for almost a year now. I joined the Foreign Office over 40 years ago and over the years have built a career focussing on consular work having worked in Malaysia from 2017-2022, overseeing the consular teams based in KL, Singapore, Hanoi, HCMC, Phnom Penh, Brunei, Vientiane and Yangon. From 2007-2011 I was the Consul at the British Embassy, Manila. And in the late nineties I was the Consul in Lagos, Nigeria. I am passionate about consular work and helping British Nationals when they find themselves in a position not to be able to help themselves. I also have extensive experience dealing with crisis work, having been involved in the evacuation of British Nationals in Zaire in 1991, assisting with the Tsunami in Japan in 2011, volcanic ash situation affecting British nationals travelling from Thailand in 2010, the Lombok earthquake in 2018 and the departure of British nationals from the Gambia in 2017.

## Stories of HM Consul & a Long-Serving Staff Member of the Consular Team in Bangkok.

## Gift Mananya

I have been working in the consular team, British Embassy Bangkok for 20 years. There has been much change and development within the Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office (FCDO) through all of this time, and I have adapted well to these changes to become a very experienced all-rounded officer. I started working as a Consular Assistant, Passport Officer, Consular Officer as ETD Champion of this region and Notarial Documentary Services expert. Currently I am a Pro Consul and Designed Safeguarding Officer (DSO) dealing with many complex cases. DSOs are consular officers from across the network who have attended training and obtained a level of knowledge about child safeguarding, so we can offer advice on cases and suggest next steps on child cases involving suspected abuse or neglect. Most child cases and some complex cases continue to be referred to us and we have Child Protection Unit (CPU) and UK Social workers to support us in London. Some cases are referred to local social services, Thai authorities (Police, Immigration, hospital, Ministry of Foreign Affairs) or the Childline organisation.



To work within the Consular section, British Embassy Bangkok is quite challenging however I can deal with the cases due to my all-round expertise. I am well aware that working in a consular team we should also be flexible with our time and availability, especially during a crisis or major complex case and our aims are the same: an excellent Consular service for British Nationals who need it and my team's focus is on supporting them.



## Consular team

If asked what are two most important pieces of advice I can give to British nationals, they would be:

- 1. Sign up to our Thailand Travel Advice on GOV.UK
- 2. It is important to ensure all personal matters and end-of-life arrangements are organised and documented well in advance.

## Here are examples of some of the ways in which we can assist British nationals:

- Help with making contact to friends and family back home using our phones and internet
- Issue an emergency travel document, print out tickets and other urgent documents to enable travel
- Provide information about transferring money, and in the most exceptional cases, request an emergency loan
- Provide a list of local lawyers, interpreters, doctors or funeral directors
- Provide support to British nationals detained, liaise with lawyers, authorities and families
- Support victims of rape, sexual or physical assault or other victims of crime when liaising with police, medical and victim support services

- Direct those in need of places of safety, specialist welfare services or support networks to the appropriate agencies
- Signpost those in need of emergency shelter to places of safety and charitable accommodation providers

## And some of the things we're unable to assist with:

- Make travel arrangements
- Help with entering or exiting Thailand without a valid passport, visa, or permission from immigration authorities
- Pay any outstanding bills, medical costs or penalty fines
- Give advice that is best provided by a professional or make decisions on your behalf
- Investigate crimes, search for missing people or interfere with the judicial process
- Request and enhanced level of treatment in hospital or prison than is provided locally
- Look after children, force medical help or provide shelter

Financial planning is not generally covered as part of any school curriculum and education. As a result, it's usually the responsibility of parents to teach and guide children about money.

Beginning the process of teaching and guiding young people about good financial decisions can't begin early enough. A study from Cambridge University and the Money Advice Service found that children's habits regarding money are usually formed by the age of seven. Some sensible ways to begin include:

- 1. Making savings a habit as soon as possible and providing rewards for saving.
- 2. Keeping children involved and interested by showing them how their money grows.
- 3. Discussing the difference between short-term, medium-term and long-term goals and how saving can help.
- 4. Explaining compound interest and how this can help accelerate the journey to reaching long-term goals.
- 5. Introducing the idea of risk and reward.

So where do you start? There are some useful online tools which you can tap into. Practical Money Skills by VISA (https://practicalmoneyskills.com) is a website that aims to provide some first steps into financial education with information, games and guides aimed at children.

It can also be valuable to tackle some of the more complex elements of financial planning including investing. Setting up an account with a small amount of money which you use to make minor investments with your children can be a great tool to help with introducing your child to the stock market.

Letting children select their own investments may initially mean they choose for their own reasons such as liking a company name. Over time you can introduce more complicated concepts such as investigating the background of companies, their management approach and price to earnings. A few financial planning product options for children do actually exist in the UK.

Child Trust Funds (CTFs), which were a long-term tax-free savings account just for children. New subscriptions are not allowed because the scheme is now closed but Junior ISAs are available. There's no tax to pay on the CTF income or any profit made, and it will not affect any UK benefits or tax credits received.

Junior Individual Savings Accounts (ISAs) are long-term, tax-free savings accounts for children. For the current tax year the maximum investment is £9000. To have a Junior ISA the child must be both under 18 and living in the UK, or they can only get a Junior ISA if you are a Crown Servant (in the UK's armed forces, diplomatic service or overseas civil service), and they depend on you for care.

There are little or no distinct tax-advantaged options available for expat children in Thailand. However, the planning principles and ideas do not change despite the lack of actual products available.

It is always worth planning early, and assisting the financial education of children at a young age is more important now than ever. Particularly with the availability of information technology at everyone's fingertips these days.

As always, we recommend that you seek appropriate professional advice on any financial matter.



## Anyone for a dip?

The major event of 1965 was the member consultation, financing, and design of the proposed Swimming Pool and our original Squash Court. Initially a survey was conducted of all 281 members and all the 83 responses were totally in favour of the idea. The Vice-Chairman, Dacre Raikes (see 'Service' below), then obtained quotations, designs, estimates of running costs and started negotiations with banks over possible loans.

That preparation work completed, two Extraordinary General Meetings were held to agree to build the pool and squash court (with ancillary changing room and bar) and borrow 750,000 Ticals from the Chartered Bank of India, Australia, and China. The EGM on 21st June approved the project by 43 to two and the confirmation EGM on 27th July was approved by 33 to one. It was also agreed as part of the package to raise the joining fee to 250 Ticals and the subscriptions to 100 Ticals a month (if single or your family were not in Thailand) and 120 Ticals for all others.

On 16th December, a special daytime Committee meeting opened the six sealed tenders and on 27th December the Club redeemed our two Land Deeds ("Chanotes") from Hong Kong & Shanghai Bank as part of the security required by the Chartered Bank (see Past Participle, December 2021) ... all was now ready to dig up Tennis Courts 5, 6, 7 & 8!

## **Our Naval Year**

On 15th February, the Club hosted a party for twelve Petty Officers of HMAS Derwent (DE49), a River-class destroyer escort, at the request of Commander Rothesay 'Ross' C. Swan, its Commanding Officer, a past Club Committee Member and past Naval Member of the Military Planning Office in SEATO (Southeast Asia Treaty Organization) HQ in Bangkok. Commander Swan also held a dinner party at the Club for his friends. Commander Swan retired in 1983 with the rank of Rear-Admiral. The plaque of HMAS Derwent is on display in the Churchill Bar.

On 5th May, HMS London (D16), a County-class destroyer, docked in Bangkok, and were honoured by a visit by Their Majesties King Bhumibol and Queen Sirikit. The Club extended use of the Club facilities to the crew. The plaque of HMS London is on display in the Churchill Bar. Sadly, one crew member, Able Seaman Brian Charles Dade, aged 25, died during this tour of duty, and he was buried at Bangkok Protestant Cemetery.

May continued with a number of other visits - HMS Loch Fada (K390), a Loch-class frigate from 4th to 8th; HMS Plymouth (F126), a Rothesay-class Royal Navy frigate, and HMAS Parramatta (DE46), a River-class Royal Australian Navy destroyer escort, on 23rd and 25th respectively. Both the plaques of HMS Loch Fada and HMS Plymouth are on display in the Churchill Bar.



## Speedbird Calling

It was agreed on 10th February to allow British Overseas Airways Corporation (BOAC) flight crews to use the Club on their stopovers that were now being started on their London to Australia routes. The Club would receive 600 Ticals as a fee for use of the facilities by each aircrew, who, in turn, would pay for their Food & Beverage with coupons purchased from the Permanent Assistant secretary.

This arrangement continued through the 1974 merger with British European Airways to form British Airways and even to the joint working arrangement with Qantas. It ceased only in 2002 when the fee suddenly stopped being paid.

## Club News

1965 opened with the perennial problem of the Bowling Alley. It was, again, falling down with damage to the floor and the roof. In addition, many complaints had been received about it being used as a playground by children. After much debate it was agreed to spend another 12,000 Ticals to bring the floor back up to spec with another 28,000 Ticals for the roof. It was also agreed to issue new bylaws to stop children using the Alley unattended - no-one it seems blamed the parents!

## OUTPOST

In April, the Club was presented with a copy of 'Way-foong' the centenary book of the Hongkong & Shanghai Bank (the title being the old Chinese name for the bank ... "focus of wealth"). Unfortunately, by September it had been noted by the Committee that the book had been stolen!

Also, in April we started the 'Businessmen's Hour' promotion from 5pm to 6pm – this also became a cropper in September when, due to poor patronage, it was discontinued.

On 10th September, the Committee instigated the first 'New Member Night' whereby all membership candidates would have to attend and be interviewed by all members of the committee. This was not the overwhelming success that it had been hoped in that some 'interviews' took so long that not all applicants could be seen by all ten committee members. It was this agreed that in future applicants need only get the following signatures: the Chairman or Vice-Chairman, the Honorary Secretary plus four others.




## Royal Over-Seas League, London

Visited in July 2019 & December 2022 by Paul Doust and Prasit Jangkamol (a.k.a. Jack)

The <u>Royal Over-Seas League</u> is a not-for-profit private members' club, founded in 1910, and located in the St. James's area of central London. The club's website says that it's "dedicated to championing international friendship and understanding throughout the Commonwealth and beyond", and has branches located in several countries including Australia, Canada, and New Zealand. The clubhouse is tucked away at the end of a short cul-de-sac off St James's Street, very near the Ritz hotel in Piccadilly.

The club has 2 dining rooms and 83 bedrooms for members and reciprocal members to use when staying in London. The main formal dining room is called the 1910 Dining Room and is decorated in an art-deco style. The Brabourne Room is the secondary dining room, and there's also a bar called the Duke of York bar. Both the Brabourne Room and the bar overlook the garden, so both have wonderful views looking west over Green Park. Food and drinks are also served in the garden, weather permitting. There's also a room called the members drawing room, as well as a number of rooms where events can be held. The club's dress code is smart casual, although men are encouraged to wear jackets in the 1910 dining room in the evening. Despite having no sports facilities, in some ways this club has the atmosphere of an exclusive hotel.





On our first visit in 2019, the 1910 Dining Room and was closed for renovation, but nonetheless we had a nice enough meal in the Brabourne room. A few days after that we had a lovely lazy summer afternoon sitting in the garden, drinking chilled white wine, and catching up with some friends who were visiting London. The 1910 dining room finally opened again in September 2022 and unlike the restaurants at a lot of London clubs, it's open at weekends. On Sundays there's an additional roast menu, so while we were in the UK for Christmas last year, we took some friends there for the Sunday lunch. It was great meal, and there was a reasonable wine list too.

Although I haven't used the club's accommodation myself, I got talking to a British Club Bangkok member about this club in March 2022 when I went along to the opening of the phase 2 poolside redevelopment. He gave me a good report of the club, telling me that he always stays there when he's visiting London. With a less formal dress code and its prime central London location, any British Club member should consider this club if they need accommodation or dining facilities while visiting London.

## Cycling the Length of Great Britain: A "Tell All" Presentation on

Wednesday, 16th August 2023:

The Section's first evening event commenced in the Suriwongse Room with enjoyment of Khun Laak's delicious canapes and drinks from the Club Bar as the attendees gathered together for what proved to be a memorable evening. Section Committee Chair Terry introduced long-term Club and Seniors Section Member Bruce Darrington, who once again entertaining us, this time with his lively, interesting and superbly documented slides enhanced with fabulous photographs from his

We learned that his incredibly detailed route and overnighting planning took even longer that the ride, then the "whys and how's", the funniest and most challenging moments of his epic journey, the people he met, the places where he overnighted (including Bodmin Jail in Cornwall). We even saw photos of the massive farm tractors that forced him off the sideroads, canal, and old railway tracks he used and where these monster vehicles unintentionally forced him into the ditches on a few occasions. We enjoyed some laughs and insightful discussions as we delved with Bruce into the world of long-distance cycling and eventually, we learned that the reason for holding the presentation this early in the month was because the very next day, he was travelling to France to cycle the length of France! This revelation was well received and Bruce was asked back to speak again about this, his next long-distance cycling 'expedition'.


### **EVENT REPORT:**

"The Silent Thief: Glaucoma's Devastating Effects on Ageing Eyes", Lunch Lunch Meeting on Wednesday, 13th September 2023:

Club and Seniors Section Member, retired ophthalmic surgeon Dr. Jinendra Kotari was our guest speaker at this lunch event in front of a very interested audience of Section and Club Members. He started by asking how many of the attendees had contracted Glaucoma, and a number of hands were raised. Dr. Jinendra took the audience through a somewhat terrifying series of examples of the effects of this really invasive disease that people just do not know about or even know that they have contracted, often until it is too late to save failing eyesight. Details were given amd explanations made using excellent schematics, imagery, and video clips, leaving the audience in no doubt that they all needed to be aware of symptoms and the consequent need to take professional advice. Happily, he went on to set out what can be done to mittigate the risk of contracting the disease, and some of the means to partially 'stave it off', including surgery as a last resort.








