In what can be a confusing (and sometimes treacherous) landscape, Martin Wright, Senior Financial Planner at Progeny outlines investment options for British expats.

Banks - Offshore

There are still many deposit takers providing offshore bank accounts, including the overseas arms of major UK financial institutions. Certain locations use the UK bank clearing system meaning there is a UK sort code which include Jersey, Isle of Man, Guernsey, Gibraltar and Malta. Each location has its own financial services compensation schemes offering various degrees of financial protection in the event of bank insolvency.

Sourcing systems such as the offshore tab of the moneyfacts.co.uk website can be useful to source competitive interest rates. Given the apparent reducing interest rate environment bank interest rates are likely to reduce from the highs of the last few years. Interest from offshore bank accounts is often paid gross without any tax deduction at source.

Banks - Onshore (Thailand)

Some major global banking institutions have closed their Thailand operations in recent years although there still remains UOB and CIMB banks. There are also well-established local banks like Siam Commercial Bank, Bangkok Bank and Kasikorn Bank.

Local interest rates tend to be lower than those in GBP and USD. Interest received from local banks is subject to withholding tax at a flat rate of 15% although Individuals may choose to exclude interest income from other income and pay tax according to the Thailand Personal Income Tax rates instead.

Directly held investment funds

This includes Mutual funds, Unit Trusts and OEICs. Mutual funds are investments made from pooled money from investors and can include bonds and equities as well as other asset classes. A unit trust differs from a mutual fund in that a unit trust is established under a trust deed, and the investor is effectively the beneficiary.

Two of the most common types of funds in the UK and parts of Europe are unit trusts and open-ended investment companies (OEICs). They share many traits in that the price of a fund always reflects the value of its holdings. They are more widely used even though some are more expensive than the Investment Trust alternatives.

The great advantages of open-ended funds are their flexibility to make more units, as well as the fact there are more funds available. This differs from a closed-ended fund, which issues a fixed number of non-redeemable shares like an Investment Trust. Over the last few decades most new fund launches in the UK were OEICs.

Stockbroking accounts

Stockbroking is typically offered by wellestablished companies advertising their services in print and online. Most countries have options although there are some major global providers who will allow accounts to be opened without some of the frequent country specific problems.

This option is a cost-efficient approach to investment, usually allowing access to any listed investment instruments on the main exchanges worldwide. The standard service provides accounts on an execution only basis, so no advice is offered, and you just have access to an account to purchase investments through based on your own choice.

General investment accounts

A General Investment Account (GIA) offers access to investment funds, and some direct securities (this is company specific). This is a common UK method of personal investment

Some international providers allow accounts to be established by Thailand residents (on a case-by-case basis). A limited number of UK account providers will allow this. It's a competitive marketplace currently so these accounts are generally cost efficient with the standard annual product charge in the region of 0.25% per annum. As they are mostly used by advisory companies GIAs aren't frequently used for personal execution only investment.

Offshore life assurance investment bonds

This method is used regularly by offshore advisers. This product allows investment in the main currencies and listed investments through most dealing exchanges. For non-UK residents the more complicated UK taxation structure does not apply. For UK residents they are a tax deferral vehicle which is likely to have a UK tax liability after a certain period of time of withdrawals or at specific events. Whilst this approach can offer flexibility, the wide charging menu offered by most Offshore Bond providers can lead to an expensive product, upfront, ongoing and high surrender penalties in the early years.

They can be useful for estate planning as a few providers have their own trust companies providing off-the-shelf low-cost arrangements. As corporate trustees there's also a higher likelihood they will remain in place for the life of the arrangement.

Discretionary portfolio management

Historically these options are used by institutional investors, high net worth individuals, or charities. Most global asset management companies have high minimum investment levels and \$1 million is common, although a handful offer lower-level access, from \$500,000 upwards.

Discretionary Portfolios are managed without consulting you on investment decisions, with changes based on factors agreed at outset. They're usually cost efficient and available in most of the main currencies, although some have country specific criteria. They offer long term consistency and professional well-funded researched solutions.

Thailand tax information

Assessable income in Thailand includes the following categories:

Capital gains

Most types of capital gains are taxable as ordinary income. There are exemptions including the sale of shares in local listed companies and ASEAN member country stock exchanges. Capital gains and investment income earned by a resident from sources outside Thailand are currently not taxable unless remitted to Thailand and capital losses may not be offset against gains.

Dividend income

Dividends received from a company incorporated in Thailand are subject to withholding tax (WHT) at a flat rate of 10%. Offshore dividends are currently only taxable in Thailand if the value is remitted.

Interest income

Interest received from local bank deposits, as mentioned, is subject to withholding tax at a flat rate of 15%. Any offshore interest remitted into Thailand is liable to Thailand Tax at the prevailing rates with the possibility of a Tax Credit for any overseas tax paid.

With the changing Thailand tax landscape, it is essential you seek professional local tax advice from an appropriate locally listed and regulated organisation. Choosing the right investment approach for you is also highly important.



Naval, Military and Air Force Club, Adelaide, South Australia

Visited in June 2019 by Paul Doust

The club which is now known as the "Naval, Military and Air Force Club of South Australia" was founded in 1879 as "The Militia Officers' Club of South Australia". Two name changes have occurred since its foundation. first in 1894 when the name was changed to the "Naval and Military Club of South Australia", and then in 1943 when "Air Force" was added. The current clubhouse was bought in 1957, and is situated on the eastern side of the city town centre, within easy walking distance of the central business district and all the city's main attractions and shopping areas. These days club membership is much wider than when the club was founded, including professional and business men and women, as well as serving and retired officers from all three services.

The club has a lot of facilities. The formal dining restaurant is called The Colonel Downes Dining Room, named after Colonel Major Francis Downes, a British Army officer who was a key figure involved in the club's foundation. The restaurant is open for lunch Monday to Friday, and for dinner Tuesday to Saturday. Food is also available in the less formal setting of the Members' Bar. There's a variety of rooms for functions and business meetings, including rooms with audio-visual facilities, as well as accommodation and car parking. Apart from the billiards room, there are no other sports facilities. The club organises a lot of events throughout the year, and there are several dress codes which depend on what facilities are being used or what event is being attended. However, the minimum dress code can be summarised as "smart-casual"


















EVENT REPORT:

"Searching for Billie: A journalist's quest to understand his amazing mother's past leads him to discover a vanished China": 6th November 2025

Our distinguished speaker, lan Gill, together with his wife Jean, travelled from Manila to share with us a remarkable and deeply personal story, one that combined the intimacy of family discovery with the grandeur of history. Ian is a veteran journalist and author whose outstanding career spans more than four decades across the Asia Pacific region, including senior roles with Reuters, the BBC, and the South China Morning Post. His wealth of experience and natural storytelling ability made him the perfect narrator for this extraordinary tale.

The presentation explored not only lan's years long journey to uncover the truth about his mother's mysterious past, but also offered a fascinating window into China's transformation from the late 19th to the mid-20th century. His mother, Billie, led a life that was by turns inspiring, tragic, and heroic, one that mirrored the turbulence of the times in which she lived.











A marvelous raconteur and expressive presenter, lan vividly brought to life, through a striking sequence of archival photographs, maps, sketches, and historical images, the long and intricate saga of his family's journey. The narrative began in rural Worcestershire. England, in 1835, following the extraordinary path of Billie's runaway stepmother, who was married in London, before continuing through Southampton, Hong Kong, and Shanghai, and eventually reaching rural China around the time of the founding of the Imperial Postal Service.

From there, the narrative followed the extraordinary life of Billie, adopted by the above-mentioned English couple in Shanghai in 1916, whose life unfolded against the backdrop of civil strife, war, and revolution. lan's account moved deftly through her early years in Shanghai society, her escape to Hong Kong during the Sino Japanese War, internment by the Japanese, her pregnancy issues after the Japanese surrender that necessitated urgent evacuation on a New Zealand Hospital Ship, the birth of her son in New Zealand, and eventual return to Shanghai with her young son after the war. He described her remarkable encounters with leading figures on both sides of China's civil conflict, her quiet courage during times of upheaval and penury, and

her enduring resilience through personal and political turmoil.

Billie's later career was no less distinguished. Her work with the United Nations, first in Shanghai, then Bangkok, and later Geneva, particularly regarding her work during the so important nuclear disarmament negotiations, earned her recognition at the highest level, the award of an MBE by Queen Elizabeth II, a fitting tribute to a woman whose life had spanned continents, wars, and revolutions, yet remained guided by compassion and determination.

The audience was captivated throughout the talk, many commenting afterwards on the breadth of historical insight and the depth of personal emotion that lan conveyed. His ability to weave together family memoir, world history, and visual storytelling made this presentation one of the most memorable and moving sessions of the Active Living Section's 2025 calendar.

Our sincere thanks go to lan and Jean for travelling so far to share such a remarkable and poignant story, one that offered not only a glimpse into a vanished China. but also a profound reminder of the resilience of the human spirit across generations.

In his clear, measured, and very engaging style, Simon outlined the principal personalities, the cultural misunderstandings that grew rapidly into a serious diplomatic rift, and the careful negotiations that eventually prevented a disastrous break in relations. He explained how this episode, although resolved without armed conflict, left deep and lasting personal consequences for several of the individuals involved. Using contemporary maps, period illustrations, and written accounts of the time, he brought to life a Bangkok very different from the modern city we know, yet already the political and commercial centre of the

A notable highlight of Simon's talk was his explanation that the central issue in this 1856 dispute, the ownership and control of land by foreigners, continues to echo indeed to have the author himself lead us through strongly in Thailand even today. His demonstration of how early diplomatic tensions helped shape later national policy gave our members a valuable perspective on why certain topics still generate much discussion and

In summary, it was an absorbing, informative, and very well delivered presentation, and we were fortunate



this remarkable and still relevant episode in the early relationship between Britain and Siam.

*The Bowring Treaty was crucial for both Siam/Thailand and Britain because it opened Siam to global trade, secured peaceful relations with Britain, and helped preserve Siam's independence at a time when much of the region was being colonized.





BC Pavilionaires Open Season with Tense 7-Run T20 Win Over Siam at RBSC Polo Ground

The 2025-26 season kicked off at Bangkok's Royal Bangkok Sports Club Polo Ground on November 10. Weeks of rain had left moisture in the turf wicket, and overcast skies offered little help to batsmen. The previous match on the same ground had seen the side batting first skittled for just 52 all out-a stark reminder of the conditions. Siam Parrots captain Nick Newell had no hesitation winning the toss and inserting the British Club Pavilionaires (BC). What followed was a gripping low-scoring contest, with BC scraping 126/7 before defending it with grit to beat the Siam Parrots by 7 runs.

BC's innings began cautiously with just 3 runs from the first 11 deliveries under tight bowling from Tony Slatter and Mike Strunk. New captain and opener Rahul Gupte. unleashed his usual release shot-a heave over mid-wicket for 4 against Strunk-but tried it again the next over against Slatter and on the slower pitch was trapped in front LBW for 4 in the 3rd over. Relief finally came in the 5th over when -Mak Khan, batting at #3, launched a six off Slatter, who then sprayed loose wides to release the pressure in a 13 run over as BC reached 28/1 after 5 Overs.

After a commanding 79 run partnership, Mak (40* off 32) was forced to retire after launching back-to-back sixes before opener

Moss, famous for retiring from the game got the hook pulled on him mid-knock: 40* off 33, looking set, then boom, "40 is up, mate." It's like a veteran actor being written out mid-scene-especially poetic given his history of bowing out on his own terms. The cricket gods do love a twist. The retirees left BC with the scoreboard looking good at 90/1 after 12.1 overs.

Chan Chabra added a steady 20 before the tail collapsed in chaos: just 12 runs for 5 wickets in the final 3 overs, including 3 wickets (2 run outs) in the last 3 balls of a frantic finish to end at 126/7 after the 20 overs.

Siam's reply built steadily. Opener Ankur Relia (46* off 49) guided the Parrots to 78/1 after 13 overs when he retired-with wickets in hand the Parrots would have liked their chances despite the required rate reaching 7 per over (thanks to economical bowling from Dilip Mishra, Joge George and Rahul).

Ed Khan and Sunish Shah, last seasons leading wicket taker, then quickly took 4 crucial middle-order scalps, including a stunning one handed catch by Lenny Tui scheduled for Saturday the 13th of December.

James Moss, was also forced to retire just 4 balls later. on the boundary from Shah's bowling leading to joyous on-field celebrations. The bowling pairing rounded out their spells to leave the match well poised at 107/5 after 17 overs, Siam requiring 20 from the final 3 overs with 5 wickets in hand.

> Chan Chabra, despite beginning his spell with a double bounce no-ball loosener, conceded 6 runs and picked up the wicket of Mike Strunk caught and bowled in the 18th over. Rahul then allowed a miserly 3 runs from the 19th over to leave 11 to win in the final over. Chan stepped up with BME claiming the Man of the Match by conceding just 3 runs while picking up 2 wickets in the process to ensure victory for BC as Siam fell 7 runs short at 119/8!

The competition is very kindly sponsored by long term British Club golfer David Lamb, of Dunlop Adhesives (Thailand) Ltd..


