

### THE CONSULAR SECTION OF THE BRITISH EMBASSY

### Hello again!

This month, the British Embassy is pleased to provide an overview of our work and a bit of up to date information on www.GOV.UK.

In October, we managed 117 urgent assistance cases, including arrests and detentions, welfare support, and hospitalizations for various reasons. We extended support to a total of 37 families following the loss of their loved ones, which involved a mixture of deaths in hospitals and at home. Most were from natural courses. Additionally, we issued 33 Emergency Travel Documents (ETDs) and offered 198 documentary services (allowing British nationals to get married in Thailand).

As you can see, we dealt with a high number of deaths, this is common each month. Apart from providing support to the bereaved families, we also issue a Consular letter for Thai local authorities or hospitals to release the body for burial, cremation, or repatriation. This consular letter is issued free of charge.

While we cannot pay any burial, cremation, or repatriation expenses ourselves or settle any debts (especially hospital bills), we can help transfer money from friends and relatives in the UK to pay any necessary costs here in Thailand. We have to hand details of local and international funeral directors and are constantly up-dating the list. More information about what to do when a British person dies in Thailand can be found on <a href="https://www.gov.uk">www.gov.uk</a>.

The Consular Section of the British Embassy would like to take this opportunity to wish you all a Happy and Safe Christmas. If you plan to travel during the Christmas holiday, please ensure you get travel insurance and sign up for the Travel Advice for the country you will be visiting if leaving Thailand. And do remember to check that your passport is valid before you travel (and also that the back page is filled in with details of who should be contacted in an emergency).

At the time of writing, work in the Games Room located in the main Clubhouse is nearly completed as we await delivery of the pool tables along with installation of Televisions and dart boards so the facility will be fully functional during December.

In signing off I would like to confirm the comments made last month in that we will be closing the November accounts with the financial year having significantly outperformed the budgeted revenue and cash surplus. A key highlight is that the good financial result has been achieved without raising any F&B menu prices and with The Club having a record number of over 1,450 members we can look forward to many good times ahead.

I sincerely thank everyone who has supported the Club throughout the year and contributed to its continued success.

With so many investment fund options available it's important to understand the main differences in what is a fairly wide and often confusing marketplace.

### UNIT TRUSTS (UTS) & OPEN-ENDED INVESTMENT COMPANIES (OEICS)

Two of the most common types of fund are unit trusts and open-ended investment companies (OEICs). They share many traits but they also have some important differences.

Because they will always accept more cash from investors – they just become bigger to accommodate the demand. On the flip side, if there are more sellers than buyers, the fund will become smaller.

The price of a fund always reflects the value of its holdings. When more investors want to buy into the fund than sell, the manager issues more units. When the opposite is true, the manager cancels units.

They are more widely used even though some are more expensive than their investment trust alternatives. The great advantages of open-ended funds are their flexibility to make more units, as well as the fact there are more funds available meaning a greater choice for investors. This differs from a closed-ended fund, which issues a fixed number of non-redeemable shares like an Investment Trust which are closed-ended funds.

### What is a Unit Trust?

Unit trusts were the first real "open-ended' investment fund in the UK, termed so because the fund manager can create new units (similar to shares) in the fund to meet investor demand. These units can be bought or sold at any time. This differs from a closed-ended fund, which issues a fixed number of non-redeemable shares. Investment trusts are closed-ended funds.

### What is an OEIC?

In 1997, laws were introduced allowing the creation of OEICs, which are also open-ended. Over the last few decades OEICs have become a lot more common and many unit trusts have converted to the OEIC structure. This is due to the relative simplicity of OEICs and the fact they can broadly be sold into different countries across Europe.

Most new funds that are launched are structured as OEICs particularly in the UK.

### What's the difference between UT's and OEICs?

In many respects unit trusts and OEICs are the same. They are both open-ended and the price of each unit depends on the net asset value of the fund's investment portfolio. Both allow you to choose to have dividends paid to you as income or reinvested in the fund and both can invest in a wide range of asset classes, geographies and sectors.

A subtle difference is a unit trust is governed by trust law, whereas an OEIC is governed by company law. Technically, this means investors in a unit trust are not owners of the underlying assets, unlike investors in an OEIC although in reality this makes little difference to investors. If you invest in a unit trust you buy units whereas if you invest in an OEIC you buy shares.

The major difference between unit trusts and OEICs is the way they're priced. Unit trusts quote a bid price and an offer

price; OEICs only quote one price. With unit trusts, the bid price is the per-unit price you'll receive if you sell your units back to the fund company. It's usually based on the bid price of the underlying securities held by the fund.

### **INVESTMENT TRUSTS**

Investment trusts are effectively companies that hold assets such as shares. They are run by a fund manager and is backed by an independent board acting in the best interests of shareholders. The company itself is listed on the London Stock Exchange. While investment trusts predominantly invest in the shares of other companies, they can also invest in other financial assets.

As a closed ended fund, investment trusts have a fixed number of shares in an issue. This allows managers to take a longer-term view because they do not have to sell assets when investors sell their shares. Investment trusts suit a number of different types of investors thanks to some of the unique features that set them aside from other types of funds.

Income seekers may be interested to know that investment trusts can hold back up to 15% of income generated by underlying assets each year to build up a reserve to be used to smooth dividend payments in tougher times. This means investors can enjoy a steady income when markets are performing. In certain circumstances, investment company boards may elect to pay income out of capital. While this can erode the long-term capital returns generated by the funds many investors are happy to prioritise short-term income payments over longer term growth.

Growth investors might be interested in another unusual feature which allows investment trusts to borrow. This means that if managers think there is value in a particular market, they can borrow money to use for further investments, known as "gearing".

In a rising market, returns from an investment trust can be magnified because gearing means managers are better able to take advantage of rising share prices. However, when share prices fall, the losses of geared funds can be exaggerated. The pricing of investment trusts works in a unique way to. When the price is greater than the value of the assets held in the company, this is known as a premium. At a time it is lower it is known as a discount.

### **EXCHANGE-TRADED FUNDS (ETFS)**

An ETF is called an exchange-traded fund because it's traded on an exchange just like stocks. The price of an ETF's shares will change throughout the trading day as the shares are bought and sold on the market. This is unlike mutual funds, which are not traded on an exchange, and which trade only once per day after the markets close. Additionally, ETFs tend to be cheaper and more liquid when compared to mutual funds like UTs and OEICS.

An ETF can also hold multiple underlying assets and as such are also a popular choice for diversification. The assets can include stocks, commodities, bonds, or a mixture of investment types. Some ETFs focus on only U.S. offerings, while others have a global outlook.

There are many investment options available and a number of ways of holding these investments. They can be purchased by the public directly though Trading Accounts or through Investment Advisers.

For whatever reason you are thinking about investing do research the options to understand the key considerations which may affect you. We would always suggest that you seek professional advice from a company you can trust.




### Behind the Scenes

We continue the story of the British Club Bangkok ... 1967

### I am the Manager!

The Club had been 'managed' since its 1946 re-founding by the Committee, with a Butler running operations and a Permanent Assistant Secretary doing the accounts (see Past Participle, March 2022). Late in 1966, the Committee used the occasion of the leaving of Mrs. Kay Madar, our Permanent Assistant Secretary since 1956, to seek to appoint a Club Manager (see Past Participle, October 2023).

Thus, on 9th March, Mr. W. Hynes was appointed as our first Club Manager ... Sadly, our records show very little about him except that he resigned on 10th July! As a stop-gap Mrs. V. Asbee, a previous Permanent Assistant Secretary (see Past Participle, November 2023) stepped in as Club Manager until the Club found a replacement.

1. Minutes of the meetin, on 31st January, 1967, were approved. Matters a. The Club Manager's authorised limits of expenditure were confirmed as follows:

Baht 1,000 .- for routine repairs at any one time,

Baht 5,000.- for eash purchase at any one time, Baht 40,000.- for credit purposes at any one time.

### **Our Naval Year**

### Staff Strike

Staff relations plummeted during this year with an unprecedented number of incidents included a Strike! First of all, incidents between members and two of the "Boys" (see Past Participle, November 2023) on June 22<sup>nd</sup> and June 23<sup>rd</sup> led to one being paid off and the other warned; then a circular was sent from the staff to the Committee threatening a strike on Saturday 24th June due to unpaid overtime; the Club then had three "Boys" resign because of a new staff rota; and finally, the Labour Ministry cautioned the Club for not giving the "Boy who was paid off" any gratuity!

Things did improve with a new set of rules governing hours of work (now reduced to 41 hours per week), overtime paid in month of earning not when the member paid his bill and extra allowances were paid for fares for the few who lived off premises, and those who worked "until dawn" because members were still drinking on the premises! In addition, the year-end saw the legal founding of the 'British Club Retiral Gratuities Fund' which exists today as the old Staff Retirement Fund.

### **Bad Neighbours**

1967 was also not a good year for neighbourly relations either! The year started with the construction of the Narai Hotel (currently being rebuilt on Silom) but by August its contractors had knocked out our "Silom 18" side walls and repeatedly trespassed on our land. In order to remedy this, the Club had the Land Department remeasure the land exactly and after a round of negotiations, the Narai rebuilt our walls and agreed to lay a concrete surface on the roadway to Silom Road.

Relations with the Chinese School on our northern boundary, where the AIA Tower is now, were also bad. Boys from the school repeatedly threw bottles over the wall trying to get them into the pool, and often hitting and breaking furniture. Eventually Nai Mann, the school owner's son, issued an apology, repaired the damage, and expelled two boys!

The Chairman has spoken to the police regarding to the bottle throwing by the school children on the north side of the British Club and his complaint is on record at the police station. The glass has been replaced at their expense and there has been an improvement in behaviour. It is believed that 2 boys have been expelled from the school as a result.

### Service

Godfrey A. Sommerfield, of the Anglo-Thai Corporation was elected as chairman (see Past Participle, February 2023) whilst K.A. Page, of Colgate Palmolive, was elected as Vice-Chairman. Mr. Page served only this term. David Carpenter became Honorary Secretary (see Past Participle, July 2023) but the position of the Honorary Treasurer was left unfilled as no-one wanted the role!

Continuing their service were Leo J. McMahon, R.M. Gault, and Alexander W. Rennie. The new boys were J. Russell Greenwood, of British Information Service, who served this term only; Mr. M.D. Thacher, of Cathay Pacific Airways, who served part of this term before being relocated to Osaka in Japan, and was replaced by Mike Greenwood, who would service four more terms, once as Honorary Secretary and twice as Vice-Chairman; Mr F.D. Cran, of the Shell Company of Thailand and Mr. R.P. Evans, of Jardine Waugh, who would both serve this and part of the next term.

The vacant role of Honorary Treasurer was filled in late May by co-option of a new member, Mark Harding, of the Chartered Bank of India, Australia, and China, who had only joined that April and he served the next term as well. Strangely, no-one was asked to stand down from the Committee upon his co-option, thus the Committee ran as "eleven men" all year!

### In Other News

Valentine's Day saw the ceremonial opening by H.M. Queen Sirikit of Suriwongse Road's Montien Hotel.

On 17th March, American designer Jim Thompson opened the Suriwongse Road store of his Thai Silk Company ... he disappeared just nine days later whilst trekking in Malaysia's Cameron Highlands - still an unsolved mystery today!

Group Captain J.J. Barr became the British Air Attaché in July, but does not appear to have joined the Club.

On August 31st, the rigours of maintenance led the Club On 8th August, ASEAN (the Association of Southeast Asian Nations) was founded with five nations initially signing the Bangkok Declaration.

> On 4th October, Sir Neil Pritchard KCMG became the British Ambassador and accepted Honorary Member-

> Commander John D. Sayer RN became the British Naval Attaché and joined the Club on 28th October, and would become Club Chairman the following year! (see Past Participle, January 2024).

> Thai Farmers Bank (TFB) moved their head office to a new building in Silom Road - although the branch remains, its head office has moved several times since then. In 2003 TFB's English name became Kasikorn

> One of the first tenants of TFB Silom, above, was the first Canadian Embassy in Thailand, and on 7th December the first resident Canadian Ambassador, James Clelland Britton, accepted Honorary Membership of the Club. In 1997, the Canadian Embassy moved to Abdulrahim Place, in Rama IV Road.

> On 27th November, the 'Bangkok Color Television Network' was founded, bringing colour TV to Bangkok for the first time. In 1972, it was broadcast nationwide and, in 1974 it was renamed as Channel 7.

# Grémio Literário, Lisbon, Portugal

Visited in June 2022 by Paul Doust & Prasit Jangkamol (a.k.a. Jack)

Grémio Literário translates into English as "Literary Guild", and is a club that was created by royal charter in 1846. On holiday to Portugal last year, Lisbon was exceptionally busy with tourists following the relaxation of most Covid travel restrictions in Europe, but luckily we were able to escape the crowds for one evening because we had arranged to have dinner in the Grémio Literário.

Just uphill from central Lisbon's pedestrianised downtown area, the club's premises is a beautiful building, inside and out. It's called the Loures Palace and with its eclectic décor, was recently classified by the Portuguese Ministry for Culture as a Monument of Public Interest. Adjacent to the entrance hall on the ground floor is the Green Room for reading newspapers and magazines. Also on the ground floor are the bar and the restaurant, but weather permitting the verandah next and one of out for the out for the interest.

to the restaurant is where food is served. The verandah has a view of the river Tagus in the distance, and overlooks the club's garden too. The garden is accessible from the club's basement, and is quite a bit lower than the verandah because the clubhouse is on quite a steep hill. Some function rooms and the library are on the first floor, but the club has no accommodation or sports facilities. There was an event taking place in the library when we arrived, a talk by some person of note, and one of the adjacent rooms had been beautifully laid out for the dinner which followed the talk.

The club is open Monday to Friday, but closed at weekends, and the dress code for men is Jacket and tie. The "Member's privileges" section of the club's website lists discounts which are available at various hotels throughout Portugal, some of which can be used by reciprocal members

We had dinner on the verandah, and the elderly waiter who served us was exceptionally helpful. There was no written menu, but the waiter spoke enough English to let us know what was available. On the night we were there, the only starter was a vegetable soup, but two fish dishes and two meat dishes were available for main course. The wine list was 100% Portuguese, but it was disappointing that vintages were not specified. However, with the helpful waiter available to answer questions, and with an average bottle price of less than €20 and with no wine costing more than €40, it was hard to complain. My fish main course was more "home cooking" than "fine dining" but it was delicious, and the low bill at the end of the evening confirmed that the club offers excellent value for money. Well worth a visit for anyone visiting Lisbon.



### **EVENT REPORT:**

Can we beat Cancer? Immunotherapy's potential: Thursday, 26th October 2023.

A presentation by Dr. Do Tran from world leading Gilead Sciences Inc.

Chairperson Terry introduced our distinguished speaker to an almost record level attendance of Seniors Section members, Club members, and their Guests. Dr Do started by asking the question: who thought that we will eventually cure cancer, with a very mixed result. He would at the end, pose the same question and we could thus make a judgement on how perceptions may have changed. He started by outlining the massive numbers of deaths globally from non-communicable diseases (including Cancer), some 41 million people each year. Thailand alone suffers some 400,000 such deaths per year! He went on to cover the different types of cancer and



the statistics (from the USA) of their current survivability rates. Turning next to treatments he outlined the limitations of current treatments (surgery, then chemotherapy, then radiation) to remove or kill cancer cells and tumours.

Dr Do then turned to the body's immune system and what it does to protect the body. He then set out the differences between innate and adaptive immune systems, leading on to how "immunotherapy" is the use of the immune system's ability to fight cancer by activating or suppressing the immune system. He set out the different types of research that is being undertaken using newly developed drugs to manipulate the immune system to target specific cancers. Noting also that cancer cells 'fight back' through mutations, means that this massive research 'thrust' also needs to in its own way 'mutate' their efforts to combat and eventually overcome the cancerous cells. He mentioned some of the successes, an example being that in trials, some 90% of children and adults



with B-Cell acute lymphoblastic leukaemia (B All) achieved remission after receiving 'CAR-T Cell Therapy'. The fight goes on, death rates are reducing despite the fact that people are living longer. He concluded by outlining the areas where future research and developments are likely to be heading: diagnostics, imaging, immunotherapy, personalised treatments, off-the -shelf immunotherapies, and accessibility.

An enthralling presentation by someone who really does know what he is talking about. There were a number of helpful interventions as well as many questions from the audience, before the Chairperson closed the presentation and called for thanks in the usual manner.

### **EVENT REPORT:**

Learn the Implications of the new Income Tax Regulations in Thailand: Thursday, 9th November 2023.

A presentation by Kiatchai Sophastienphong, Thailand's ex-Vice Minister of Finance and so much more.








A record turnout for this event showed just how worried both expats and locals are regarding what might be included in the changing regulations (not the Law) that the Revenue Department are currently working on for implementation from 1st January 2024. Khun Kiatchai took us through the realities of the now and then explored what he thought, based on what he knows, might be included in the new regulations and how this might impact on all Thailand's residents for tax purposes (ie being in the Kingdom for 180 days or more in any one year). As of early November, the reality is that we know what we don't know until clarifications are set out, and we don't know when that will be!

The numerous questions from the attendees, which were well answered by Kiatchai, mirrored the probability that most attendees could well be significantly impacted, even though not the primary target of the Revenue Department, ie we 'fall through the cracks', and that there is no entity that can 'speak for us' as a very large group of individuals in Thailand!

Given the sophistication of the technology and synchronicity that now exists between the Revenue Department and Thailand's Banks, Kiatchai's suggestion was that everyone who is resident in Thailand for tax purposes should, if they haven't already, obtain a Tax ID and submit an online Tax Return, as from 30th March 2025 every resident for tax purposes will be required to submit their Tax Return.

# TENNIS

**Even** at my 'young' age I am surprised that I can learn something new that research has caused. Some of the tussles between the old – what we k-new then; and the new – what we k-now now, are often the cause of intrafamily spiced debates; for example, my 'better-half' often could prove that tennis was not aerobic enough for maintaining a healthy heart; and I need something more aerobic to survive from young age into old! Well, that changed recently when the doctor suggested that my better-half could join when the results of my health checkup were discussed. That turned out to be a blessing in

(when) you're doing physical activities at a moderate or vigorous intensity. One way to tell if it's a moderate-intensity aerobic activity is that *you'll be able to talk, but not sing the words to your favourite song* (I love this, but not sure if Henry does). Here are some examples of activities:

- Walking fast
- Doing water aerobics
- Riding a bike on level ground or with few hills
- Playing doubles tennis
- Pushing a lawn mower"

I reckon playing doubles tennis is definitely more fun than pushing a lawn mower; so, my choice has been made with the up-to-date evidence from the Fauci Institute. 


Our next major British Club Golf Section fixture is the Club Championships which will take place at Banyan Golf Club, Hua Hin Golf Club on the 25th and 26th November.




also experiencing the new wicket for the first time.
