CONNECTED FINANCIAL THINKING

UNDERSTANDING THE UK SPRING STATEMENT

UK Tax - Domicile & UK Inheritance Exposure Changes

UK Inheritance Tax being based on domicile has changed from 6 April 2025. Instead, whether an individual pays UK inheritance tax (IHT) will be based on residence.

What were the rules to 5th April 2025?

Where an individual was UK domiciled or deemed domiciled, they would have paid UK IHT on their worldwide assets. Domicile is a complex UK common law concept; a person born in the UK acquires a domicile of origin which is only lost, and a domicile of choice acquired, if that person has their permanent home in another country and severs all ties with the UK. Deemed domiciled is where an individual has been UK resident for at least 15 of the previous 20 tax years.

What has changed from 6 April 2025?

From 6 April 2025 whether an individual pays UK IHT will move from a domicile-based system to a residence-based system. The distinction between individuals who are UK domiciled or deemed domiciled and those who aren't, will be replaced by a distinction between those who qualify as LTRs and those who don't.

Who will be a long-term resident?

From 6 April 2025 an individual who has been resident in the UK for at least 10 out of the previous 20 tax years, will be classed as an LTR. For example, someone who has been resident in the UK for 11 years so is currently either domiciled or deemed domiciled. However, as he has been UK resident at least 10 out of the previous 20 tax years he will become a LTR from 6 April 2025 and therefore will pay IHT on his worldwide assets.

There are transitional rules for individuals who are neither UK resident nor UK-domiciled or deemed domicile in 2025/26. Those individuals will only be considered LTR

if they meet the existing deemed domiciled tests (UK resident for 15 out of the previous 20 tax years and UK resident in the current year or one of the three previous tax years ending with the relevant tax year).

If we take the example above, as this individual has only been resident in the UK for 11 years, if they leave the UK before 2025/26 and do not return, they would not be considered an LTR. However, if they returned to the UK, the new rules would apply and they would be subject to the 10 out of 20 years residence test, which would include the years of residence in the UK up to 2024/25.

What are the effects of being long-term resident?

An LTR will be subject to IHT on assets situated in both the UK and aboard. This effectively means that an individual moving to the UK has a 10-year period where they would only pay IHT on UK situated assets. If an individual becomes an LTR and subsequently leaves the UK, it will take between 3 and 10 years for them to be outside the scope of IHT (tail provision). Where the individual has been resident for 13 years or less, they will remain an LTR for three full tax years after leaving the UK. This 'tail' will increase by 1 year for every additional year of UK residency until the 10-year 'tail' is hit.

Having this 'tail' can mean that gifts made by LTRs may fall within the scope of IHT even if the individual, at the time of their death, is no longer an LTR.

The LTR test will reset where an individual has been non-resident for 10 consecutive years before returning to the UK.

The Hove Club, Sussex, England

Visited in October 2023 by Paul Doust



The Hove Club was founded in 1882 and advertises itself as "Hove's Premier Business & Social Club". Its clubhouse, completed in the Jacobean style in 1898, was designed by a local Irish architect and is now a grade 2 listed building. These days the club is located in the building's ground floor and basement, with full use of the garden, while the 1st floor is occupied by a firm of accountants. The list of Chairmen on the board in the entrance hall shows that the club originally had a distinctly military character, because in the early days the chairman was often a general or a colonel. However, these days the members come from a wide range of professional and business backgrounds, and both men and women can join the club.

The club is open 7 days a week, with the exact opening and closing times depending on the day, as shown on the club's website. Lunch is available Monday to Friday, but the bar is open every day from 11:30am. The facilities of the club include a snooker and games room, a reading and TV room (which doubles as the members' restaurant), and 4 function rooms. The bar is a "No Mobile Phone Zone". The dress code is smart casual, so men are not required to wear a jacket and tie. The club organises various events throughout the year, and there's also a bridge club and a book club. The club has no accommodation.

I still have some friends in Brighton and Hove because I lived there as a boy, so on my last visit to Brighton I took one of them for lunch at the club. There were

just 2 of us having lunch that day, and because I had booked lunch the week before, they had laid a table for us in one of their function rooms before we got there. The lunch was nice enough, and afterwards we retired to the bar where we got talking to some of the other members. This was the club where I met the retired diplomat who had worked at the British Embassy in Beijing for 10 years, and who I mentioned in my review of the National Liberal Club last month.

The fact that it's open 7 days a week makes it more useful that some of the London clubs that are only open Monday to Friday. Overall, the club seems well organised, so it's a useful watering hole should any British Club Bangkok members find themselves in the Brighton and Hove area.







COACH INTERVIEW – Terry: Cheetham A Life Dedicated to Squash and Junior Development

This month, we shine a light on a man whose life has been inseparable from squash—both on the court and on the sidelines. From representing South Australia as a junior to coaching national teams across Asia, Terry has built a legacy that continues to inspire the next generation.

Q: Terry, your squash journey started quite early. Can you tell us about those early days?

Absolutely. I first represented the South Australia Junior Team in 1969 alongside Rodney Clift and Phil Wierner. From there, things accelerated—I won the SA Schoolboys Championships, multiple junior and U21 titles, and then moved on to national and international tournaments. It was a great era to grow up in squash, with strong teammates and an intense love for the game.

Q: You transitioned from player to coach quite seamlessly. What motivated that shift?

After years of competitive squash—representing Australia, captaining the national team, and later moving to Hong Kong for both work and play—I realized that coaching was a natural next step. It wasn't just about the sport anymore; it was about mentoring. I've always believed that the court is a place where young people learn discipline, humility, and self-belief.

Q: You've coached at the highest level. What are some standout moments?

There are many, but a few stand out: being Head Coach of the Thailand National Team at the SEA Games in Kuala Lumpur, leading the squad to the Asian Games in Indonesia, and managing the team through several SEA Cup tournaments across Southeast Asia. Each event was unique, but the common thread was the pride of seeing athletes give their all—for themselves and for their country.

Q: Since 2015, you've been based in Bangkok, coaching at Shrewsbury International School. What's your focus there?

At Shrewsbury, the emphasis is on nurturing young talent while balancing academics and sport. Junior development is close to my heart—it's where I see the biggest transformation. The kids grow in confidence, agility, and mindset. My goal is to help them love the game and push their limits.

Q: And now you've also been involved with the British Club's Junior Squash Academy. Can you tell us about that?

Yes-this initiative was started by Bart Weaver-Berthet one year ago and has been a fantastic addition to the Club. It's given members' kids the opportunity to discover the fun and excitement of squash, starting from the basics and gradually progressing to more advanced challenges. Some have even reached the stage where they're competing in tournaments and proudly representing the Club.

All levels are catered for, and it's been incredibly rewarding to watch the kids develop over the year-not just in skill, but in confidence and enthusiasm. We've got more activities lined up, including a junior league,

tournaments, and friendly matches. A big thank you to the Squash Section for their ongoing support of the Academy, and of course to the parents who've been there every step of the way. We have an exciting year ahead, and I'm very happy with the advancement of our kids.

Q: How would you describe your coaching philosophy?

Discipline, respect, and passion. I don't just train athletes—I aim to shape responsible, resilient individuals. Wins and titles are great, but it's the journey and the effort that truly count.

Q: Finally, what message would you share with aspiring young players in our club?

Love the grind. It's not always easy, but it's always worth it. Be coachable, stay humble, and never stop learning. Every match is an opportunity to grow—take it.

"Rewilding Bangkok's City Centre": 20th March 2025

Section Chair Terry Adams welcomed attendees and introduced the guest speaker, internationally acclaimed landscape architect Chatchanin Sung. Khun Chatchanin led the landscape design team behind the multi-award-winning Benjakitti Forest Park in Bangkok, overseeing the project from its earliest concept stages through to its celebrated public opening. Terry outlined her career path, from her first degree at Chulalongkorn University, through international experience in Dubai and Hong Kong, to her current role as Executive Director and Landscape Studio Director at Arsomsilp Community and Environmental Architects in Bangkok.

The Benjakitti Forest Park project was a landmark collaboration with Turenscape, a renowned Chinese architectural consultancy. Under Khun Chatchanin's leadership, the transformation of a former tobacco factory site into a vibrant, biodiverse urban forest earned global recognition—most notably, the title of Landscape Architecture of the Year 2024 at the BLT Built Design Awards.















With an engaging mix of visuals, including slides and short video clips, she guided the captivated audience through the park's development journey. Her presentation emphasized the project's core principles: ecological restoration, flood resilience, and urban biodiversity. The design incorporates over 3,500 trees, native planting, and thoughtfully repurposed structures, all built on Sponge City principles—allowing the park to absorb, store, and filter rainwater through a system of flood-resilient ponds and elevated walkways.

Importantly, the park is also a place of human reconnection with nature, balancing environmental function with community recreation and education.









An enthusiastic and extended Q&A session followed, with members expressing great interest in seeing the project firsthand. The clear consensus was to organize a Club visit to Benjakitti Forest Park, ideally scheduled for the cooler winter months.

EVENT REPORT:

"Healthy Brain – Healthy Living" Medical Presentations by Three Bangkok Hospital Specialists – 3rd April 2025

A full house of section members and guests gathered on 3rd April to enjoy a superb lunch, delivered with the consistently attentive service of the Club's excellent F&B Team. What followed was an enlightening and highly relevant series of presentations by three distinguished medical professionals from Bangkok Hospital, a valued partner of our Club.

First to speak was Dr. Sirinporn Manitsirikul Tipudom, a neurologist specializing in memory systems and Alzheimer's disease. Her impressive credentials include a prestigious post-doctoral fellowship in dementia and

Alzheimer's research at McGill University in Montreal, Canada. Dr. Sirinporn outlined the three most common neurological disorders affecting older adults: Alzheimer's and Parkinson's diseases, and strokes. She described how these conditions typically manifest, including key early indicators to watch for. She also discussed the latest treatments available and emphasized the importance of proactive lifestyle choices in prevention.

Following her was Khun Akanitha Seeboonruang, a Clinical Neuropsychologist with deep expertise in cognitive health and rehabilitation. Trained in Clinical Neuropsychology at Newcastle University Medical School and the Institute for Aging and Health at Newcastle General Hospital in the UK, she returned to Thailand to join Bangkok Hospital. Offering a lively and engaging contrast to the more sobering presentation that preceded hers, Khun Akanitha led us in a light-hearted "Brain Game" workshop—a hands-on session involving balance and finger dexterity exercises. Members eagerly participated, rising from their chairs to follow her lead. The laughter and energy in the room quickly lifted the atmosphere and got everyone's neurons firing again.

Re-energized, we welcomed the third speaker, Dr. Anothai Soonsawat, a Geriatric Psychiatrist. Dr. Anothai completed his Psychiatry Residency at the Harvard South Shore Psychiatry Residency Training Program and later specialized in Geriatric Psychiatry through a prestigious fellowship at UCLA's David Geffen School of Medicine. His presentation, titled "Aging with Grace: The Concept of Successful Aging and How to Get There", began with a







global overview of human aging trends, then narrowed in on Asia, and finally Thailand-described by Dr. Anothai as being in the midst of a "Silver Tsunami". He outlined three key pillars that support successful aging and emotional wellbeing, leaving us with much food for thought about our own lives and choices ahead.

Although Dr. Sirinporn had to return to her hospital duties, both Dr. Anothai and Khun Akanitha stayed to answer a wide range of questions from the floor. Chairperson Terry closed the session by thanking the speakers and all those in attendance for what was a truly eye-opening, practical, and deeply relevant event for our members.


