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



There will be more details in the December edition of the Outpost, but we will be closing the annual accounts in a very positive position. To our members, I appreciate your continued loyalty and participation in Club activities.

In October, we hosted two Town Hall meetings, which allowed all club members to attend a presentation for the proposed development of badminton and padel courts. Service & Supervisor Training at the Club

The Club recently hosted two comprehensive training sessions led by Arjan Nueng, aimed at enhancing service standards across all departments.

The second training was tailored for supervisors in each outlet and heads of departments, with a strong focus on Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs), leadership, and ensuring consistent, high-quality service across the Club.

Both sessions emphasized proactive service, teamwork, and excellence, equipping staff with the skills to provide memorable experiences for all members and guests.



With so many investment fund options available it's important to understand the key differences in this broad and often confusing marketplace.

Unit Trusts & Open-Ended Investment Companies

Two of the most common types of funds are Unit Trusts and Open-Ended Investment Companies (OEICs). They share many traits, but they also have some important differences.

Since they will always accept more cash from investors - they just become bigger to accommodate the demand. On the flip side, if there are more sellers than buyers, the fund will become smaller.

The price of a fund always reflects the value of its holdings. When more investors want to buy into the fund than sell, the manager issues more units. When the opposite is true, the manager cancels units.

They are more widely used even though some are more expensive than their investment trust alternatives. The great advantages of open-ended funds are their flexibility to make more units, as well as the fact there are more funds available meaning a greater choice for investors. This differs from a closed-ended fund, which issues a fixed number of non-redeemable shares like an Investment Trust.

What is a Unit Trust?

Unit Trusts were the first real open-ended investment fund in the UK, termed so because the fund manager can create new units (similar to shares) in the fund to meet investor demand. These units can be bought or sold at any time. This differs from a closed-ended fund like the Investment trust as mentioned above.

What is an OEIC?

In 1997, laws were introduced allowing the creation of OEICs, which are also open-ended. Over the last few decades OEICs have become a lot more common and many unit trusts have converted to the OEIC structure. This is due to the relative simplicity of OEICs and the fact they can broadly be sold into different countries across Europe.

Most new funds that are launched are structured as OEICs particularly in the UK.

What's the difference between Unit Trusts and OEICs?

In many respects unit trusts and OEICs are the same. They are both open-ended and the price of each unit depends on the net asset value of the fund's investment portfolio. Both allow you to choose to have dividends paid to you as income or reinvested in the fund and both can invest in a wide range of asset classes, locations and sectors.

A subtle difference is a unit trust is governed by trust law, whereas an OEIC is governed by company law. Technically, this means investors in a unit trust are not owners of the underlying assets, unlike investors in an OEIC although in reality this makes little difference to investors. If you invest in a unit trust you buy units whereas if you invest in an OEIC you buy shares.

The major difference between unit trusts and OEICs is the way they're priced. Unit trusts quote a bid price and an offer price; OEICs only quote one price. With unit trusts, the bid price is the per-unit price you'll receive if you sell your units back to the fund company. It's usually based on the bid price of the underlying securities held by the fund.

Investment Trusts

Investment trusts are effectively companies that hold assets such as shares. They are run by a fund manager backed by an independent board acting in the best interests of shareholders. The company itself is listed on the London Stock Exchange. While investment trusts predominantly invest in the shares of other companies, they can also invest in other financial assets.

As mentioned, as a closed ended fund. investment trusts have a fixed number of shares in an issue. This allows managers to take a longer-term view because they do not have to sell assets when investors sell their shares. Investment trusts have some of the unique features that set them aside from other types of funds.

Income seekers may be interested to know that investment trusts can hold back up to 15% of income generated by underlying assets each year to build up a reserve to be used to smooth dividend payments in tougher times. This means investors can enjoy a steady income when markets are performing. In certain circumstances, investment company boards may elect to pay income out of capital. While this can erode the long-term capital returns generated by the funds many investors are happy to prioritise short-term income payments over longer term growth.

Some growth investors might be interested in another unusual feature which allows investment trusts to borrow. This means that if managers think there is value in a particular market, they can borrow money to use for further investments, known as 'gearing'.

In a rising market, returns from an investment trust can be magnified because gearing means managers are better able to take advantage of rising share prices.

However, when share prices fall, the losses of geared funds can be exaggerated. The pricing of investment trusts works in a unique way too. When the price is greater than the value of the assets held in the company, this is known as a premium. At a time it is lower it is known as a discount.

Exchange-Traded Funds (ETFs)

An ETF is called an exchange-traded fund because it's traded on an exchange just like stocks. The price of an ETF's shares will change throughout the trading day as the shares are bought and sold on the market. This is unlike mutual funds, which are not traded on an exchange, and which trade only once per day after the markets close. Additionally, ETFs tend to be cheaper and more liquid when compared to mutual funds like unit trusts and OEICS.

An ETF can also hold multiple underlying assets and as such are also a popular choice for diversification. The assets can include stocks, commodities, bonds, or a mixture of investment types. Some ETFs focus on only U.S. offerings, while others have a global outlook.

There are many investment options available and a number of ways of holding these investments. They can be purchased by the public directly though Trading Accounts or through Investment Advisers.





The Square Club, Bristol, England

Visited in June 2023 and July 2025 by Paul Doust and Prasit Jangkamol (a.k.a. Jack)

The <u>Square Club</u>, in the Clifton area of Bristol, was established in 1990 as a private member's club for the film, media and creative industries. The club's premises are in a building which labels itself outside as The <u>Berkeley Square Hotel</u>. The hotel is located on the upper floors of the building, with the club on the ground floor and in the basement. The membership manager at the Square Club can help members and reciprocal members get discounts at the hotel. In an adjacent building is a serviced co-working space called <u>Square Works</u>, which is connected with the Square Club and uses the same logo, but membership of the Square Club does not include access to Square Works. Berkeley Square itself is an attractive Georgian Square, laid out around 1790, with a small leafy park in the middle.

The club is open every day of the week and has a very modern feel, with a relatively young membership. Next to the reception area is a lounge, with the Square Kitchen Restaurant also on the ground floor. Reciprocal members are entitled to the same discounts in the restaurant as the club's own members. A door at the back of the restaurant area leads onto a spiral staircase which goes down to the basement area. The basement area is called the Lower Deck, the main feature of which is a cocktail bar. The flight of stairs at the back of the Lower Deck leads up to an attractive outside terrace.





The first time we visited the club was 2 years ago when we were in Bristol to catch up with various friends. We arrived at the club in the middle of the afternoon, and were made to feel very welcome. We sat in the outside terrace area for a few drinks. There was an event taking place that evening which was fascinating. Three entrepreneurs stood up in turn at the front of the audience, and explained what mistakes they had made that had caused failures in their businesses. The idea is to break the taboo of failure, and promote the ethos that it's better to have tried something and failed rather than never tried at all. The Square Club's members present that evening were the ideal audience, given the club's focus on attracting members from the creative industries. The presentations the entrepreneurs gave were very entertaining.

The second time I visited was a couple of months ago. I was visiting Bristol for some meetings in the afternoon, so I arrived in time to have lunch at the club. To my amazement, the membership manager who was at the reception said I looked familiar. I recognised her too from my previous visit, so I explained that I had visited back in 2023 and she warmly welcomed me back. One of the other members, a mixed media artist, had heard that I was visiting from overseas so she came over to have a chat while I was there. She said that the club was a great place for her to come and work during the day because it's so friendly.

In summary, if one needs somewhere to hang out while visiting Bristol, the Square Club is sure to provide a warm welcome.







EVENT REPORT:

"Thonburi the Capital of Ancient Siam: King Taksin's Vision, Thailand's Future": 16th October 2025

Our speaker, journalist and author Kenneth Barrett, began his presentation at the time of the fall of Ayutthaya in 1767, when the city was besieged and eventually sacked by the Burmese after eight months. Among those defending the city was Sin, then the Governor of Tak Province, later known as Taksin. Seeing that defeat was certain, he led around 500 men through the Burmese lines and withdrew to Chanthaburi on the southeast coast. From there he gathered support and built a new army, returning within seven months of Ayutthaya's destruction to regain control of the Chao Phraya Basin and much of what had been old Siam.

Ayutthaya, by then, lay in ruins. Recognising that it could no longer function as the capital, Taksin established his new seat of government at Thonburi. It was there that the surviving nobles and clergy acknowledged his leadership and declared him king.















From that point, Kenneth took the audience on an illustrated journey through Thonburi as it exists today, showing how many parts of the old capital still reflect Taksin's short but formative reign. Using his own photographs, he guided us from the Taksin Roundabout, with its well-known statue of the king, along the river to the mouth of the Chao Phraya, pointing out places that still link directly to the Thonburi period.

Among these were the Santa Cruz Church, founded on land granted in 1769 by Taksin to the Portuguese Catholics who had fled Ayutthaya, and the nearby Bang Luang Mosque, notable for its mixture of Thai, Chinese, and European architectural styles. Both buildings have been rebuilt several times and remain open to visitors today, reflecting Thonburi's religious and cultural diversity at the time.

Kenneth also described the role of Chinese settlers, mainly of Teochew origin, as was Taksin's father. Their

arrival helped restore trade and river commerce after the war and brought back skills in boat-building, metalwork, and craft production. The Chinese communities of Thonburi grew rapidly and became an important part of the city's economy and character — a legacy still visible in the area's markets and shop-houses today.

The presentation gave a well-rounded view of how Thonburi functioned as the bridge between the devastation of Ayutthaya and the rise of modern Bangkok. It was an informative and well-researched talk that placed familiar places in a much deeper historical context, showing how the foundations of today's capital were laid under King Taksin's brief but decisive rule.

The event drew a very good turnout, with members and guests clearly engaged throughout the talk and the question session that followed. Several commented afterwards on how much they had learned about an area of Bangkok they thought they already knew well.

Cooling down so warming up for Party time

Time passes and years roll by, and yet what was once, is, forever in a perpetual cycle like the moon or the earth, or the seasons; and so is the Tennis Calendar year on year - check it out. 
